BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT with PENSMAN

HE BROUGHT THE OBLATES TO IRELAND

On next Sunday week the 24th June the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate will celebrate the centenary of the coming of their Order to Ireland. At the Church of Mary Immaculate, Inchicore, Dublin, the High Mass will be celebrated to honour the occasion and the attendance will include Most Rev. Leo Deschatelets, Superior of the Congregation, who will travel from Rome and Most Rev. Dr. Rukey O'Malley, Archbishop of Dublin, South Africa.

Dungarvan should have a very special interest in these centenary celebrations of the Oblate Fathers as it was Dungarvan man who was instrumental in first introducing this great Order to Ireland, 100 years ago this month.

A slightly built middle-aged priest stood outside the gates of a big house near Inchicore, Dublin on a June evening in 1856. He had just bought that house which was to be the first home in Ireland of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate. Robert Cooke O.M.I. who first saw the light of day in Dungarvan on the 14th February 1821. Fr Cooke's grandmother who was a Tipperary woman was a convert and having announced Protestants at her birth-right she came to Dungarvan where she eked out a livelihood as a teacher.

The fortunes of the Cookes however must have prospered somewhat for by the time young Robert arrived, they were sufficiently affluent to have him educated in Dublin where he subsequently qualified as a doctor.

Robert Cooke practised in the medical profession for some time but following a revelation in a dream he joined the Oblates on the 26th June, 1846, and was ordained in France. When the founder of the Order, Monsignor de Mazenod sought an opportunity to establish it in Ireland Fr Cooke must have been an obvious choice and it would appear from subsequent happenings that it was indeed providential.

Arrived in Dublin in December 1855 Fr Cooke wanted to go to an hotel on the north side of the city but due to the mistake of a publican he was taken to the south side. Here he met the Prior of the Augustinian Community at John's Lane who asked him to preach a Mission Fr Cooke agreed and through Emmett Street with his wife and family Ted is attached to the Liverpool City Police in which he has been serving with distinction for a number of years past.

Also back from England for a breath of his native air was Mr Jack Hill who at present resides in London with his wife and family. Jack is elder son of Mrs Hill and the late Mr J Hill Church Street.

I was glad to see the holiday-makers looking so fit and well.

Waterford Fail To Hold Cork's Late Effort

Side-line Moves Bring Victory To Leesiders

CORK 5-9; WATERFORD 2-12

From the point of view of the thousands of Waterford supporters that made up the biggest attendance in years at Fermoy on Sunday last for the opening round of the current Munster Senior Hurling Championships when the home team had Cork as opponents, there were many things wrong the principal one being the fact that the jerseyed Rebel County men once more proved our bogey team.

Added to this was the failure of our forwards to press home their advantages especially in the first half when they could have registered many more scores the failure of the selectors to do anything to counter the moves made from the side-line by the Cork mentors and the retreating of the game by 'sub referee' G Fitzgerald (Limerick) who stood in for the officially appointed Bob Stakey (Tipperary) and who gave the impression that to get the task was a little too big for him.

It was under a broiling sun that the 18,500 spectators watched the teams line up for the game and with the sun behind them the Waterford team went off to a flying start with two quick scores within one and a half minutes. Cork came back with a goal and it looked as if the stage was being set for a typically brilliant Munster Championship set-to but while we saw some nice hurling it lacked keenness and the slack marking of both sides was the cause of many heart-aches.

It was during this period that Waterford supporters suffered disappointment after disappointment as wide admitted the forwards scored ten times—2 goals and 8 points—but for these 10 scores there were 13 wides driven during this period. Had our forwards only been moderately accurate we could have finished the first half with a very big lead which would have proved a heart break to any opposition even the lion-hearted Corkmans.

If any match was ever won on the side-line by Cork it was this one as there is not a shadow of doubt but the introduction of midfielder Gerard Murphy after the change-over and the transfer of Willie John Daly to centre half-back were vital factors in the ultimate victory of the Leesiders. Up to this Tom Cheasty was having the better of exchanges on the '40' yards mark against Cork's McCarthy while John Kelly back to his best 1949 form started at mid-field and held the pull for the Daise team over the Cork combination of Finn and Twomey.

Although scores were level five times during the hour Cork never got to the front until the game was 50 minutes old when in the 20th minute of the second half Ryan goaled to put them two points ahead. Somehow or other it became immediately apparent that this was the death-blow to Waterford hopes and that the Daise men would not come back. This was followed by a goal which went all the way untouched from Ring's hurley to the goal following which what can only be called a very doubtful foul which the cute Corkman helped in no small way to engineer himself 30 yards out.

Dungarvan U.D.C. £30,000 Overdraft For S.D.A. Housing Loans

Traditional Musical Festival For Dungarvan

The fortnightly meeting of the above was held at the Town Hall on last Friday night. Mr T A. Kyne, Chairman, presiding.

Housing Loans
With reference to the position of applicants for loans from the Council for the erection of houses under the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts the Town Clerk Mr E Deery read the following letter received by the Chairman Mr Kyne from Mr D Spring Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Local Government.

With further reference to your recent representations in connection with the application of the Dungarvan U.D.C. for a loan of £30,000 for the purposes of the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts the loan was recommended to the Commissioners of Public Works on 29th February for issue from the Local Loans Fund and I am awaiting the decision of the Minister for Finance in the matter. Pending availability of the loan I will be prepared in the normal way to approve of borrowing by way of temporary overdraft should the Council so desire.

The Town Clerk said that there were six applications which were held up pending receipt of this letter by the Chairman he said that he understood that some of the applicants were in urgent need of money.

Mr D Moloney said that it was the duty of the Council to deal with people who were building their own houses by providing the necessary money for them.

The Town Clerk told Mr Moloney that the rate of interest which would be charged by the Bank on the overdraft would be lower than that of the Local Loans Fund.

Mr Moloney then proposed and Mr N Kelly seconded a resolution unanimously passed that an overdraft of £30,000 be raised subject to the sanction of the Department.

Musical Festival For Dungarvan
A deputation from the Dungarvan Branch of Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Na h-Eireann Dr K McCann, Messrs L Comerford, J. Fisher, and J Tobin came before the meeting to ask for the Council's support of their application for the holding of the All-Ireland Festival in Dungarvan during the Whit Week-end of 1956.


Mr Comerford said that this year's Festival had been held at Ennis and in three days an estimated 15,000 visitors had spent £50,000 in the town. The next year's festival would be fixed at a Convention at Longford on Sunday and they thought their application would be strengthened if they could have the backing of the Urban Council.

What had appeared in the 'Cork Examiner' that the festival had already been fixed for Dungarvan was not true he said.

Mr Moloney stated that if what the deputation said was true added that the Council should back their case to the fullest and wished them every success.

COMHALTAS CEOLTOIRI EIREANN
Annual Convention Held At Longford

There was a large and representative attendance of delegates from the various branches throughout the country of Comhaltas Ceoltoiri held at Longford on Sunday last. Welcoming the delegates An Docteur C O Ceallachain Vice-Chairman apologised for the absence through illness of Eamonn O'Sullivan O.S. and reviewed the five years working of the Comhaltas which he said had gone through a small beginnings to strength. This was the most successful year yet. The Fleadh Ceol which had been held this year at Ennis had been an outstanding event culturally, socially and financially and was a headline for all future years.
