Mr Keane courteously came out and the Reporters complained of the unfair way they were being treated in being expected to hang around until the Council took the whim to let the public in to what was going on again.

REGULATIONS FOR LENT, 1956

- 1—Meat is allowed on all days in Lent except Ash Wednesday and Fridays.
- 2—Those between 21 and 60 years of age who are bound to fast, may take-meat and meat soup only once each day at their principal meal.
- 3—Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal and two light collations.
- 4—From 12 to 18 ounces of solid food are permitted at these combined collations that is two-thirds of the quantity of food usually taken at breakfast and evening tea.
- 5—One egg may be taken both in the morning and evening as part of these collations and so may butter, cheese, milk, fruit, cereals and fish.
- 6—The division of the total amount of food allowed at two collations is left to the choice of the individual, and so are the hour and order of the meals e.g. dinner about midday and collation in the evening or vice versa.
- 7—A cup of tea or coffee may be taken as often as desired.
- 8—Parish Priests even outside of Confession and Confessors are empowered to dispense from the Law of Abstinence or from both.
- 9—There will be neither Fast nor Abstinence on Sundays and on St. Patrick's Day.
- 10—Lenten Fast and Abstinence cease at Mid-night on Holy Saturday.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL DISCUSS DURAND CASE

PRESS EXCLUDED FROM DUNGARVAN MEETING

Department Age Limit Order Was Defective

Waterford County Council held a special meeting in Dungarvan on last Monday evening, the items on the agenda being—(1) P Durand v Waterford County Council Report from County Solicitor (2) Auditor's Reports (a) Extraordinary Audit to 7th November 1955 (b) Year ended 31st March 1954. Mr M Morrissey Chairman, presided, and also presided were Messrs T Kane, P D J Fahey, R Keane, H Dowd, C Curran, S Ormond, T D W Dower, K O Ryan, J Power, W Kenneally, T D T Lannen, N Walsh, J Quirk, Senator J Butler, E Barron, M Hartly, D Heskin, J Flynn.

When the Council proceeded to deal with the report on the Durand case Mr Walsh said that following the discussion on the matter at the last meeting he understood that members of the Council were to have copies of the Solicitor's report on the case circulated to them. The Chairman said that he had made no ruling on the matter the last day. Mr Walsh again said that he understood they were to have got the report and the position was that not having seen the report he or the other members could not now ask any intelligent questions on it.

The County Manager stated that following the last meeting the Chairman had read the report and then decided not to have it circulated that he was taking the full blame for not having the report circulated for the reason that he was not prepared to take the full weight of having confidential information released to the Press. The Council he said could not decide whether to deal with the matter in committee (private) or in public.

At this stage Senator Butler drew attention to the fact that when the re-arrangement of the front bench (In order to allow the County Secretary to sit next to the County Manager and County Solicitor) the Chairman vacated his usual chair and was sitting in the place usually occupied by the County Secretary at meetings.

The Chairman then asked the Council to decide whether they would discuss the Solicitor's report in public or in private. Mr Halley Solicitor stated that further claims were contemplated arising from the report to the Council he referred to certain information passed to him by his colleague in Cork and he did not think that it was information that should be published as far as the rest of the report was concerned he did not care about it but he thought in the best interests of the Council it should not be published.

Senator Butler—Is there any likelihood that throughout the rest of the country such actions might arise or is this peculiar to County Waterford? Mr Halley—it is not peculiar to Waterford. The same law pertains to the whole country but there has been amending legislation designed to prevent actions of this kind. Mr Halley asked who was to blame the matter, and whether it would be the County Council or the Department would bear the costs of the action. Mr Halley replied that who was to blame it was the County Council would have to pay. Mr Lannen—Everyone who is interested already knows the decision in this case and whether you discuss it in committee or not makes no difference. In Cork similar situations arose but they didn't sanction the positions and the Waterford County Council had the opportunity of doing the same thing. This report should have been in the hands of the Councilors for the past week to give them a chance of studying it. Compromise Settlement. Mr Heskin—Was there a settlement arrived at in this case? Mr Halley—That's so. Mr Heskin—So we were liable. Mr Halley replied that it had been a compromise settlement. Mr Heskin—Was the settlement published? Mr Halley—No. Mr Halley then told Mr Hartly that he was quite sure that the Department would not recoup the Council in the matter. Mr Lannen—Was it taken as a test case? Mr Halley—No no at least not as far as I know.

ing heard the full report of the Solicitor he believed that the case had been very efficiently handled by the County Solicitor and officials concerned. It was the Deputy who were responsible for the mess that the officials found themselves in and as far as they could go now was to call on the Department to recoup the full losses of the case and in fairness to the ratepayers of Waterford he thought the Department should do that. Mr Ormond said that he was also of the opinion that it was the Department who was responsible and not official of the Council. The position was that the County Manager had carried out a direction from the Department on an age limit order which was found to be defective. The County Manager said that he was going to cost the ratepayers £3,700 but if it had not been settled as it was it could have cost between two and five thousand pounds extra. It appeared that the ratepayers they had got from their own Solicitor had been good but the advice of their Senior Counsel had not been all that it should be.

Mr Lannen said that he hoped in future the decisions of the Council's higher officials would be sound. It looked as if everyone had been eager to appoint the last rate collectors he said. The County Manager said that such appointments were a matter for the County Council. Mr Kenneally said that the Council should congratulate the County Manager the County Solicitor and Mr Hanrahan for the way they had conducted the matter. Mr Lannen said that their officials should have been aware of the decisions made in Cork. They could not pin any medals on their chests for some of the decisions they had taken in the past and this decision was also a bad one he said.

The following resolution proposed by Mr Heskin and seconded by Mr Keane was then passed: "That we request the Department of Local Government to recoup in full the amount of compensation and costs involved in the recent law case of ex-rate collector P Durand v Waterford Co Council." The discussion then ended. **Auditor's Reports** Following a short discussion, the Council again decided to go to the Committee to deal with the Auditor's reports and the Press was again excluded. **Acknowledgment** At the outset of the meeting, Councilor John Fahey thanked the members and officials of the Council for their vote of sympathy on the recent regretted death of his father. **Temporary Accommodation** The Council agreed on the proposal of Mr Ormond to recommend to the County Manager that Mr E Gough and family whose house and entire belongings at Tallacole were destroyed by fire on last Saturday night be provided with a Council house available in the locality as temporary accommodation until he built a new residence. Mr Ormond said that the Council should extend their sympathy to Mr and Mrs Gough on the big loss they had sustained. The County Manager said that there should be no difficulty in providing the house if the County Council so wished. **OPEN COURSING Inter-Club Meeting—Clonmel v. Dungarvan for King Cup at Clonmel** On Sunday last over the Clonmel preserves the above cup was decided before a good gathering including a large number of Dungarvan supporters. The valuable cup generously presented by that staunch follower of the open game Sam King of Clonmel was won by the Dungarvan black bitch Lusfenola owned by Mr Michael Whelan, St. Garvan's Terrace, Dungarvan. In the final she defeated the Clonmel dog Mr J Fitzgerald's Atacama Desert and brought a good day's coursing to a close. Mr King in presenting the cup paid tribute to the winner and said he hoped this event would lead to many more tests between Clonmel and Dungarvan dogs. Mr P Moloney was the judge whose dog Jimna had to be drawn owing to injury paid tribute to the Clonmel club and their work for the open coursing game. He complimented them on the efficient manner in which they carried out the fixture and said special praise was due to the beaters who stuck to their task and made a final possible when it seemed there would have to be a division. It was he said Dungarvan's first venture in open coursing and he was sure that the sport would spread in the district. Miss K Butler Hon. Secretary Clonmel Mr Terry Dalton, Dungarvan Mr P Noonan do, and others having spoken the day concluded with a very enjoyable social made possible by the hospitality of that popular captain Councilor John Fahey and the members and officials of the Phelan.

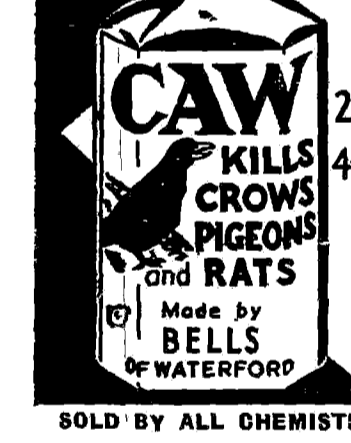
