### IMAGINE

I was intrigued by the figures given by Mr Sweetman Finance Minister in the present Government when he answered a question in the Dail last week. He said that in 1939 there were 26,775 established and unestablished civil servants in the country whose annual remuneration had been £25,065,117. By 1948 the figure had jumped to 32,171 costing £9,129,849 and in 1955 there were 38,427 costing £15,330,406, plus a further 6,182 part-time civil servants costing £1,384,829.

### Outburst Follows Rejection Of Priority House Motion

### Council Clerkship Exams Criticised

### Water Charges "Still Too High"

Mr M Molloy, Chairman of the Council, presided at a meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Also present were Messrs J. K. Ryan, P.D. O'Rourke, T.D. K. O'Rourke, Curran R. Keane, K. K. Dowd, J. Lannen, W. Dower, Senator J. Butler, D. Heskin, M. Hartly, J. Quirk, J. Power, N. Walsh, J. Foran, W. Keane, J. D. W. Foran, J. Flynn.

Messrs S. Deegan, Acting County Manager, J. G. Dowling, County Secretary, and D. Whelan, County Engineer were in attendance.

### Water Charges "Still Too High"

The County Manager submitted a memorandum setting out the proposed scales for non-domestic water supplies and asked the Council for their recommendations on them.

The scale for cattle tanks ranged from £2 for the first and £2 each for additional tanks on land up to £10 valuation to a maximum of £10 for the first and £3 for each extra tank on land of £70 valuation and over. Water for building purposes—5/- per £100 of contract price minimum charge £3. Churches—£2 per annum. Supply points for hose and taps in gardens £2 per annum per point.

The scale fixed for domestic supplies is 4/- in the £ on the valuation of buildings.

The memorandum went on to state:

On the assumption that Agreements would be entered into for supply to all cattle tanks (i.e. 118 farms with 183 tanks) the revenue receivable under the above scale would be £1,277 per annum. Other Taps would yield £205 and £150 is estimated for metered supplies, the total for non-domestic charges being—£1,632.

Domestic Water Rates at 4/1d in the £ will yield—£4,722.

Total estimated Revenue—£6,354.

The Estimates as submitted for 1955, 56 sum £5,000 was entered for Water Rates as the survey was not then completed and a precise computation could not be made. The County Council Committee however took credit in the Sanitary Account for a further sum of £2,024 in the hope that a total of £7,024 would be realised from Water Rates and Rents. It is now clear that this figure is at least £670 less than the maximum possible collection and if connections are not continued to all tanks of which we are aware the deficit will be made even greater. Even if the existing scale of charges is to be maintained this debt balance must be made good when striking the rates for 1957, 58.

It is clear that the Council now consider that the scale of charges for cattle tanks should be revised and reference has been made particularly to the charge of £15 for the first tank and £5 for each additional tank. Upon further consideration I would be prepared to recommend to the Council that they should agree to this maximum of £15 being reduced to £10 with £3 for additional supply points. This means in effect that for valuations of over £70 the charge would be made at these maximum rates.

Such a revision would cost £237 per annum and the Council will have to decide (if they adopt this proposal) as to how this deficit is to be made good. If the carrying forward of a deficit is to be avoided it would be necessary to make some increase in the general charges for non-domestic supplies and in this connection I direct the Council's attention again to the charges for other types of non-domestic supply as set out above in this report.

For example the Council might consider whether it would be reasonable to make a special charge, over and above the domestic water rate, to premises where businesses are carried on. Such a charge could be levied on shops, slaughterhouses, licensed bars etc.

Mr Keane said that one thing he saw wrong with the Manager's proposals was that two old schemes near Dungarvan, Ballinacourty, and Ballyduff which had been paid for a number of times already by the consumers were now to be asked to pay the new rates. This was most unfair, he said, and he proposed that the old rates of 1/- in the £ be allowed stand in the case of these two schemes.

Mr Curran said that the scheme at the Curragh Ard was an old one and he strongly opposed any increase there.

Mr Keane said that the position was that any farmer who did not want to pay the charges had a remedy in his own hands by simply cutting off the supply.

Mr Quirk said that they should accept the County Manager's proposals and be done with it.

Mr Dowd then proposed and Mr Keane seconded a resolution that the Council were of opinion that the charges for non-domestic supplies were still too high and recommending that they be referred back to the County Manager with a request to reduce them.

Mr Deegan said that this would only delay the matter further and he pointed out that last year's water rates had not yet been collected.

Mr Walsh said that it was a sound principle of Local Administration that those who get services should pay for them. He then said that as far as he was aware the striking of a water rate was a Managerial function and the Council had no say in it.

Chairman—It has frequently been reported to the Council that the costs of certain old water schemes were paid for under guarantee agreements entered into by certain consumers when the schemes were constructed. It is apparent from the perusal of such agreements that they were merely guarantees to pay a specified water rent for an agreed number of years and it is clear also that the total amount paid under the agreements did not in fact exceed the costs of the schemes apart altogether from maintenance costs. These guarantees can only be regarded as being in the nature of an incentive to the Local Authorities to proceed with the schemes.

Mr Ormond then proposed and Mr Keane seconded an amendment that the proposals as set out by the County Manager be accepted for the current year.

By 10 votes to 6 Mr Dowd's resolution referring the matter back to the County Manager, as amended and the amendment defeated.

Mr Deegan said that this would only delay the matter further and he pointed out that last year's water rates had not yet been collected.

Mr Walsh said that it was a sound principle of Local Administration that those who get services should pay for them. He then said that as far as he was aware the striking of a water rate was a Managerial function and the Council had no say in it.

### Justice And Fair Deal

Mr T. Lannen moved the following notice of motion which had been on the agenda since November 1955—

That the position of Examiner on the board of County Council Examiners be appointed to a person living within the county for the next year.

The Secretary told Mr Lannen that the motion was first put down that the County Council Examinations had been held.

Mr Lannen said that the reason he had put down the motion was that he believed that they had as good and competent men in County who were willing quite capable of looking after their examinations as any that could be brought in. He referred to a provision in the Statute which gave the County Council at which 20 marks had been given to a boy who had failed to bring him up into the middle of the successful panel when his papers were re-examined by the same examiner. This was very wrong, he said and something for which restitution could never be made to the young boys and girls who had been wronged as a result. Many of those concerned were the children of poor people who had made big sacrifices to keep their children at school. Did they do so to have their children treated like that asked Mr Lannen. "I had my way I know what I do about such an examiner."

The Secretary said that in the examination referred to by Mr Lannen a number of candidates appeared and the results came back to the examiner. In one case 20 marks were added to a paper but no change was made in the marks.

Mr Lannen said that it was very strange that it was in a subject which a boy had failed that the marks were added. He also said that 20 marks was a big lot to have added following a re-examination.

The Secretary said that they had no control over what the examiner did.

Mr Keane said that it didn't look as if the Examiner who was able to do his job properly in the first place when he added 20 marks to a paper which he had already marked.

Mr Curran said that was an admitted incompetence on the part of the Examiner.

The Secretary pointed out that appeals were allowed in examinations by the Department of Education.

Mr Lannen—Yes but the Department of Education would not give an extra 20 marks in a subject which was failed.

Mr Dowd said that it was an extraordinary state of affairs.

Mr Lannen said that for the future they would have to do something to safeguard the interests of young boys and girls who entered for such examinations.

Senator Butler remarked that it was a grand thing for competitors at an examination to have the right of appeal.

Mr Walsh—Yes, it should be to another independent examiner not the same man.

Mr Lannen—The right of appeal that's there now only means pull and that's the right of appeal we must do away with. Where does the poor man come in he has no right of appeal and must take what he gets.

When Mr Walsh asked who the examiner was Mr Lannen said that he had brought candidates to the examination in his car.

Mr Walsh said that he would have to disagree in principle with the motion as he held that a man from outside the county was the most desirable. On the face of it it would look fishy to have a local man he said.

Mr Lannen said that there was something very wrong about the way all these examinations had been conducted. In the recent ones he said that the test papers had been taken from the same desks immediately the examination was over in all exams under the Department of Education the candidates were allowed to take the papers home. I understand said Mr Lannen that the local teachers have made a protest to the County Council in this regard. All I want he added for these young boys and girls is justice and fair play.

The Secretary said that at the recent examination the Examiner took up the question papers from the entrants after each test.

The Chairman agreed that it was wrong that a candidate should pick up as much as 20 marks from the same examiner on having a paper re-examined. He said that he had also heard after the last examination that one of the examiners in dictating for the shorthand test could not be heard behind a wet newspaper.

The Secretary said that this point had also been drawn to the Co Manager's notice and was being acted on.

The Chairman said that it was a terrible thing to bring the examiners down from Galway or some other places where the dialects can't be understood. There was a possibility as a result of all these complaints he said that the recent examination would have to be held all over again.

Mr Keane said that it was wrong that a man who sets the examination papers should also supervise the exam and mark the papers.

Mr Curran said that that was the old Irish test were done over until the next meeting and said that every effort would be made to clear up the matter of the outstanding appointments.

Mr Lannen and Mr Keane said that they would agree to this provided they got an assurance that no other panel would be formed before the next meeting.

Mr Lannen asked that the matter of filling the vacancy on the Board of Assistance Staff be also looked into.

The motions were then adjourned until next meeting.

### Treatment Of Infectious Diseases

A motion in the name of Mr H. R. Dowd calling on the Co Medical Officer to prepare a comprehensive scheme for the prevention of disease in the county and requesting that a number of non-municipal houses be built in Lismore was adopted at the next meeting following the reading of a report from Dr O'Farrell, to allow the Doctor to attend the next meeting.

Mr Quirk criticised the action of the Board of Assistance in wanting to spend the ratepayers' money in buying a big house like Glenville in Waterford while the Lismore hospital was going idle.

The following motion was next moved by Mr Lannen—That the Council considers that no money should be spent on adapting Priory House for the purpose of a clinic in view of the fact that any money so spent will leave the Council with an unsuitable building for the purposes of a clinic or dispensary.

Mr Lannen said that his reason for putting down the motion was that he understood that besides the £4,000 paid for the property it was proposed to spend a further £8,000 reconstructing it. If this was spent he said that the position would be the same as they had with the dispensary residences at Clashmore and Portlaw.

The Chairman said that he did not think he could take Mr Lannen's motion as when the house was purchased the Council had agreed to spend a certain amount to convert it.

Mr Lannen said that his motion was in order and there was nothing to stop the Council from changing their decision if they wished.

Mr R. Keane seconded the

motion said that it would be waste to spend any money on the house as it was not suitable for the purpose it was bought for. The people of Dungarvan believed it was too small he said and it was at the dead end of a very important and busy street.

Mr Walsh said that Priory House had been purchased following a majority vote of the Council and a motion to rescind this put in by Mr Lannen had been subsequently defeated. There is nothing you can do about it now he said.

Mr Lannen—Well all I can say is that this was a very swift decision.

Chairman—I think it was done very slow.

Mr Lannen—Priory House stands in the narrowest and busiest street in Dungarvan and there's no room in it for a clinic. In 4 or 5 years no matter what you do you'll find you'll have to build a new one.

Chairman—The majority of the Council voted to buy it having heard the views of the County Medical Officer that it was suitable for a clinic.

Mr Lannen—Sure a clinic should be all on one floor and that's the way they're built even in Dublin where land is scarce and dear.

Mr Walsh said that the only alternative was to build a new clinic which with a grant would cost the ratepayers of the County £4,000 and that meant a saving of £8,000 for the ratepayers and that was the reason why he voted for its purchase.

Mr Lannen said that there was very little thought of the ratepayers' money when £1,050 was spent on plans to build the clinic at the shambles which were later scrapped.

Mr Walsh said that this money would only have been lost had they not bought Priory House.

Mr Lannen—It's only throwing away money to spend it on Priory House because it will fall down in a few years. If money is spent on it you still won't have what you want.

Mr Hartly said that it would be better if the Council could sell the property for the all-in price it had cost them and he proposed an amendment to this effect.

It was seconded by Mr Kenneally.

After some discussion it was decided to put the motion to the meeting first and the voting resulted as follows—

For—Messrs Curran, Dowd, Hartly, Keane, Lannen, Fahy, O'Ryan, Kennelly, Power—9.

Against—Messrs Butler, J. K. Ryan, Foran, Ormond, Heskin, Quirk, Walsh, Flynn, Morrissey—9.

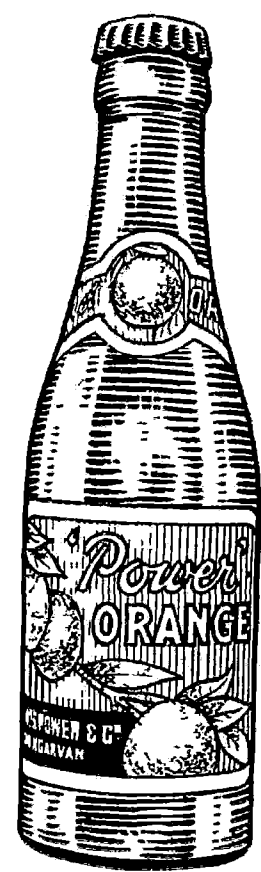
