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BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT with PENSMAN

THE PIRATES ARE COMING

Dungarvan is due to be invaded on next Sunday night when zero hour for the occupation of the Friary Hall by the Pirates of Ballymacarby is 8.30. Rest assured, however that everything will be orderly and if not peaceful it will be musical, for these pirates are not of the blood-thirsty variety but boys and girls from the history barony of Glenahiry who will come to sing and act in the new and original three-act musical comedy of that name. The music and script have been the work of Rev Joseph Bracken C.C. who has always shown a wonderful love of music and has spared no efforts to popularise that appreciation among the people of the parishes he has laboured. The plot is an amusing one and the story dealing with Rural Electrification is most topical. The dramatic persons include names which have been part and parcel of the Ballymacarby and Nire districts for generations—Mulcahy, Desmonds, Ryans, Murrays, McCarthys, Connollys, Butler, O'Flynn, Nugent and others. The entire performance is a colourful and polished one and one that is well worth seeing.

PRESS HAS STATUTORY RIGHT TO ATTEND MEETINGS

A discussion was initiated at last Friday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council by a member who inquired what powers the Council has to control Press reports. This member gave it as his reason for raising the matter, that he had been misquoted by a certain section of the Press but in trying to gain momentum for his attack, he made little or no mention of what he claims he was misquoted on. Personally, I don't believe that the member was misquoted at all but it is always a good way of getting out of any awkward situation to say in general terms "this is not actually what I said. However the facts speak for themselves." It has been asserted that at meetings of Local Authorities the Press have no right to be present at all—save at the will of the Authority concerned and on the sufferance of each member. If such a position were correct one could only compare it with the status of a child at a conference of grown-ups, an elder has to refer to the by-laws to them and they must scatter!

I do not subscribe to this view and legal opinion that I have perused does not agree with it either. This opinion states that the Press in this country has a statutory right to attend meetings of local authorities and that opinion is based on section 15 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1902. This says: "No resolution of any council, board or commissioners to exclude from its meetings representatives of the Press shall be valid unless sanctioned by the Minister for Local Government in pursuance of by-laws which the Minister for Local Government is hereby empowered to frame regulating the admission of the Press to such meetings."

A note on this section in Street's "The Law Relating to Local Government (1935)" refers to "Vanston's Local Government Act 1902" and this refers to the by-laws made governing the admission of the Press. This order made on the 9th February 1902 states: "We the Local Government Board of Ireland in exercise of the powers vested in us by the said Section and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf do hereby order and direct that the following provisions shall take effect as by-laws for regulating the admission of the representatives of the Press to meetings of councils, boards and commissioners."

1) Subject as is hereinafter mentioned any person who desires to attend a meeting of any council, board or commissioners as representative of the Press and who is otherwise entitled to admission shall be admitted to such meeting on producing a document which is signed by the Proprietor, Editor or a newspaper or journal which he claims to represent, stating that he, the said person so desiring admission is the representative of such newspaper or journal.

The information was contained in an opinion from Mr. A. R. Farrell Solicitor, Legal Adviser to the Council which was read to the Council by Mr. O. Meara Acting Town Clerk. The opinion added that the only circumstances under which the Council would be released from its obligation was by mutual agreement between the parties and with the sanction of the Minister.

TRAGIC END FOR MUCH TRAVELLED JOURNALIST

The cold waters of the river Liffey still bear the secret of the tragic deaths of Mr and Mrs Jack Smith, Landscape Park Rathgar Dublin who lost their young lives when the car in which they were travelling went over the quay wall into the river on Saturday night, 1st December. Jack Smith 38 year old Galway man was Managing Editor of the Irish Press Group's War correspondent during World War II and covered many major battles including the battle of Anheim into which he was parachuted. Later he covered the war in the East and was one of the first correspondents to enter the ravaged Japanese city of Nagasaki after it had been hit by an atom bomb. He was Editor of the "Waterford Star" for a number of years from 1948 and then went to Dublin where he worked with the Irish News Agency before joining the Irish Press Group. During his stay in Waterford the late Jack Smith became very popular, both in the city and in many parts of the county and his death and that of his young wife was the cause of much regret. I knew him as an unassuming colleague who proved most helpful and in common with his many friends and acquaintances from this side of the country I join in tendering deepest sympathy to those bereaved by the very sad and tragic occurrence.

G.A.A. 28th Annual Convention Of West Waterford Divisional Board

Mr J. Moloney N.T. (outgoing Chairman) presided at the 28th Annual Convention of the West Waterford G.A.A. held last Sunday at that grand eleven-year-old Muntrir na Fire building, St. Michael's Hall, Ballyduff. A total number of 83 voting delegates attended which showed a big drop from last year's high figure of 106 at the Rinn venue. Mr M. Feeney N.T. (Ballyduff) speaking in Irish welcomed on behalf of the Ballyduff Muntrir na Fire and the Ballyduff and Mocollop Hurling and Football Clubs, the delegates to the last outpost of the Deltic near the Cork border adding they were honoured at having the Convention held there. Secretary's Report The Secretary Mr D. O'Sullivan submitted the following report: Our affiliations were the same as last year—62 Clubs Our Championships were carried out in an orderly manner, and incidents were few. The Board has had another successful year and our Championships finished in good time. The final of the Shield has been held over till after the Convention but will be finished before the Christmas holidays. I again appeal to all Clubs to cooperate with the Board and to have this year's Championships finished as early as possible this year. Our Junior Hurling Championship was played in a great sporting spirit, and we only had one objection to mar an otherwise grand competition. We had some very close and exciting games before the eventual winners were declared. The Geraldines v Shamrocks Geraldines v Lismore, St. Garvan's v Brackens Rangers were the pick of the earlier rounds and our final was one of the best junior hurling games for a long time. St. Garvan's and Geraldines gave us a fine exhibition of hurling before the final. The Board would like to congratulate the winners and to wish them every success. The Junior Football Championship was marred with objections and appeals and these helped to drag out our competition. However, it was finished in a fairly good time thanks to the co-operation of the Clubs. Stradbally won the Western title but had to give to De La Salle in the final. We wish them better luck the next time they are in the Championships and so do away with the delay of objections among the Clubs. The Minor Hurling Championship was won by Bride Valley Rovers and I am sure it will do a lot of good to see a team from that great stronghold of Gaelic sports back into its own in the Division. The Minor Football title was retained by Rinn o gCuanac for the third year in succession and they were unlucky to lose in the County Final. St. Garvan's won the Shield Competition from Tallow. I wish to congratulate the Avonmore Juvenile committee on the excellent work they are doing for hurling in the Lismore Area also the Abbeyside Juvenile Hurling Committee and the Dungarvan Juvenile Football Committee for the fostering of Gaelic games among the youth of West Waterford. Congratulations to the County senior hurlers on their good showing in the present National League.

"THE TWO MRS. CARROLLS"

The Dungarvan Dramatic Club which has been providing the people of the town and country with amateur theatricals of the highest calibre for many years presented Martin Vale's "The Two Mrs. Carrolls" for its thirtieth production for four nights last week at the Friary Hall. The play itself has a slow first act and it was not until the opening scene of Act II that the tempo increased and with it the interest of the audience. From there on until the climax it was excellently handled. Just in the case of Feg O'My Heart this latest production was a personal triumph for Margaret Burke who played the difficult part of Sally Carroll in a really excellent fashion, while Maurine Church in the role of the French maid Clemence showed perfect understanding and acted in a wonderfully convincing manner. William McGrath as Punnington was natural and at ease throughout and his lines were well spoken and perfectly audible in the hall. Rita Winters in the part of Cecily Harden—the other woman—was excellent and was always well supported by Eunice Hockin who took the part of Mrs Latham in her usual capable way. Michael Cullinan who was co-producer of the play with Michael O'Hara played the villain of the piece Geoffrey Carroll in a very satisfying manner. In the part of Dr Tuttle he had James O'Keefe who performed in the inimitable O'Keefe fashion while Betty O'Neill as Harriet Carroll showed that she has lost none of the polish she has displayed in so many previous exacting roles. Special mention must be made of the stage setting and lighting and those responsible for it Patrick O'Murphy, Jessie Coward, Michael O'Hara and Liam Comerford while John Kennedy and Bernard Walsh made a good job of the effects. I noted from the programme that the painter in the set were the work of Michael Cullinan. Before concluding I would say at the risk of being branded puritanical that the choice of this play was rather an unsuitable one from the point of view of the audience.

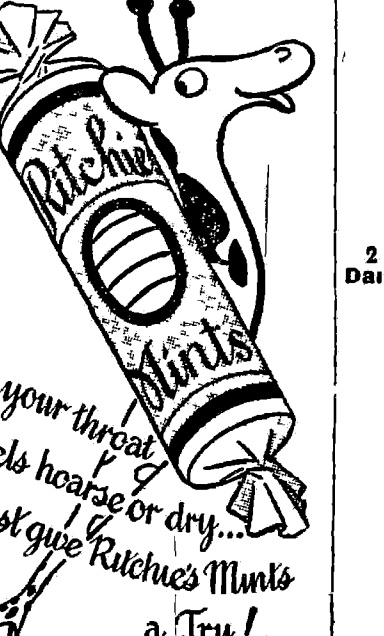

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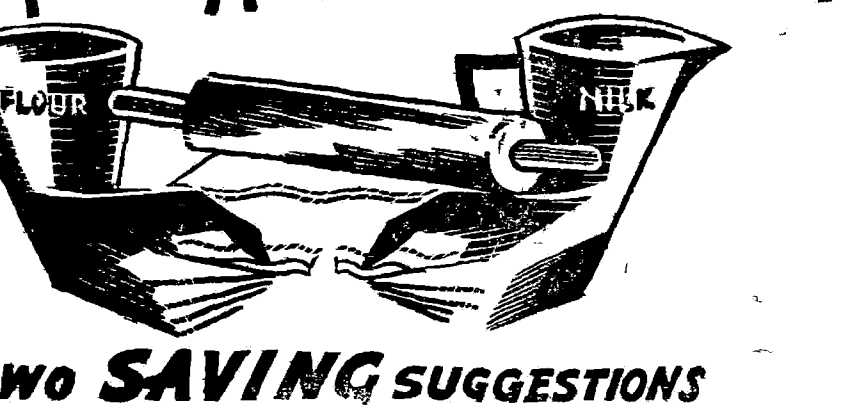
