### BIG SCHEMES RATEPAYERS CAN'T AFFORD

A typical example of the colossal schemes which are being foisted on the ratepayers is the proposed Waterworks Improvement Scheme for Dungarvan, estimated to cost a cool £90,000. The Town Clerk had cheerful news for the Council members on last Friday night when he told them that the Department would pay a little less than half of the annual loan charges and would allow the loan to meet the cost to be spread over a period of thirty years. Even with this contribution from the rates would be 6/3d in the £ and that would have to be paid for thirty long years.

At a time like this, I think that it is utter madness to even consider such a scheme. The town already owes well over a quarter of a million pounds in loans without having a further ninety thousand slapped on to the debt.

The water supply may not be all that could be desired for Dungarvan, but the unfortunate position is that we have reached the stage where we must cut our cloth according to our measure or else go to the wall.

The Council Administrative Authorities have been telling the public through Press and Radio announcements that they are living beyond their means, that they are spending far too much and that they must economise. There are good reasons for the preaching of this half-shirt policy but why not make that policy effective all round. Must there be one way for John Citizen to live—with his belt tightened—while the local authorities run mad, putting up big schemes and spending thousands of pounds that can be ill-afforded?

### NEW WATER SCHEME WOULD BANKRUPT TOWN

Grants Motions Deferred—7 Days Notice Not Given

Mr. T. A. Kyne T.D. Chairman presided at a meeting of the Dungarvan U.D.C. held on Monday last.

Amongst those present were Messrs N. Kelly, P. Casey, D. Moloney, J. McCarthy, Mr. E. Deery Town Clerk was in attendance.

Water-Scheme Would Bankrupt Town

During the course of further consideration of the report of Mr. E. G. Pettit Consulting Engineer on the proposed Waterworks Improvement Scheme, the Chairman stated that the estimated cost of £90,000 the Clerk stated that since the last meeting he had been informed by the Department that a grant of 43% of the annual loan charges would be available and a loan up to a period of 30 years could be raised.

Replying to questions by Mr. Casey the Clerk stated that the interest rate on the loan would be 5 1/2%, the gross annual loan charges would be £7,500, towards which £3,250 would be contributed by the grant leaving a sum of £4,250 to be met from the rates. This would mean about 6/3d in the £ for a period of 30 years.

Mr. Moloney—The town would be bankrupt if it had to pay that. I wonder is there any lavish scheme than the one suggested which we might undertake to improve the supply?

Mr. Casey—The question is, do we need a £90,000 scheme for the town? The Chairman said that there was no doubt but that water was required. He then quoted from the Consultant's report which stated that provision would have to be made for a daily supply of 339,000 gallons for domestic consumption, besides a further 90,000 gallons for industrial uses. The present schemes could only supply 180,000 gallons a day.

Mr. Moloney said that the water shortage was felt only in the higher regions of the town such as Congress Villas and Catholic Brugha and he suggested that a storage tank be erected in that vicinity which could be used at night to meet the daily needs.

Mr. Casey again said that he would like to know if the people wanted this scheme and if they did whether they were prepared to pay 6/6 in the £ for it for a period of 30 years.

Finally it was agreed to hold a special meeting on next Friday night to discuss the matter in full with the Co. Manager, Chief Medical Officer and Town Engineer.

Grants Motions Deferred

The following motions resulting from the Council's decision at last meeting to discontinue making further supplementary housing grants were on the agenda from Mr. Moloney:

That the Council reconsider the position with regard to the payment of supplementary housing grants to persons building in the Urban area, and that Mr. Kelly—That supplementary housing grants be paid to all eligible applicants and that a further loan be raised by the Council for the purpose.

Mr. Moloney stated that as the proposal of the motions carried at the last meeting, Mr. Lannen and Mr. Keane were absent from the meeting, he was prepared to have this motion adjourned to give them an opportunity of being present.

Mr. Kelly objected to adjourning the motions and said that they should be dealt with at that meeting.

The Chairman said that he was afraid that he could not take either motion as the regulations demanded that 7 days notice of such motions be given to members and that had not been given.

Mr. Kelly insisted in moving his motion. But it is an amendment to a resolution passed the last night and requires 7 days notice to the members.

Mr. Kelly—I gave 7 days notice to the Clerk.

The Clerk said that Mr. Kelly was probably correct in this but due to the usual delay in preparing the minutes for circulation the agendas had not been sent to the members 7 days before the meeting. He did not think that Mr. Kelly's motion was a rescinding resolution he added.

The Chairman said that as it was a rule made at the last meeting that seven days notice be given he would have to postpone the discussion of Mr. Kelly's motion. He did not think that it would make any great difference to defer it until next meeting.

Mr. Kelly—It makes this difference that the motion would be carried tonight.

Mr. Moloney then said that he would withdraw his motion for the present and it was agreed to let Mr. Kelly's motion stand over until next meeting.

## DECISION NOT TO INCREASE OFFICIALS SALARIES REVERSED

Strike Threat By Ardkeen Staff

Beautiful And Well Phrased Letter

Mr. Curran said that this was a beautiful and well-phrased letter but he had to point out that the income of the agricultural community had been reduced by 30% and they were now being asked to pay these increases to the Council's officials.

I am not against granting the increases, said Mr. Curran if the Department gave us a grant of £3,000 towards the full cost of them.

Mr. Curran said that the Waterford County Council was held in Dungarvan on Monday last to deal with a letter from the Waterford Branch A.T. & G.W. Union giving notice of intention to withdraw staff from Ardkeen Chest Hospital, Waterford on the 8th May if their application for wage increases was not granted.

The application from the Irish Local Government Officials Union for an increase of 10 per cent on the first £300 and 5 per cent thereafter on the gross salaries of all officials, rejected by a majority vote of the Council at the previous Monday's meeting was also on the agenda again.

Mr. Morrissey Chairman presided at the meeting and also present were Messrs N. Walsh J. Quirk T. Kyne T.D. C. Curran J. Power S. Ormond T.D. H. Dowd W. Dowry J. Lannen W. Kennedy T.D. Heskun and later Mr. Foran Lynch J. Fane and J. Flynn.

Mr. J. G. Dowling County Secretary was in attendance.

Suspension Of Standing Orders

The Chairman said that he called the special meeting following receipt of a letter from Mr. C. O'Rourke Secretary, Waterford Branch A.T. & G.W. U. on the 24th April stating that their members at Ardkeen would go on strike if their application for a wage increase was not granted.

Mr. Lannen said that several members like himself were away during the week and had got very short notice of the meeting. It was his view that members should get 7 days notice.

The Chairman said that he was placed in an awkward position when he got the letter and he saw no way out of the problem but to call a special meeting.

Mr. Walsh said that he agreed with Mr. Lannen's point and remarked that the choice of day for the meeting left his side of the house very bare as a number of members were unavoidably absent. There were 13 out of 23 members present at this stage.

The resolution to suspend standing orders was carried unanimously.

Letter From County Manager

Stating that the Co. Manager Mr. S. J. Moynihan could not attend the meeting as he had to be in Kilkenny for the Estimate meeting, the Chairman read a letter from the County Manager apologising for his unavoidable absence.

The Manager's letter went on to say that a disturbing report had been received from the Acting R.M.S. of Ardkeen in which he pointed out the very serious position in regard to the salaries of Medical Officers in that institution.

The letter went on to state: "The Nursing Staff have submitted a memorial in which they relatively state their intention of seeking posts elsewhere where adjustments have been made. I need not refer to the serious and urgent features of the danger of a strike at Ardkeen which would be a disaster to the health and morale of the patients."

The Managers' letter then pointed out that 23 out of 27 County Councils had granted the increases as had the County Committee of Agriculture the Board of Assistance and the Vocational Education Committee and went on: "This impasse will place both the County Council and the Co. Manager in an impossible and illogical position. I need not refer to the natural dissatisfaction and discontent which will arise if one section is suffering from a grievance as a result of a County Council decision with the consequent loss of efficiency."

As pointed out at the last meeting the County Managers Association have decided to appoint an economy expert to groups of 3 or 4 counties. I confidently expect that such an expert would bring about considerable savings in County Council expenditure and I am hopeful that savings which would more than cover the expenditure involved in the adjustment of salaries could be effected in the current financial year so that the expenditure would be covered within the present rate.

The letter concluded: "I trust therefore that the County Council will fall into line and approve of the proposals and so continue to cement the harmonious relations which have hitherto existed between the Waterford County Council and its employees."

details of the salaries of the various officials and when Mr. Walsh objected to having these made public cross-fire followed between the two members.

The Chairman called on the members to refrain from indulging in personalities.

Mr. Walsh then asked whether the application from the two Unions were to be taken separately or as one.

Chairman—We will deal with them as one.

Mr. Walsh—There are close on 300 patients in Ardkeen at the moment and I am sure that no member, as far as lies in his power will allow a strike to take place there. I regret very much this decision to strike in this instance and in this institution as the first to suffer will be the patients. I think for that reason that no strike action should be tolerated at Ardkeen or any other such institution throughout the county.

Admission Of Bad Management

Mr. Heskun pointed out that the Council had already struck a rate of 38 s and the last day they were told that the increases could not be paid on that rate.

Mr. Heskun said that the increases can now be met out of that rate.

The Chairman said that the Manager's letter stated that he hoped to be able to do this with certain economies.

Mr. Heskun—So a lesser rate of say 35 s—could have been sufficient the last day.

The Chairman said that he would not agree with this.

Mr. Heskun—Sure that is what the position points to now in view of what the County Manager states in his letter.

Mr. Curran—It is certainly an extraordinary position that proposition can never be made from the existing rate when we were told that it could not be done the last day. This was the reason why I proposed a rate of 38 s that day and I am more advanced now that if it had been passed it would have been sufficient.

Mr. Lannen—The admission of the Co. Manager proves that there is bad management in the County Council.

Who Runs The Council

Mr. S. Kerr President, Irish Local Government Officials' Union then addressed the meeting and having dealt with the negotiations that had taken place he said that they had reluctantly agreed to accept the County Council's recommendation by the Minister for the sake of uniformity.

Mr. Dowd said that he felt that the increases would have to be granted but added that this matter was only a side-issue.

It seems said Mr. Dowd that the County Manager can usurp the functions of the County Council Eight months ago I asked for the appointment of an Efficiency Expert but it was turned down and despite that the Manager now comes along and says that he is going to employ one. The last day the Manager refused to carry out an order of the Council who is running the Council? The Manager or the County Managers Association? I think it might be as well to abolish the Council altogether. Is the position to be that the Manager will only carry out the decisions with which he agrees and no others?
