 I have been informed that references about the allocation of boats under the Gaeltacht Scheme to Helwick were made elsewhere recently and in order to give the true picture I quote the following up-to-date facts. The people of Helwick have not been consulted in the scheme under which it is allocated a new boat brought into being during the life-time of the present Government. The scheme is an other scheme still operating under which An Bord Iascaigh Mhara made boats and gear available to approved applicants who were prepared to put up an initial payment of 10% of the total cost (about £8,000). The new scheme for fishermen living in the Gaeltacht who spoke Irish as their ordinary language are to be dispensed with this 10% down payment and for that reason it became most popular with all fishermen who qualified. NOTICE TO BEET GROWERS

The Irish Sugar Beet Growers' Association is not satisfied with the terms of the new Sugar Beet Contract for the Season 1957/58. This contract was issued about the heads of the Growers' representatives and without their prior agreement.

The effect of the contract to Growers who consume their own dry pulp is to grow beet at 7 1/2 per ton less than in previous years relative to agreed established costs of production.

The Association, under the circumstances, cannot take it on themselves to recommend to their Growers to sign a contract under such an imposition. This highly handed action on the part of the Company is wholeheartedly condemned and makes no contribution to the cause of increased production, which it claims to foster.

The inaccuracies in the published advertisements of the Company will be self evident to Growers. The Association will continue as long as is necessary to fight for justice in the Growers' interests. In issuing this statement, the Association have fully in mind the consequences of a reduced beet acreage to the National Economy. We ask the Sugar Company if they are equally conscious of the wider issues.

Field Now Let—Last week we reported that the field adjoining the Park Road housing site had not been let on an advertised. Well the field has now been let and we are glad to see that the Council has availed of this source of income, small though it may be.

Call for Increased Wheat Price Waterford County Committee of Agriculture at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan on Saturday last unanimously decided to ask the Minister for Agriculture to increase the price of wheat for 1957 by 10% on the 1954 price but to allow the existing grading system to stand.

Criticising the price fixed Mr W. Dowd said that it would be very little which to the advantage of the farmer. The average bushel 64 and Mr N Walsh said that last year the average bushel weights were 57 or 58.

Mr H. Dowd said that the farmers represented look upon the exception to the effort to pull the wool over their eyes by the new juggling of wheat prices as announced for this year. Since 1954 he said that the costs of production had increased tremendously and therefore suggested that an increase of 10% on the 1954 price of 80/- a barrel should be asked for.

Mr N Walsh stated that while he was dissatisfied with the price announced for this year's crop he thought that the step by step grading which had also been approved by the Minister would not be changed as it was very much to the advantage of the farmers. Their approach to the Department he said should be to ask a price that would probably be granted.

Mr J. Dowd—We don't want tact or bartering but we want facts for wheat the beet growers have been given an extra 7/- a ton but they're not satisfied with it. Mr C. Curran thought that a request for a price of 88/- a barrel was unreasonable.

Mr J. Fahy pointed out that the increased price of oil would cause an increase in production costs this year. When the Committee were going to divide on the issue Mr Dowd appealed to the Committee to be unanimous and it was finally decided to ask for a 10% increase on the 1954 price based on the existing grading system.

Auditor's Report A copy of the Auditor's report of the Committee's accounts for the year ending 31/3/1956 before the meeting and this stated that the accounts had been prepared and presented for audit in a satisfactory manner. Mr Dowd, Mr Walsh and the other members agreed that the report reflected the greatest credit on the ability of the C.A.O., Mr P. Conroy and the staff.

Motor Collisions Have Court Sequels. BOARD OF ASSISTANCE ADOPT ESTIMATES.

Waterford Board of Assistance at their meeting in Dungarvan on Monday last adopted the estimate of £293,276 an increase of £141 over last year. The Co. Manager's report on the estimate stated that the actual effect on the contributions would be—increases of £7,737 and £1,180 on the Health and Public Assistance services respectively on Waterford City with decreases of £5,940 and £2,836 on the County. The report for this was the gradual increase in the valuation of the city over the past few years. Mr. C. Curran said that he noted that the price of milk from 2/8 to 3/8 per gallon as he suggested that it could be got cheaper from the Co-ops. Mr. R. Barron said that the supply as certain regulations would have to be compiled with. Mr. Curran also criticised the granting of increases in maternity fees from 5 to 7 guineas doctors, without the Board having been consulted. The Co. Manager said that this was a direction from the Minister for Health and the Board had no say in it. Mr. T. Lannen said that doctors were well off as they were exempted from the tax on their property, rich and poor would be called on to meet the increases.

Occasional licenses were granted to Miss Mary Keane, Dungarvan, and Mrs. Nora Monahan, Clonca. Special exemptions were granted to the Devonshire Arms Hotel and Mr. M. Tynan, Grattan Square, Nicholas Power, Mount Odell.
