**EXPRESS DELIVERY**  
 The postal delivery service sometimes surpasses itself but I think it would be hard to beat its latest effort when it took almost three days to deliver a letter over a direct run a distance of fifteen miles. This is something I know of at first hand because it happened here at the Leader Office.

Readers especially from the Lismore district of a certainty noticed that we had to go to Press last week without our usual news service from that area. The reason only became apparent on last Friday morning when the envelope containing our Lismore Correspondent's copy was delivered by the postman—a day late for publication. We wondered what could have happened and examined the only evidence we had—the envelope itself. The date stamp franked on it clearly indicated that it was posted in Lismore in time for the 5.15 p.m. collection on the previous Tuesday evening. By all the rules it should have been delivered in Dungarvan on the following day—Wednesday—either allowing for a sorting mistake, at the latest on the day after that again Thursday. But it did not turn up until Friday morning and the delay was where was it for the three days.

Naturally the matter was the subject of an official complaint lodged with the Postmaster in Dungarvan and he courteously took all the details but I know there is very little he can do and that the best we can expect is a stereotyped letter "A car...fuarthas do litir, etc. in reply to this matter just to let the people know what did happen to our Lismore and District Notes last week as we'll have to let the person as guilty conscience, as more than likely we will never find out who it was.

**SORRY FOR YOUR TROUBLE**  
 It is not my custom to refer to international affairs in this column but the events in Europe and Egypt last week call for strong condemnations.

In Europe the brave people of Hungary after a decade under the iron heel of the Russians rose up and succeeded in gaining a measure of independence. They told the world in no uncertain terms that they wanted to put an end to Soviet domination and called on the Powers of the free Western World to help them.

Daily we read the papers and listened to the radios to learn the latest news. Russians promised to withdraw their forces and "talks" were going on between them and the Hungarians, when a full scale attack by air and land forces was mounted against the Hungarians in the early hours of Sunday morning. The country was once again turned into a blood-bath by the Russians and no help came from the West. The cloak of darkness was again hung over it after only a few days freedom.

In Egypt—England France and Israel declared war on Egypt and again the policy of aggression manifested itself. My only reason for referring to these matters is to point to the futility and uselessness of the United Nations Organisation. Sympathy was voted by it to Hungary and Egypt—the policies of aggression were condemned but nothing was done beyond that. It was a case of "we're sorry for your trouble but we can't (or dare not) do anything to help." How much

does Ireland's permanent representative at the headquarters of this debating society cost I wonder.

**SHOWMAN'S DEATH**  
 It was with regret that I read last week of the death of John Duffy which occurred suddenly at the great Circus' usual winter headquarters at Dunmarway. With his younger brother James John was co-proprietor of the famous Duffy's Circus which was founded by their grandfather the original John Duffy in 1875. Every year since then they have toured Ireland without a break even through the years of the first and second World Wars and this constitutes a unique record.

The late John Duffy was a comparatively young man his sudden demise taking place on the day before his 55th birthday.

To his bereaved wife, son and daughters I offer sincere sympathy in their sorrow.

**DUPLICATION**  
 According to the daily press reports 20 organisations opposed the application of Messrs. Prices Advisory Body for an increase in the price of phosphate manure. The application was dealt with at Griffith Barracks, Dublin, on last Friday.

Among the opposition organisations representing farmers, interests were the NFA, ICMSA, BGA, Council of Committees of Agriculture and 10 independent Committees of Agriculture—a total of 14 altogether. Among the latter were the Chairman and CAO of the County Waterford Committee.

As I have stated before and I say it again now it would seem that there is more than duplication in the way this thing was done. I think that the Prices Advisory Body could have got all the material necessary to the question of opposition from the NFA which is an organisation representing (very ably), on a non-political basis the farming interests of the entire country. There was no need for the Waterford Committee of Agriculture to send representatives at the ratemakers expense on this trip to Dublin.

I note that the Council of Committees of Agriculture was also represented there. The majority of the members of the Waterford Committee have agreed that this is a completely useless body but decision to withdraw from membership of it was deferred at the last meeting until the views of the Chairman were obtained. I hope that the Committee will decide, no matter what these are, to put their decision to withdraw into effect at the next meeting.

**LICENSED PREMISES GUTTED**  
**Early Morning Blaze At Abbeyside**

In the early hours of last Tuesday morning the residential licensed premises of Mr J Nolan at Sexton Street Abbeyside was completely gutted in a disastrous fire outbreak. The flames destroyed the entire building and all its contents including the personal belongings and furniture of Mr Nolan his wife and young daughter.

We saved nothing" Mr Nolan told a Leader reporter who interviewed him on Tuesday afternoon. He said the charred and blackened remains of the previously well-known corner house.

Mr Nolan stated that he was awakened by the smell of smoke around 2.30 a.m. and immediately suspected something was wrong. He got up and found that the licensed portion of the premises on the ground floor was then well ablaze. He saw his wife and daughter and got them to safety but due to the rapidity with which the flames engulfed the building he was unable to return to the phone in the soap to call the fire brigade. He managed to awaken a neighbour from whose house he phoned for the brigade and within a matter of minutes the firemen were on the job.

Despite their efforts the premises was completely burned out but they did stop the flames from spreading to adjoining properties.

Mr Nolan and his family have the deepest sympathy of all their neighbours and friends for the very heavy material loss they have sustained.

**Bord Fáilte Post For Cappoquin Man**

Mr Liam Ryan Managing Director of the Grand Hotel Ramore has been appointed to the vacant post of Hotel Services Officer. He will take up duty early in December.

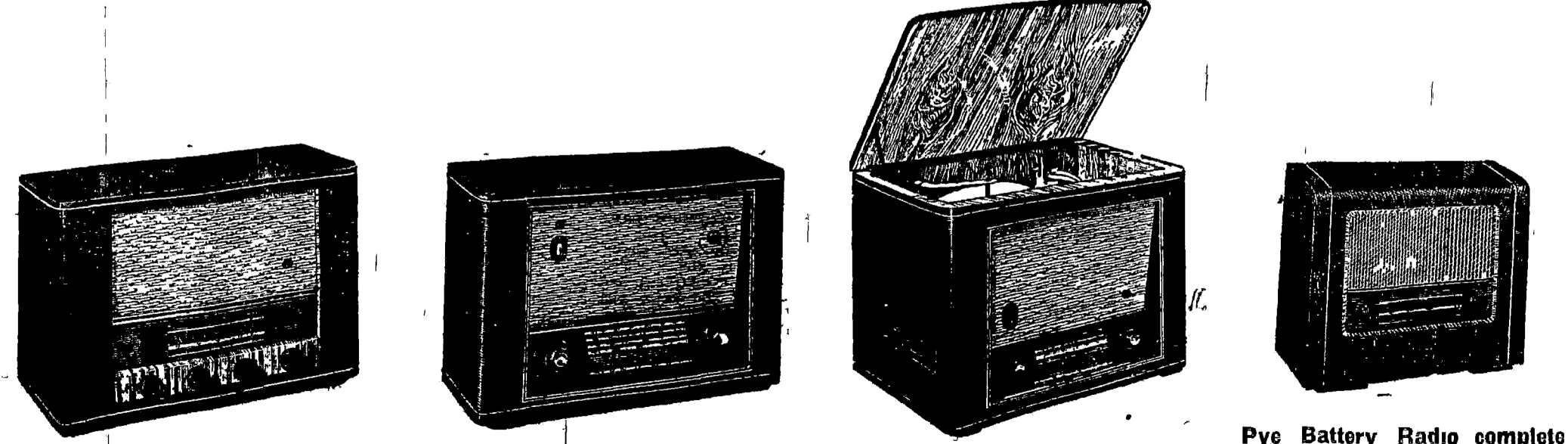
