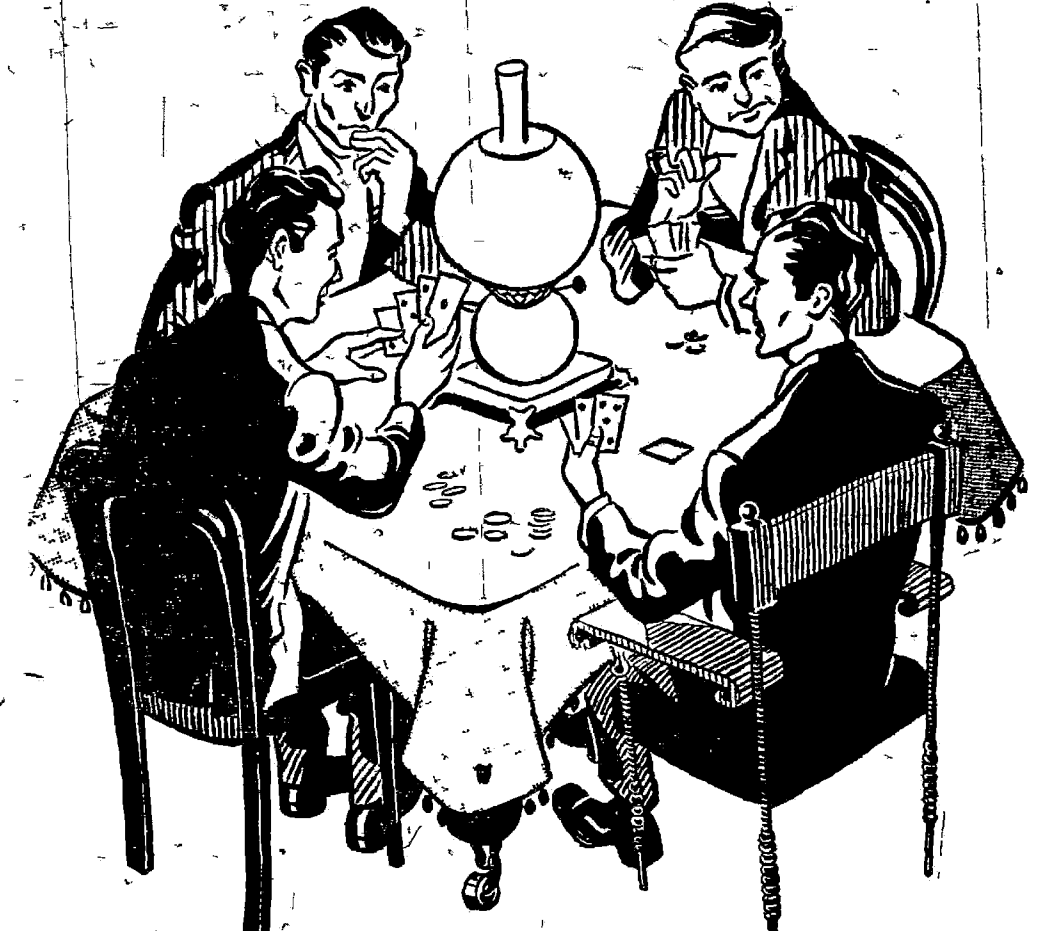

TALLOW DISTRICT COURT

(Before Mr J W Cahill, D.J.) No Lights - Garda M Walsh, Tallow had a number of cyclists summoned for having no lights on their cycles. Fines ranging from 1/- to 5/- were imposed. Charge Reduced - Charles Cecil Bryan, Kiltoran, Conna was charged with serious driving on Sept 14th last. The charge arose when on the occasion mentioned Mary O'Brien, aged 8 years, was struck by defendant's car and sustained a compound fracture of the leg. Mary O'Brien in evidence stated that she was returning from school on the date mentioned and as she was passing the entrance to the Bride Valley Stores Yard a car came out and knocked her down. She did not hear any horn sounded. Supt McDonald, prosecuting, said that the child suffered a compound fracture of the left leg and was in hospital for three weeks. Charles Cecil Bryan stated in evidence that he had gone into the Bride Valley Stores Yard in his car and was coming out through the Archway his speed was only five miles per hour. He was forced to drive out four or five feet before he could get a look at both sides of the roadway. He saw a crowd of school-children coming, one of whom struck the front wheel. The others seemed to have pushed her. Mr Colbert, solicitor, defending said that the defendant had done everything possible to avoid the accident and had done everything a careful driver should do. The Justice reduced the charge to one of careless driving and fined the defendant 20/-. Thomas Feney, Aragon, Co. Cork, was charged with careless driving of a motor car at Park-dota Cross Tallow on October 23rd when he was in collision with a car driven by Mr. P. Barry, Youghal. He was fined 10/-.
