THE OLD AND THE NEW
 I attended a very happy ceremony at Abbeyside on last Monday morning when with a large number of parents and of the teachers and the pupils I was present at the blessing of the palatial new boys and girls National School by the Parish Priest, Very Rev. Fr. John Roche.

Father Roche first celebrated Mass at the entrance at the girls' end of the school and afterwards accompanied by Rev. Father M. Walsh, O.C., he proceeded from room to room blessing each in turn. Afterwards the Parish Priest addressed those present and welcomed parents and pupils to the new school. The fact that they had to wait so long for the completion of the building was offset, he said, by the grand school they now had. It was indeed well worth waiting for.

Fr. Roche then made main credit for the election of the priest could not go to the priests or the teachers but to the parents and parishioners of the parish who had paid the weekly assessments without complaint.

He reminded the pupils that they should bring the fine tradition of the old school to their new surroundings.

The school had produced big numbers who had eventually become doctors, lawyers, engineers, architects while he could not give the exact number of priests and nuns who had received their early education at Abbeyside old school. The Parish Priest caused ripples of laughter when he said that it would also have to be remembered that the school had produced many merchant navy men and sea captains.

Following this address the school was opened to the public and I mingled with the throng that moved along the connecting corridor which links the various spacious class rooms. Each room had its own colour scheme with beautiful desks each to hold two pupils and special storage heaters provided comfortable heat. There were the cloakrooms one for each school, while up-to-date toilets and wash-basins were completed. The appointments which most assuredly make the school one of the finest in rural county Waterford.

There is a spacious playground with a concrete surface banking each end of the school and each has adequate shelters for the wet days. The entrance is made over winding concrete paths and in time grass, flowers and shrubs grow, it should be really beautiful.

There is no doubt but that the children of Abbeyside will now have the most congenial surroundings of their lives, the teachers Mr. M. Foley, MA., NT., Mrs. C. McCarthy, NT., Mrs. T. O'Mahony, N.T., Mrs. M. Walsh, N.T., and Mrs. M. Conneally, N.T. will have every convenience at their disposal.

I wish them all the best of luck in the new school and on behalf of the people of the parish I thank the very Rev. Fr. John Roche, P.P., and Rev. Fr. M. Walsh, O.C. for their interest and initiative in providing such a wonderful school.

And while it is a case on with the new school, should not forget the old. The building at the Pond which for sixty years has been known by generations of Abbeyside boys and girls as the voices of the boys and girls of the present generation for the last time as the teachers held their last classes there on Friday evening 1st March. As the children dispersed that evening the school was closed for the last time. What memories that old school building holds and what stories could its walls tell if they could only speak. All over the world—Australia, America, Europe, Canada, Africa, New Zealand—there are now men and women who learned their first lessons and grammar in that old school. However it served its purpose well and now progress has relegated it.

As Father Roche said last Monday morning the new school will last for 100 years. Wonder what changes will see!

N.F.A. EXECUTIVE REPLY TO CO. MANAGER

At the recent adjourned Estimates Meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan the Chairman Mr. Michael Morrissey read a letter from the County Executive National Farmers' Association replying to points made by the County Manager. Mr. S. J. Moynihan, at the previous week's meeting.

The following is the text of the letter:

The County Manager sought to show that Waterford farmers were not overtaxed through rates by comparison with other counties in the county. The figures submitted to the N.F.A. department showed that the average net rate per acre was higher in Waterford than in Tipperary or Kilkenny despite the fact that the latter two counties have a larger area of land.

The County Manager stated that the cost of administration did not vary very much for each county but that the Waterford net rate was necessarily higher than in the other two counties because the same amount was levied from a smaller acreage.

Does not this statement contradict the County Manager's first statement—that County Waterford is not overtaxed?

The letter then stated:

The N.F.A. County Executive express their disappointment that at their last meeting the County Council voted to reduce the rates at last year's level. In saying this the N.F.A. express the strong feelings of the farmers of County Waterford who are paying 75% of the county rate. N.F.A. has already pointed out that if agricultural production is to increase the balance between rates and farm duties will be seriously affected. It is therefore the earnest hope of the N.F.A. County Executive that at the present meeting the full operation of the rates in bringing about a substantial reduction in the present rate.

The County Manager referring to the letter said that it would not be necessary to reduce the rates were not struck on an acreage basis but on a valuation basis.

Mr. W. Dower said that the ratepayers of Waterford were more heavily burdened than Tipperary or Kilkenny.

The County Manager replied that the County rates were bearing a lot of the burdens that should be borne by the city.

Mr. Dower—Then I hope that the future T.D.s and Senators will do something to ease this situation which must be dealt with at Government level.

The letter was noted and the Council then proceeded to again consider the rate to be struck for the coming year.

We must not make the mistake of confining the influence of our religion ever us to the half hour when we are at Mass or to the moments when we are actually saying our prayers. Our religion must be in our whole life, and in every department of our life. Otherwise the consequences of our sins will be without effect. We owe it to ourselves to do our part in this respect to our Christian religion and tradition to give of our best and not spare ourselves wherever our duty lies and whatever we have to do knowing that we are serving not only our fellowmen but God Himself who will be our just Judge and our Eternal Reward.

I appeal therefore to each catholic family of the diocese to enter into the spirit of Lent in this year of crisis 1957. I appeal to each individual to be generous with God in the practice of prayer, self-denial and in fulfilling the duties of each ones state in life. It is well known how many of our people young and old are glad to make the effort to assist at Holy Mass each morning during Lent. This may not be possible in every parish but where there is

Staggering Overdraft

A Chára - My proposal at recent meeting of Waterford Co Council was that a rate of 3/7d (2d less than last year) should be provided for the services for the coming year plus an additional rate of 5d to pay for supplementary Estimates (€200,000) passed by Council during past year. This would avoid a further increase in overdraft which stands at the staggering figure of €364,000 (€13,000 in excess of the rate of 3/7d). A colossal overdraft is even a bigger problem than the high rates and a further increase would be suicidal.
