BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

With PENSMAN

THEY HARDLY BELIEVE IT
 The people of Dungarvan are finding it hard to believe that the forthcoming National Traditional Musical Festival being Organised by An Comhaltas Ceoltóirí will attract traditional musicians and supporters to the number of over 40,000 to the Old Boro during Whit Week-end. A typical attitude was that expressed by a potential caterer on the occasion who asked me "Will you really tell me that there will be a big crowd here for it?" When I replied that there would be thousands and thousands from North South East and West her eyes just goggled and I thought I saw an incredulous gleam in them. It is perfectly true that literally the town will be inundated with visitors for the occasion.

Not only about ten weeks off but I am told that the Organising Committee with its various subsidiary offshoots have everything well in hand and Secretaries Tomas O Baoighín and Liam Comartún are daily dealing with big numbers of inquiries for accommodation entries and other information.

Coming From Everywhere
 When I called at the Committee headquarters on Monday last, I met genial Tommy Boyle who was dealing with the minutes of some of the sub-committees. All round him I could see hundreds of people filed and others which had just arrived.

It is hard to believe that at this early stage there would be so many various inquiries. He said "but you can see for yourself" and he waved his hand over the table. "The letters come from all parts," he added.

When I told Mr Boyle that I thought that the people did not believe that the Festival would attract such crowds he remarked "I know but we are arranging with the cinema people (who ran the Festival last year) to send us on the film they made of it. This will show exactly the huge influx that flooded into Ennis last year. There will be as many if not more in Dungarvan this year."

Another very practical proof of the crowd that may be expected was quoted by Mr Boyle when he said "The Ennis people showed us bank books which proved that £20,000 passed through the Ennis Banks the week after the Festival last year."

A Big Effort
 I think it is clear from this that preparations should be made by everyone to handle a crowd of the dimensions stated. It will take a lot to cater for them and every available inch of accommodation will be taxed. The sleeping problem might be able to solve itself but it will be the responsibility of the town and especially the professional and the amateur alike that no one goes hungry or thirsty during the week-end of the Festival.

It will prove a windfall for the business people of the town and I am sure they will welcome the opportunity with open arms as soon as they can grasp its magnitude.

Musicians Everywhere
 The Committee have engaged every public hall in the town for the week-end. Exhibitions will be held at the Town Hall, Friary Hall Courthouse, Technical School while Concerts will be held at the Cinema.

"We are hoping," said Mr Boyle "to be able to get the F.C.A. Hall and another few places as well." There will be a great rally at the Gaelic Field and Parades and Pageants

A Breath Of Home
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EXPORT POLICY
More Pugnacity Needed Says N F A
 As the balance of payment has been causing concern in this country and with some every area except the six counties our balance of trade shows deficit. It is especially heavy with such countries as Germany from whom we imported £28 million worth of goods in 1956 and exported only £24 million. From Sweden we imported £31 million and exported only £30 million. We are informed that trade restrictions cause serious difficulties to our trade, i.e. to the Lobster trade to France or cattle trade to Germany due to restrictions on the transportation etc. Furthermore we find ourselves excluded from various markets without notice but do not retaliate on their exports to us. The N.F.A. believes that by a more pugnacious policy in attacking trade restrictions we can improve our conditions on the export markets.

Secretary, County Waterford Social Club, London, writes on the general ideals and aspirations of the Club which he says while keeping harmonious relations with other County groups in London still maintains its independence. TOM CLARKE, 1857-1916

The smell of a convict prison has an unmistakable individuality. An officer might sit along to the cell door as noiselessly as he wished but some foreign smell from him such as bruised tobacco blacking from his recumbent position etc would be wafted into the cell to give warning to the prisoner inside of danger not being able to rely on sight or hearing to safeguard himself from danger. I relied on my sense of smell to detect the silent stealth outside who was on the alert to discover imprisonment of the Prison Rule. Many a time it gave me a timely warning. Never did it fail me. So wrote Tom Clarke the first signatory of the Proclamation of the Republic in 1916 and one of the executed leaders in his account of his 15 years in jail. Glimpses of an Irish Felon's Life is one of the most terrifying accounts of what a man in 19th century English prison was like. It was a hell on earth terrible for Irish political prisoners because the British Government deliberately used the prisons to break their health and spirit. The government's wards and staffs of the prisons were forced into a plan which made the terrible routine of a nineteenth century prison even more terrible. Added to this was the fear and hatred of the Irish dynamiters who threatened life in English cities with their explosives. They had even bombed the Carlton Club.

Tom Clarke was born in Hurst Castle in the Isle of Wight a hundred years ago on the 11th March 1857. His father who was from Leitrim had joined the British Army in Ireland. He was a member of the Church of Ireland his wife Mary Palmer of Tipperary was a Catholic and Tom was brought up a Catholic. Shortly after Tom's birth the family moved to South Africa—narrowly escaping drowning in a sea collision. They lived in South Africa till Tom was 10 when returned to Dungannon in Ulster where Tom grew up. The year of their return was the year of the Fenian Insurrection. Though the armed rising was a failure the republican idealism of the Fenians had struck deep roots. The movement had been the most dangerous revolutionary one of the British Government had yet faced and Mr Gladstone said later that the Fenian movement had had first made him deeply aware of Irish injustices.



The Curragh

The origin of the curragh is lost in the antiquity of history. Essentially it has not altered over the years—a wooden ribbed framework covered by a waterproof coat. It meets ideally the requirements demanded of it, it is sturdy enough to ride the stormiest seas and light enough to be carried ashore beyond the reach of the waves. In skillful hands it is the safest of crafts on our wild Atlantic coast. An interesting variety of curragh is a small oval type which was used on the Boyne. In recent years one of these covered with cowhide, was built for the Hamburg Museum to replace one that was destroyed during the war. From Kerry to Donegal each district has its own variety of curragh, the name may vary but the essential features of the boat remain the same.
