DELAY IN PROVISION OF DENTURES

Complaint At Board Meeting

Mr T. Kyne T.D. at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council stated that he was not at all satisfied with the way things were going regarding the provision of dentures. He had complaints from a big number of people that they were waiting for 3 years while some people got them after only two months.

The Secretary Mr J. A. Hynde said that the waiting list was available in the office and the applicants were dealt with in rotation. Mr Kyne stated that he had sent in hundreds of accusations to the contrary added that he would like to get a copy of the list.

The Secretary said that the date the dentures are recommended is that entered on the list not the date of extractions. Mr Kyne—Are some getting priority? Secretary—Very seldom.

Mr Kyne again said that he would like a copy of the list but the Secretary said that it could be seen at the office only as it was a confidential document.

Mr Kyne objected to this and said that a notice should be put in the papers that if there was any hookey business going on it was not the members who were responsible for it but the manager. He believed that the people said as they could not get their dentures it was their own fault.

Another member of the Board agreed that they had received similar complaints. Mr Kyne—My attitude is that if we got a copy of the list we could see the true position. I am not happy with things as they are and it seems that the only thing that I can do is draw attention to it here so that it will get publicity and I will continue to do that until something is done.

Alleged Discourtesy. Mr Kyne alleged that Mr Power, Assistant Officer in Waterford, had been discourteous and had abused people who had gone to see him. I am not going to have that from an official of this Board, he said. When people went to see him to ask what rights they had under the Health Act, he told them to get out. I don't think that officials have any right to do this.

Mr Kyne's complaint was noted.

Nire Valley Dispensary. A letter from the Department sanctioned the purchase of the proposed plot for the erection of a dispensary depot at the Nire Valley. The Secretary was instructed to find out from the Department the smallest type depot which would qualify for a grant.
