**LISMORE GIRL GETS VOCATIONAL SCHOOL APPOINTMENT**  
At a special meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dun garvan on Tuesday evening last Miss Joan O'Donoghue (20) Lismore was appointed to the position of permanent whole time teacher of Irish and Continuation Subjects under the Committee.

Miss O'Donoghue's qualifications were B Comm 1st Hons Teastas Tímhre Gaeilge. There were three other applicants: Mary Curtin (23) Limerick Philip Foley (68) Dun garvan and Patrick Mulkerins (26) Carraroe.

In reply to Mr Norman Walsh the C.E.O. Mr D Cullinan said that only two of the applicants Miss O'Donoghue and Mr Mulkerins were qualified for the position.

Mr Walsh in that case as Miss O'Donoghue is the only qualified local applicant I propose that she be appointed. Mr T O'Faolain asked: "Why is it that the other two applicants are not qualified?" The C.E.O. replied that Miss Curtin had not got the Teastas Tímhre Gaeilge as required and Mr Foley was disqualified under the age limit which allowed 40 years as the upward limit in such appointments.

**G.A.A. Senior Hurling Abbeyside Challenge Fails**  
Mt. Sion Again Qualify For Final

**Mount Sion 6-10; Abbeyside 5-2**  
The large following of Abbeyside supporters who travelled to the Gaelic Field Waterford on Sunday last with a view to seeing a quick succession and again disappointed that champions Mount Sion proved supreme to every challenge. The village hurlers put up to them this was the sides seventh meeting in recent years and on every occasion the City team proved too good for the Western men. However despite this Abbeyside travelled in strength on Sunday July confident that on this occasion victory would be theirs but once again Mount Sion proved worthy champions and having taken all Abbeyside had to hand out they came back to win comfortably.

Mount Sion with the breeze and sun behind them were playing into the city goal and the defence rolled back the attack and an offensive started at the other end. It looked as if the stage was being set for a titanic struggle with the teams just probing for weaknesses. Eight minutes of play had elapsed before the first score came a point for Mount Sion and then inside of a couple of minutes three more white flags were raised by the Monastery forwards. With traffic going practically all one way for the next quarter of an hour the champions ran up a score of 2-6 without reply from Abbeyside. The city boys were patient to their usual winning pattern while the Village team just looked on and again and again without a play. It was not until two minutes from the end that the visitors pierced the Mount Sion defence to register their only score in this half.

Things certainly looked blue for Abbeyside and from the spectators point of view the match was as good as over and when Mount Sion had an early point on resuming this opinion appeared to be confirmed. But then Johnny O'Connor pointed the end of the ball deep into a goal which was only four goals to reduce the margin to but a single point. Mount Sion were on the run at this stage and Abbeyside followers were just looking on sweetly savouring a victory but it was only temporary as Seamus Power playing a true captain's part led the counter-attack which broke the Abbeyside offensive and brought the Mount Sion sharp snooty again stretch the lead to a comfortable winning margin.

**Outstanding Players**  
Most outstanding player for Abbeyside was full-back Austin Flynn closely followed by his left flank, William Dom Enright. Johnny O'Connor after a very faulty first-half showed some of his old dash and form in the second moiety especially in the third quarter when he was as good as over and Abbeyside staging an all-out attack in the forward line. Donal Whelan John Clancy and the diminutive Hogan, as well as Brown, who came on in the 2nd half were best. Liam Whelan in goal had an unhappy game and the ball did not run for him and while N McGovern played a good game he had the big task of marking the Mount sharp snooty Frank Walsh. It was from along this right flank that most of the Mount Sion scores came. The centre-half pair of P Clancy and P Whelan were not able to control Flannely and Seamus Power, while Riordan and McCarthy in the forward line gave disappointing displays.

Most improved hurler on the field was Mount Sion's Mick Keane who had a gossamer game while their goalkeeper Roche proved too quick for even the bullet drives of Donal Whelan and brought of some "miracle" saves. Walsh Flannely and Power were also prominent with Gunan, Keane and Gallagher proving an ever-busy inside forward line.

**HOARDING AT GRATTAN SQUARE**  
Council Adjourns Matter For Two Months  
Mr T. K. Byrne T.D. Chairman presided at the usual fortnightly meeting of the Dun garvan Urban Council held on last Friday night.  
Arising from a decision at the last meeting that the hoarding at the corner of Grattan Square be taken down the Acting Town Clerk Mr M O'Meara read the following correspondence:—  
**Has Become More Dangerous**  
The Town Engineer reported as follows:—  
Permission to erect the hoarding around the premises was given on the understanding that reconstruction would commence after a comparatively short period. Since then however 15 months have passed by and there still appears to be no immediate prospect of carrying out the proposed work even though plans for this have been submitted and approved. The date of approval is the 11th June 1956. On the 21st May 1956 I reported that this building was dangerous. Since then it has become more dangerous and if the hoarding is removed there will be definite danger of serious accident to anyone using the footpath. Hence it is imperative that the building be either demolished or reconstructed without delay.  
**Council Have Power To Demolish**  
The Council's Legal Advisers Messrs Farrell & Morrissey wrote:—  
With reference to the premises of Messrs Good Bros at Grattan Square Dun garvan we find that we already advised you on this matter by letter on the 24th Nov 1955. In view of the report as to the condition of the building of the Borough Surveyor it is quite clear that the Council have power after serving notices as required by the Acts to remove the building themselves recovering the cost of same from the owners. This power is given to the Council by Section 30 of the Public Health Act (Amendment) Act 1907. If the Council give the necessary authority we shall proceed with the matter of serving the necessary notices immediately.
