BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT With PENSMAN

RATES DOWN—CHARGES UP The final result of the estimates meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held on last Friday night was a reduction of 5d on last year's rate of 43/10. The reduction could have been as much as 1/2d if certain actions were not subsequently taken by a majority of the Council.

I am not sure that the use of the word reduction is altogether correct in this regard. No expenditure in the estimates was actually reduced, it was, in fact, increased. That is the truth. How then did the relief of 5d come about? Senator Butler who has always been the saviour of the ratepayers when estimates meetings are concerned, again came to the rescue on this occasion and his suggestion concerning increasing water charges was followed in two other cases. The sum total of this was an increase of the Council receipts of £690 the equivalent of 1/- in the £ from rates.

Where is all this increase in receipts to come from—the Board of Assessor and the Council will provide the bulk of it or increased water charges at the County Home and Hospital and for the scavenging of the main roads within the urban area? However by using the doubtful argument that the end justifies the means our Urban Councillors can justify the inflationary method they adopted. One of the increases on the town rates is the 3d in the £ for the purpose of purchasing bunting and decorations for the town for the forthcoming Traditional Musical Festival. A great controversy has raged about this proposal and it was first made and a big number of ratepayers have objected to it. I wrote some comments on it in a previous issue and at Friday night's meeting I was asked to task by the Chairman Mr T. Keane for what I had written. Mr Keane claimed that I implied that he attempted to compel the Council to approve of this proposal without protest and I only commented on it because the usual public session followed subsequent to the Reporters' meeting is to be expected to hang around.

Now I don't want to be misrepresented as claiming that the town should not be decorated for the Festival. I want to declare my position clearly and that is that the town should carry out the greatest scheme of decoration ever but that it be on a completely voluntary basis. Every help and co-operation should be given to the Festive Committee by the people and I am sure that will be given. Now I hope that will clear that position.

Reverting to the rate levy for the bunting it is allowed under Section 56 of the Local Government Act 1955 to put a maximum of 3d on the rates for decoration purposes. Mr Keane in proposing that this maximum be struck to the detriment of the Festival from coming to the meeting to press this proposal. Subsequent to the meeting I spoke to the Chairman and one of the officials of the Festive Committee and was informed that at no time was it decided to send such a deputation rather was it decided not to interfere one way or the other with the Council in this regard.

Housing Grants Restored

Dungarvan Urban Council at its Estimates Meeting on last Friday night which lasted from 8.15 p.m. to almost midnight finally adopted a rate of 42/10 which is a reduction of 5d on last year's rate and 8 1/2 less than the estimate submitted by the County Manager.

Manager's Report In the course of an explanatory report to the Council on the estimates, the County Manager Mr S. J. Moylan stated—

A rate of 43/3 1/2 would be required for the coming year representing an increase of 3 1/2 over the rate for the current year.

A total expenditure of £61,030 on Revenue Account is provided for of which the General Urban Demand by the County Council amounts to £23,300. The gross valuation of the Urban District is now £1,610,414 which shows an increase of £242,000 over that of the current year.

The net amount required for the rates is £29,901, representing an increase of 3 1/2 over that of the current year.

It will be observed that while adjustments have been made in both the estimated expenditure and receipts for 1957, as compared with 1956/57, involving an attempt to arrive as far as possible, at the actual figures in accordance with the Council's records and current trends, the only services which might be attributed to the following—

Cleaning and repair to watermain at Park Terrace £125 Public Lighting £100 Retiring Allowances £229

An account has recently been received from the County Council showing a sum of £1,049 due to him as fees and expenses in connection with the Water Improvements Scheme, 1955 and the Estimates Committee requested that the Consultant be asked to reduce this claim.

In any event having felt that such a payment levied in any particular year would be an undue burden on the ratepayers, it was considered advisable that the amount should be spread over a period of at least three years and the figure now shown for 1957 would be an unduly high sum of £400 representing the instalment and interest which would be due to the bank on this basis.

The Estimates Committee deferred for consideration by the Council the question of the desirability of adjusting and/or increasing water charges in the current year. The Council's attention is drawn to the fact that while there are some 1,200 buildings in the Urban Area most of which are connected with water, the rental shows a total of £84,000 and the number of connections in the area all but 4 of this number are paying on a scale approved of by the Council in 1951.

Three of the remainder are paying on the basis of £120 per annum and a flat rate of £120 is being received in respect of the water supply to the County Home and Hospital.

The figures show an increase of £100 in respect of public lighting requirements. This covers the Council's commitment of £710 to the Electricity Supply Board in respect of lighting 12 1/2 acres.

An additional provision is made in the estimate for the coming year in respect of supplemental housing or reconstruction grants, but it will be observed that it is expected that the Council will need a further addition to its existing loan to cover new Small Dwellings applications. At present there are 42 borrowers.

With regard to the position of supplemental housing grants the Acting Town Clerk Mr M. O'Meara read a letter from Messrs O'Brien and Sons Building Contractors, Abbeyside, inquiring as to the Council's intentions. The letter stated that they had already erected 35 houses from which the Council were receiving over £400 in rates. They intended building 30 more but if there were to be no further grants they would not be inclined to go ahead with these.

The letter added that in giving these grants the Council would be at no loss because after the first year they would get in more than they would pay out.

Swimming Pool Charges Referring to the losses sustained by the Council on the running of the Swimming Pool, the Co Manager suggested that a small charge of 1d to all children would go a long way to offset these losses.

Mr Keane—I wouldn't like to see any charges being made to poor children for swimming at the pool as it might mean forcing them off to unsafe places to bathe.

The Chairman Mr Keane said that the Council should aim at trying to make the pool as self-supporting as possible. Mr Keane said that you should leave the charges there as they are.

Mr Lannon—It's hard when you want to charge little children a penny for a swim to keep down the rates.

On Mr Kelly's proposal seconded by Senator Butler the Council agreed to increase existing charges at the pool by 50% on all children up to 16 years of age but to continue to leave children up to 16 years of age free.

Mr Lannon and Mr Keane discussed the proposal. Referring to the contribution from the County Council towards the scavenging of main roads in the Urban Area (£150) Mr Lannon said that this was very low and he thought it should be increased.
