Admittedly the bulk of our membership at the moment is from Waterford City but we are gradually extending our area.

She is now rounding up all her pals and getting them into the Association. We recently sent our scouts as far as Watford and returned with a number of hearing membership forms signed by a block of members mostly from Framore. And so it goes on. **MUSICAL FESTIVAL**

4,000 Competitors Will Come to Dungarvan

More than 4,000 competitors will take part in the annual Festival of Comhaltas Ceoltuoirí Eireann which will be held in Dungarvan during next week-end. Last year this event was staged in Ennis when there was an attendance of more than 40,000 people. The Chairman Dr. Bernard J. Callaghan of Cavan expects that at least as many people will be at the Festival this year.

In addition to the competitors will be a parade composed of pipe bands hurling teams dancing groups and tableaux through Dungarvan on Sunday (June 9th) the Festival will be opened by the Patron Most Rev. Daniel Coahlan Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. On Sunday June 9th Most Rev. Dr. Coahlan and other leaders will be guests at a dinner and reception which will be attended by members of the 123 branches of every county in Ireland. The competitions will be held on Monday (June 10th). All competitions will be held on a provincial basis so that the finals will be all-Ireland events. The 1,000 entries have come from every county in Ireland and there will also be entries from America—where there are five Comhaltas branches—London Birmingham and Scotland. Already there have been heavy hotel bookings in Dungarvan and in the surrounding area every branch having arranged to be represented. Many of them will engage special buses to take competitors and spectators to the Festival.
