PATTERN DAY ON A COUNTY WATERFORD HILLSIDE
St Declan's Well, Toor
(By J. J. McGrath)

Pattern week was already in full swing in Ardmore. The traditional feast that goes back to the very early ages had once again made its annual advent to the scenes of labour of one of Ireland's great and pious saints—St Declan—whose feast is celebrated yearly in Ardmore on July 24th.

The name of St. Declan and his connection with the Dysert hillside the oratory and holy Well are known far and wide and with the imagination of the same in the minds of our Irish exiles need no further introduction. A connecting link between Pattern Week at Ardmore and Clashmore area is my privilege to write on in this short article.

On Thursday July 26th, on my return from a visit to the holy Well at Ardmore I was asked by a friend of mine if I would like to come for a day to St. Declan's Well at Toor.

The kind offer I gladly accepted and thus turning our backs to the sea and the ocean and to the Dysert hillside we were journeying westwards to another sacred hillside which contained a holy well connected with Saint Declan and as it was August Pattern Day in Ardmore I was asked to write on in this short article.

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THE TWO HOSTINGS AT DUNGARVAN
The first hosting took place at Dungarvan on June 1st 1867, the second one will take place on Sunday next August 12th at the venue again being Dungarvan. Between these two hostings there is a very intimate and enduring link.

The first hosting was on that June day when English Cavalry and police swept through the streets of Dungarvan en route to Helvick Head, in search of the Fenian leaders who had landed there from the brigantine "Erin's Hope". The streets of Dungarvan were agog with excitement on that day as the people rushed around talking excitedly to one another about the sensational news that the Fenians from America had landed. Members of the Fenian Organization in Dungarvan were quickly contacting each other in order to intercept their brothers from America. The roads were left to the English Cavalry and Police. At night fall after that exciting day groups of the Fenians were escorted across into Dungarvan to be secretly housed there and sheltered from the prying eyes of the enemy. Such was the first taking place in Dungarvan on Sunday next August 12th.

The second big hosting connected with the first takes place in Dungarvan on Sunday next August 12th when the Fenians who sailed in the "Erin's Hope" will be remembered there. On that day crowds will muster together at the Gaelic Field, Dungarvan to witness the senior football match between Mount Sion and Kilrossanty for the "Erin's Hope" Fenian Memorial Cup. The proceeds from which will go towards the erection of a fitting memorial at Helvick to honour the gallant Fenians who landed there. Mayor Gallagher of Waterford has presented this cup for the match and eighteen matches. Two bands will be present at the fixture and the large attendance is anticipated. This second hosting in Dungarvan linking up 1867 with 1956 is surely a splendid effort to pay back the debt of gratitude due by us to the Fenians who sailed in the "Erin's Hope".

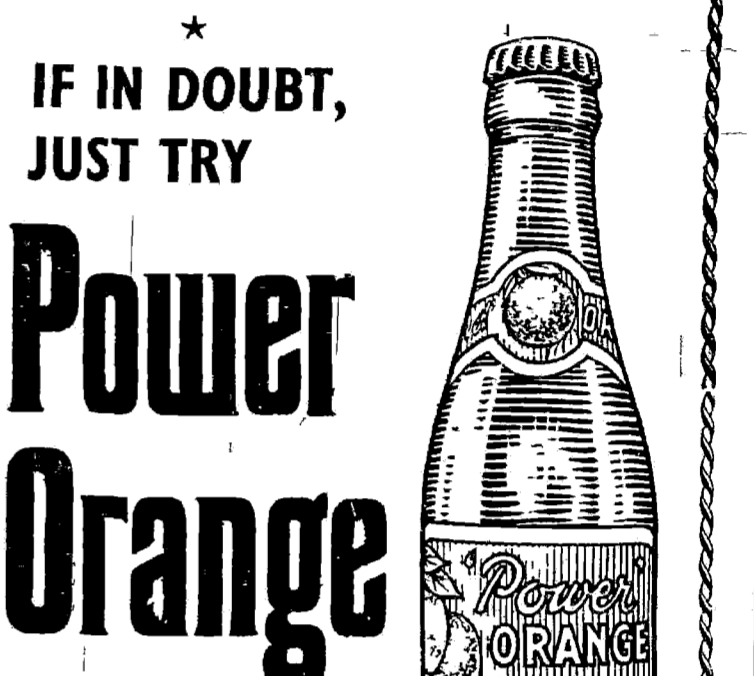

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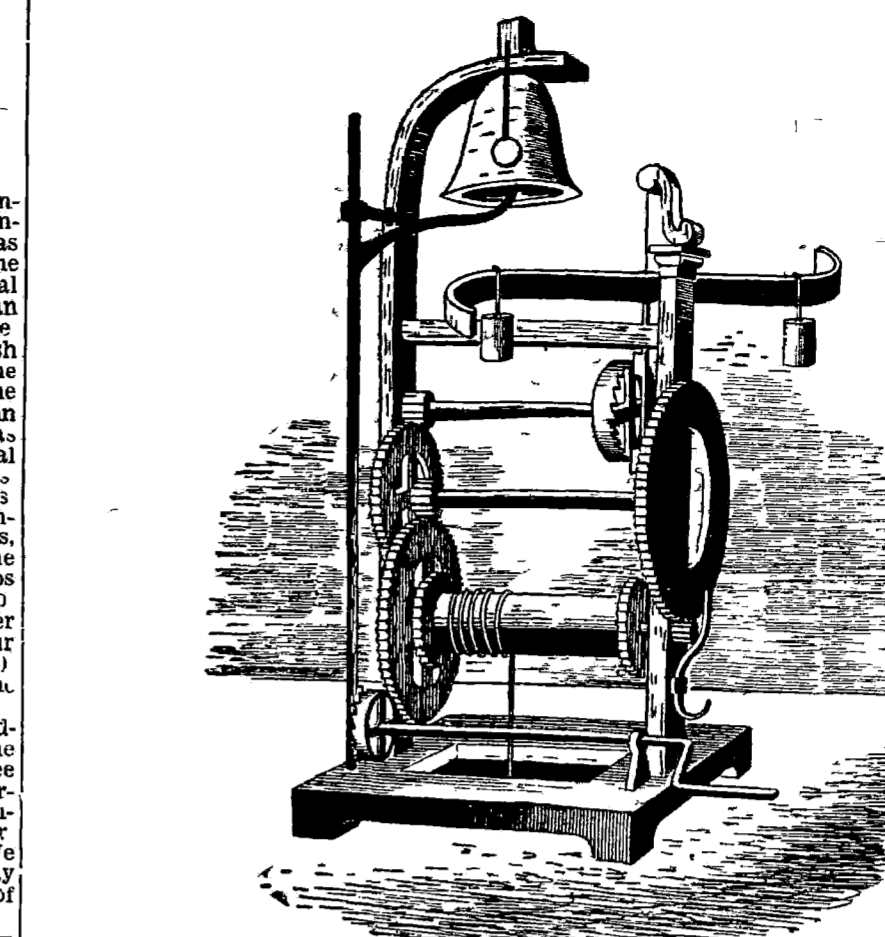
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Verge and Foliot
