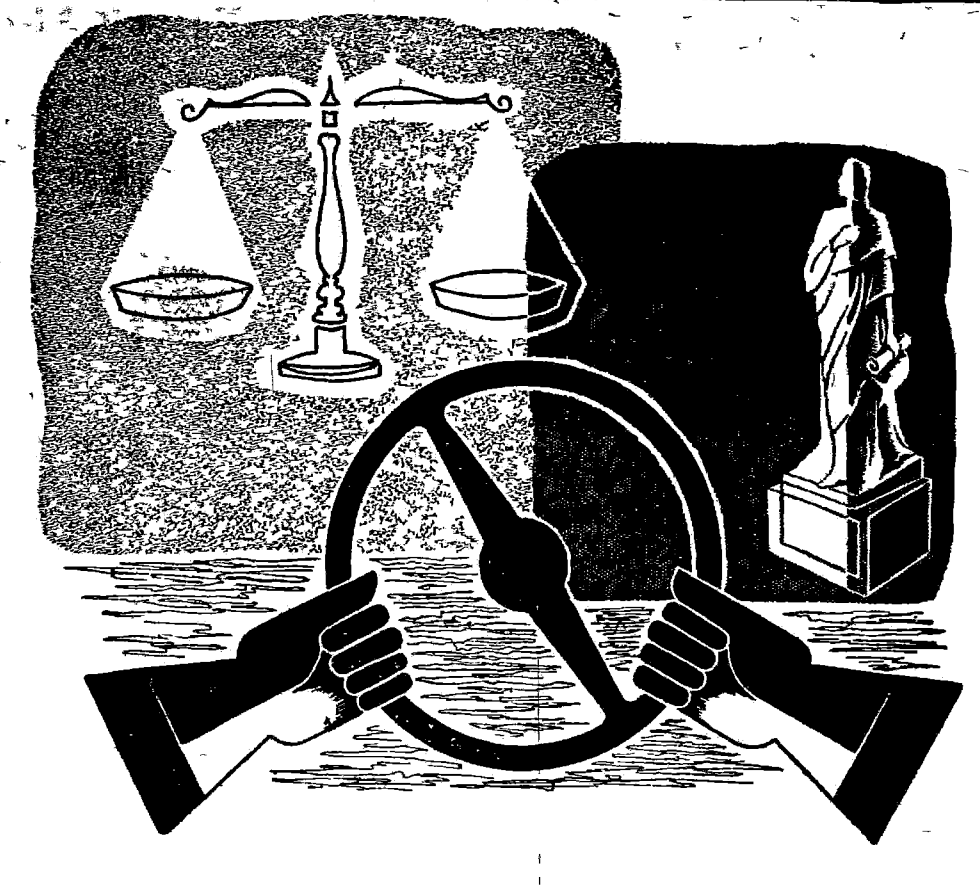

**Accounts Of The Two  
Public Trials Of Monsignor  
Kiong, Bishop Of  
Shanghai**

The "Journal of the Liberation", official organ of the Communist party in Shanghai, announced on December 19th 1955 that the "Peoples High Court of Justice" had appointed a Commission to study the case of "the counter-revolutionary party of Kiong Pin Mel" and to prepare a public trial. In Communist jargon a public trial is one which takes place before a law court with all the outward show of legal procedure. There is however no speech for the defence properly so called, but instead the spectacle of the defendant accusing himself and calling for his own punishment. Such a trial was that of Cardinal Mindszenty which followed the pattern of the notorious trials in Moscow in 1936. The trial of the Bishop of Shanghai was the first major public trial in Communist China.

The following account is taken from "Agency International Fides", January 28th 1956.

Monsignor Kiong was arrested on September 28th 1955. Some weeks later towards the end of September Monsignor Kiong was conveyed to the College of Zi Za Wei where a crowd of about 4,000 people was assembled, the majority being Catholic students and Christians of Zi Za Wei.

The Bishop wearing Chinese dress and without a soutane his hands tied behind his back was forced to climb on a platform and to stand there listening to interminable accusations brought against him by the peoples' representatives. Then he was pushed in front of a microphone. Evidently he was expected to acknowledge his "crimes" and humble himself before the assembled Christians.

The courageous prisoner three times repeated the one phrase which echoed through the courtyard of the College "Long Live Christ the King. Twice the crowd deeply moved answered him "Long live our Bishop". There was no time for a third acclamation. Guards hurriedly seized the Bishop twisting his arms and trust him into the police car which conveyed him back to his prison cell.

The second public trial took place early in January 1956. Again we quote "Agency Internationale Fides" (February 4th, 1956).

This time all precautions had been taken to ensure that the incidents of the first trial did not recur. For three hours the Bishop was forced to hear a string of accusations in which five seminarians and three nuns took part. He was assailed by hostile shouts from the crowd which he must have been unable to remain silent. Towards the end of his ordeal he was observed to put his hand to his heart out he maintained his steadfast silence throughout.

The Agency Internationale Fides concludes thus:

"These public trials are part of the psychological process of the Communist torturers aimed at driving their victim out of his senses. He must be given a feeling of the most utter solitude and the impression that the whole world has risen against him to accuse and condemn and engulf him. These kind of gathering are generally accompanied by bells and the sound of the punishment and death of the "criminal". We have known of people who after a few hours of this terrible mental torment finished by losing their reason.
