BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT With PENSMAN

HE HAS ANSWERED THE GREAT CALL

As I pen these few words in appreciation of a man who was in no small way responsible for the great revival of the town of Dungarvan, the echo of the dead bell from the belfry of St. Mary's still rings in my ears. I still see the crowded graveyard in the shadow of the Parish Church and those who had come to pay their last respects to the late Pierce A. Casey as his mortal remains were lowered, on this soft spring morning into the grave where his brother the late Dr. Michael A. Casey was laid to rest almost exactly six years ago.

As 'the Absolution was pronounced by another Right Rev. Monsignor R. Casey former Head Chaplain of the Forces and now Parish Priest of Skerries Co. Dublin, I thought—so ends another era in Dungarvan.

The Casey family have been part and parcel of the Old Boro generations, and more than most families with associations with the town they have left a big mark on it. Were it not for their courage and foresight in the 1930's when they backed the industrial revival in the town, Dungarvan would not today enjoy the measure of prosperity it has. There is no denying that, and as the industrial undertakings which the late Dr. Casey and the late Perce Casey helped to found prospered, the town prospered with them. Hundreds of men enjoy the privilege of working for good wages under the best conditions in their own town today. Were it not for the men who backed these factories such would not be the case and Dungarvan would find itself in the unfortunate position of many other Irish towns where industries failed due to lack of local financial backing.

I often thought and I am not alone in thinking that it was a pity that neither of the two men who were associated with the Casey family—the leather factory and the glue factory—bore their name. However, whenever people will speak of them their associations cannot be forgotten.

Perce Casey maintained an other family tradition when he was elected a member of the Dungarvan Urban Council in 1950 as father the late M. J. Casey was also one of the town's Civic Fathers in his time.

Despite his affluence and the inroads on his health which the business made the late Perce Casey always found time to forward the interests of Dungarvan. He was ever ready to promote new amenities for it and to boost it as a tourist centre. He was a local affairs and usually came out on top with his keen brain always quick to size up a situation.

By his death Dungarvan has suffered a loss it can ill afford as men like Perce Casey are not to be met every day. During his lifetime he did his utmost for the town and its inhabitants now that he is dead let us not forget him in our prayers.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR A FIOR GAELTACHT SCHEME BOAT

I have written before on a number of occasions about the claims of Ring to one of the fishing boats under the Fior Gaeltacht Scheme. Representatives made by several former deputies have from time to time been published in this paper too touching the same issue. At one time the boat was just around the corner at another she was all but moored at Helvick pier as the TDs vied with each other with the usual TD promises that generally turn out to mean so little. References to the matter elsewhere by a person who knew but little of what he was referring to tried as always to grossly misrepresent the true position. However the matter has now come to a head and I am afraid that unless there is a change of heart at Government level there will be no boat allocated to Ring for some considerable time.

The Editor of this newspaper who has always taken a keen interest in the matter has been in constant touch with the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Agriculture during the last few months. Two men from the Helvick pier were called to Dublin for an interview in connection with the boat but their qualifications fell short of the requirements. This is stated in a letter from the Fisheries Branch to the Editor which was received early this month as follows: "With reference to the allocation to the Helvick area of one of the 56 foot fishing boats being issued under the Fior Gaeltacht Scheme the position is that the prospective skipper of any such boat, in addition to possessing the basic qualifications of being a native fisherman is required by the

UNEXPECTED PASSING OF MR. PIERCE A. CASEY, DUNGARVAN

The unexpected passing of Mr. Pierce A. Casey, Main Street, Dungarvan, which occurred in his sleep in the early hours of Thursday 22nd February occasioned a grievous shock not only to his immediate family relatives, but also to the people of Dungarvan and to his many business associates throughout the country. Although he had suffered an indisposition towards the end of last year it was felt that he was on the road to recovery and had in fact been out driving on a number of occasions recently. On the evening prior to his demise he was in Waterford, and on his return home had conversed about business and local affairs with a close friend before settling down for the night. His passing in these circumstances and in his middle fifties is therefore most tragic.

Following the passing of a resolution of sympathy to the bereaved widow family and relatives the members joined in paying tribute to deceased as an industrialist and man associated with the public life of the county.

MEMBERS OF DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL PAY TRIBUTE

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council paid tribute to the memory of their late colleague Councillor Casey when they adjourned their ordinary meeting without transacting any business on last night. They held a special meeting to vote sympathy to the bereaved widow family and relatives.

An Outstanding Man
Mr. Lannen proposes the resolution in the following terms: "It is with the deepest personal regret that I propose this vote of sympathy to the wife and family and relatives of the late P. A. Casey. He was a great friend of mine and the news of his death this morning came as a great personal shock to me. Pierce Casey was an outstanding man in every respect and was held in the highest esteem by all and in particular by the people of Dungarvan. His name will always be remembered with respect and affection by the people of the town. His death was a great loss to the town and his passing will be deeply mourned by all his relatives and his sympathies in their sad bereavement."

The resolution was seconded by Mr. D. Moloney, who spoke of the great loss which the town and his relatives had suffered and to himself personally.

Senator J. Butler said that he had got a great shock that morning when he heard that his colleague had passed away. We all knew him and what he and his family did for the town. He was a great industrialist and a great friend of the town. He was very successful in his respect and as a result of his endeavours and those of the late Dr. Casey we now have industries in Dungarvan employing hundreds of men under the very best conditions and wages. Realising all this it can be understood that the people of Dungarvan have undoubtedly suffered a great loss by his death.

LENTEN PASTORAL, 1957

1. Meat is allowed on all days in Lent except Ash Wednesday and Fridays.
2. Those between 21 and 60 years of age who are bound to fast may take meat and meat or vegetable each day at their principal meal.
3. Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal and two light collations.
4. From 12 to 18 ounces of solid food are permitted at these combined collations that is two-thirds of the quantity of food usually taken at breakfast and evening tea.
5. One egg may be taken both in the morning and evening as part of these collations and so may butter, cheese, milk, fruit, cereals and fish.
6. The division of the total amount of food allowed at the two collations is left to the choice of the individual and so are the hour and order of the meals e.g. dinner about midday and collation in the evening or vice versa.

REGULATIONS FOR Lent, 1957

1. A cup of tea or coffee may be taken as often as desired.
2. Parish Priests even outside of Concession and Confessors are empowered to dispense from the Law of Fasting or from the Law of Abstinence or from both.
3. There will be neither Fast nor Abstinence on Sundays.
4. The Lenten fast and Abstinence cease at midnight on Holy Saturday.
5. 11 Monday 18th March, will not be a fast day.

VOCATIONAL COMMITTEE SPENT £20,633

At the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan, the C.E.O. Mr. D. C. Ring read the report on the accounts of the Committee for the year ended 31st March, 1956. The report showed that the total payments made in the year amounted to £20,633 16s 11d compared with £19,520 19s 8d in the previous year.

The report went on to state that the aggregate receipts increased by £12, although grants from the Department of Education and contributions from the Rating Authority declined. There was a substantial rise in the amount of tuition fees from £231 to £257. This improvement was caused by the further extension of educational facilities and by the diligence of the staff in collecting fees. The collection yielded 94 per cent of the fees charged as compared with 86 per cent in the year 1954/55.

Payments of the increase of £113 in the aggregate payments includes a repayment of £989 in full discharge of liability of the Committee in respect of loans. There was no appreciable change in the expenses of administration. Instruction costs rose by £601 but this was partially offset by savings on maintenance expenses. Contributions amounting to £209 11s 0d were received in accordance with the relative provisions of the Local Government Superannuation Act 1945 and one-half of that sum was transferred to Waterford County Council. The bonds of the officers appear to be in order. Current premiums have been paid on the insurances of the Committee. The accounts were carefully prepared and they were presented for audit in a satisfactory manner.

Mr. M. Harty termed the report an excellent one and the Committee unanimously congratulated the C.E.O. office and teaching staffs on the running of the schools.

CO. COUNCIL REFUSE TO INCREASE RATES Services Will Have To Be Cut Says County Manager

Waterford County Council met for the second time in Dungarvan on Monday last to consider the estimates for the coming year. Before the Council was an estimate of 39/74d recommended by the Council's Estimates Committee (an increase of 104d on last year's rate of 38/9d). At this point Mr. Foran proposed a deadlock had been reached and the County Manager Mr. S. J. Moynihan had objected to a rate of 38/9d being struck and warned the Council that he would have to report to the Minister on the matter. He agreed as a compromise on that occasion to accept a rate of 39/2d but the Council rejected a proposal to strike that amount.

At last Monday's meeting the Chairman Mr. M. Morrissey speaking on behalf of the Estimates Committee said that when they had gone through the estimates the best they could do was to reduce the rate by 3d and when he asked the Manager to reduce the amount the latter had told him that he could not do with anything less.

Mr. Foran - We must catch the bus by the hour and take drastic steps to reduce the rate. I propose that we cut the Libraries Estimate by half Mr. Curran said that the Council should tackle the problem of reducing its quarter of a million of pounds. He suggested that £1,000 be cut of the Libraries Estimate £350 from Tourist Association and that the scholarships be abolished.

Senator Butler supported a rate of 39/2d as being the only sensible rate to strike. It was his opinion that if the Manager reported on the matter to the Minister that the Council would be forced to adopt a rate of 39/74d.

Popular With All Sides - Mr. S. Lynch said that it seemed to him that most of the Councilors were trying to be popular with all sides. Let us be honest about the matter he said and stop trying to run with the hare and hunt with the hounds.

Mr. Lannen - There was £10,000 spent for increases to doctors and officials during the past couple of years. That's where the money has gone. All these things should have been thought of during the year and not now.

Mr. T. Kyne said that it appeared to him that no member had put up any concrete suggestion of where cuts could be made.

Mr. Lannen - Sell Priory House and you can then reduce the estimate by £4,000.

Mr. Foran also criticised the huge amount of £85,000 in the machinery expense account and the fact that Waterford only got £5,000 under the Gaeltacht Roads Grant Scheme.

Mr. M. Hartney said that steps should be taken to lift the extra health services burden of the County rates and to have the Gaeltacht Roads grant increased.
