CRASHED COMING FROM CRICKET GAME

Lismore Man Before Dungarvan Court

An outing by members of Lismore Cricket Club to Tramore on Sunday 8th July was referred to at Dungarvan District Court before Mr. L. B. Skinner...

The owner of the car Robert Wilson Ballinrusk, Kilworth Co. Cork was similarly charged. Supt P. Flanagan who prosecuted said that the charges were made on the basis of a witness statement...

The witness statement stated that the car had been driven to the place where it crashed on Monday morning 9th July, when the party were on their way home from Tramore.

Garda J. Griffin stated in evidence that when he visited Ballycove at 8 a.m. on the morning in question he found the car badly damaged crashed against the wall. The driver was Patrick Feeney and he later took a statement from him at the Dungarvan District Hospital.

The statement stated that they had hired the car from Mr. Baum for 24 hours and drove to Tramore to play a cricket match. They left to come home around 3 a.m. and he never knew what happened until he woke up in hospital where he had got 5 stitches in his temple and 3 on his knee.

Mr. J. W. O'Gorman, Solr. for Feeney said that the position was that his clients had hired the car in good faith and thought everything was in order. He agreed that he would be liable in the case of the charges against Feeney.

The Justice refused this request and said that until such time as a certificate of insurance had been provided Feeney was guilty as the driver of the car.

Mr. J. Roche Solr. for Wilson said that no evidence to sustain the charges against his client had been produced.

The Superintendent said that the only evidence against him was his own statement.

Mr. Roche at first objected to this statement being taken as evidence but later agreed.

The statement said that Wilson had been employed by Mr. Baum at Lismore Hotel at the time. On the 7th July Baum asked him to hire out his car and he refused. Later Baum asked him again and this time he agreed to provide the car.

He was involved in no risks about insurance or otherwise. He was told the following day that there had been an accident.

Noted innocently Mr. Roche said that his client did not hire his car but had lent it to Baum to hire it.

The Justice said that it appeared that both parties had acted innocently in the matter.

Matthew Gough in evidence said that he was treated as the driver of the car on the 7th July he hired a car from Mr. Baum Lismore Hotel, to take members of the Club to Tramore on the following day.

He paid the usual deposit of £5 and took it that the car would be properly taxed and insured.

Patrick Feeney the defendant, said that when he took delivery of the car on Sunday morning he raised no question about the place of insurance either.

The Justice said that there definitely had been an offence and he said that this should be a warning to people who hire self-drive cars to check up before using them and seeing that everything was in order.

He fined both defendants £1 each on the insurance charges and applied the P.O.A. in the case of the tax charges.

WORK FOR THE BLIND OF IRELAND

Mr. Eric W. Page former chief placement officer of the Royal National Institute for the Blind, London has taken up duty on Friday night October 5th in Ireland. He will work for the Irish Department of Social Welfare in co-operation with the voluntary bodies catering for the blind.

Those Idle Acres

By James Joyce, B Agr Sc The Land Rehabilitation Scheme has given considerable impetus to the recovery of waste land of which there is either a large or a small amount attached to practically all farms in Co. Carlow. The progress made in this direction has been very good. In some cases almost half the farm had to be reclaimed from a wet boggy condition. There still remains a big acreage to be reclaimed.

The subsequent use and development of this land is of considerable interest. The final operation carried out under the scheme is the application of lime and phosphates to the reclaimed land. The farmer is then left to carry on by himself the utilisation of the land to the following three main headings:

- (1) Land grazed without further attention. (2) Surface rejuvenation by pitch-pole cutting and spraying of lime and phosphate. (3) Starting straightaway by ploughing and grubbing.

Simply grazing the land without further attention (No 1) would scarcely justify the high cost of intensive peat drainage. The return per acre would be very small, particularly with the present recession in the livestock trade. It is doubtful if the farmer would be justified in having the land drained and utilised in this manner. In some cases the farmer thought that the reclaimed area could be economically ploughed. Here the surface mat of herbage was burned on the first available opportunity. The surface may then be pitch-pole harrowed and a heavy dressing of Basic Slag applied. The usual rate is 5 to 8 cwt of slag per acre. This treatment encourages natural white clover and a fairly good sod is produced. The application of factory lime in some instances gave a wonderful improvement in this type of soil. Where sufficient soil was brought to the surface by pitch pole a light dressing of grass seeds was sown and rolled in during a damp period. The grass seeds germinated fairly well - the output of the land was greatly increased by this treatment.

On most reclaimed jobs immediate ploughing and grubbing has proved very successful even on the most uninviting type of land. The single furrow tractor plough cutting a 14" sod has given most satisfactory results. This sod must be completely turned over and rolled down with a heavy roller before it dries out thus giving a very firm seed bed. The area ploughed during the day should be rolled in the evening. About 10 to 14 acres per day would be a reasonable output for this work.

The lime if required is then applied. On some quite acid farms the reclaimed area proved to be quite high in lime. Experience of the past few years has shown wheat to be one of the most suitable crops for growing on this type of land and the yields obtained have been very high. It is usually too heavy for barley and oats may lodge.

The growing of a root crop on this type of land is unwise until the sod has rotted down somewhat. Furthermore, when the land had been ploughed as described above, the sod should not be brought up again until it has decayed - a process which may take two years. The most suitable implement for preparing the land is undoubtedly the disc harrow. Four or five runs of this implement will leave the land ready for sowing wheat. The wheat is now sown and treated in the ordinary way but it must be rolled two or three times to keep the ground firm. The land should then be under-sown with a suitable grass mixture and left in grass for the period advised.

Direct re-seeding was also carried out in some cases but the quick cash return of a wheat crop is now proving more attractive. The intensive cropping of reclaimed land right from the start has proved of further benefit. The root system of grass or cereal plant growing vigorously open up the impervious sub-soil of newly reclaimed land and permits of freer draining soil.

Has this aspect of drainage been fully considered? Would a less intensive and a consequently cheaper drainage system that already practised do just as good a job of time and system of grass or cereal plant roots were allowed to play their part? Recent evidence points to the advisability of this line of approach at least in an investigative level in certain soil types. Subsoiling too could undoubtedly be more widely practised.

My mother worked those words upon a sampler when she was thirteen years of age, and the sampler still hangs framed upon the wall of her living room. 'To be honest to be kind - to earn a little and to spend a little less - to make upon the whole a family happier for your presence - to renounce when that shall be necessary - and not to be embittered - to keep a few friends but these without captivation.'

Delightful is it not? A worthwhile way of living - something to set up before us as a standard as we travel on our way. There are different kinds of opportunities. An opportunity to 'get back', as someone who has injured one in some way, or an opportunity to help souls of fire upon that person's head by rescuing him from some difficult situation. Because most of us are not philanthropically inclined we are more tempted to grasp the first opportunity than the second one. It helps so much to remember those words on the sampler doesn't it, and to grasp their full significance of water is not little back to remedy a mistake. However remorseful one may be '... For I shall not pass this way again.'
