This was the frenzied cry I heard coming from the hoarse throat of a Waterford man at Thurles on Sunday last when Referee Gleeson blew the whistle called for the ball and spread his hands to signify that the herculean contest was over. It meant that after nine years of Waterloo Senior Hurling, the Rebel County had won the Munster and the red and white of the sea of people who had come to see their counties contest the issue as to who would wear the Munster crown for 1957.

From the throw-in Waterford went into top gear and dictated terms to the old masters. It was wonderful to see how Phil Grimes and his men went about dealing with the Corkmen's challenge. Soon it was evident that if Waterford could maintain the cracking pace they set, they must outpace and outstay the Leesiders.

We groaned as Johnny O'Connor went down injured following a clash with Brohan. However, "old man" that he is, Johnny had our hearts fluttering again as he resumed. Alas, misfortune again struck as within a few minutes he sustained a blow on the hand. It was evident that this was a serious injury as he could only grip his hurley with one hand. Following attention by the ambulance men, he continued but as the game went on we could see that his hand was bleeding badly as his white jersey began to get more like that of his opponents as he wiped the blood from the injured thumb. He continued gamely and made some good saves but it came as no surprise when on the resumption after half-time he retired.

I understand that Johnny was treated by Mr R O'Driscoll, Orthopaedic Surgeon at Waterford on Monday and although no bones were fractured or broken the thumb of his left hand was so badly injured that it had to be stitched. It is, in the circumstances, extremely unlikely that he will be available for the semi-final against Galway in Dublin on Sunday week. Hard luck Johnny but those are the fortunes of the game. Perhaps if we don't have him for the semi-final he will be fit and well for the final.

While congratulating all the team their trainer John Keane who had his men trained physically and mentally to perfection and the selectors who solved the problem following O'Connor's withdrawal from the game by an admirable substitution and switch I also congratulate the wonderful crowd of supporters who travelled from all over the county and city and gave our men much needed vocal support, especially when it was most needed during the third quarter of the game.

As I know that the sports-writers of this paper have dealt fully with the game elsewhere in this issue I will conclude by adding that I hope that now having conquered in Munster we will go on to final victory.

CHAOTIC TRAFFIC

The traffic regulations at Thurles on Sunday were no credit to the Garda Authorities who arranged them. This was especially so after the match when as a result of some crashes vehicular traffic on the Horse and Jockey road was reduced to a snail's pace and at times to a standstill. At some stretches of the road two and even three lines of traffic all going the same way jammed and blocked the thoroughfare. There was no supervision and no effort to curtail the speed of the traffic. Surely it would not have been too much to expect to have had a police patrol on the road on Sunday evening while traffic should also have been alternated on the roads leading from Thurles to Cashel. It was an absolute disgrace and it was providential that there were not a greater number of accidents of a more serious nature.

DANGEROUS PLAYTHINGS

A news item elsewhere in this issue once again draws attention to the seriousness of allowing young boys to play with such things as bows and arrows, catapults and pellet guns. Of course boys will be boys but it is a sad thing to see the serious consequences that can sometimes arise when they play with such dangerous toys. The element of risk and the possibility of accidents is always greater when they are around. In such cases as these prevention is the only cure.

RECONSTRUCTION GRANTS

I note that Dungarvan Urban Council at a four man meeting last Friday night agreed to raise £1,000 for the purpose of providing further reconstruction grants. The money is to be raised from the Bank and will be repayable. I understand over a period of 15 years. I did not see that any member present at the meeting bothered to find out what the cost on the rates the raising and repayment of this loan would mean or whether there was any provision made for it within the framework of the Council's present financial commitments.

Grants of this nature are admirable insofar as they go but it should not be forgotten that the money to provide them does not come free. The ratepayers have to foot the bill and many of these ratepayers are less well off than a big number of those who apply for and get the grants. It is an interest it would be well for the people of the town to get the information as to what they will have to pay by way of extra rates.

WATERFORD ARE KINGS OF MUNSTER HURLING

Dynamic Display Takes Crown From Cork

WATERFORD 1-11; CORK 1-6

Wherever and whenever great games in the annals of hurling are discussed, Waterford men and women will recall with pride the dynamic display of our senior Hurling XV who, after an hour of power hurling at a wonderful pace, vanquished Cork at Thurles on Sunday last to take their third Munster hurling crown and the first since 1948.

The Deise men left no doubt as to their fitness to hold the coveted Munster trophy for 1957, and Phil Grimes and every one of his team, without exception, are indeed champions of the first water. It is nine years since faithful followers of the Waterford team, and they were there in record numbers, had so much reason to cheer themselves hoarse about as they had at Thurles on Sunday, and they are to be admired for the wonderful vocal support they accorded the heroes of the day. They made the trek to provincial headquarters with confidence, but with a healthy respect for the Corkmen—and came home happy after seeing one of the finest displays ever given by a Waterford hurling team.

Following their defeat, Cork made much capital out of the absence of Ring and Philpott, and the last minute defection of Gerry Murphy, but even had Cork this trio on "active service" last Sunday, Waterford would still have triumphed as the five point margin at the final whistle did not truly represent the superiority of our men over their opponents.

It Cork bewailed the first half lapses of their forwards so Cork Waterford followers remember the anguish caused by the chances lost by Seamus Power and Larry Gulman when golden goals that would truly have clinched our claim to victory went begging. And if Cork were without their Ring, Waterford suffered what many considered would be a mortal blow when with the game but moments old Johnny O'Connor star of the first round clash with Limerick went down injured following a blow on the head. Minutes later O'Connor was again injured when he sustained a bad gash in his left hand and from this to the interval his assistance to partner Grimes at midfield was of necessity of but the token kind.

WERE WELL TRAINED

It must be a long time since a team performed so proficiently in a Munster final as Waterford did on Sunday. They were yards faster than their opposite numbers and literally ran rings around the Corkmen and most important of all they were trained to stay the testing hour.

Their display speaks stronger than any words we could write of the wonderful training schedule and preparation of the team had at the hands of that former doyen of caman wielders—the one and only John Keane.

MAGNIFICENT BACKS

Waterford were strong at all sectors although the wing forwards especially in the first half did not turn the many opportunities that came their way to full effect. We had a magnificent back division in which Flynn Barron Cunningham and M O'Connor gave lordly displays of sound defensive play. That a team of Cork's calibre playing with a strong wind behind them were held scoreless for 22 minutes in the first half and that at the interval the Cork tally showed only two points as against Waterford's three is a wonderful tribute to the workmanlike way our backs went about their job.

Irish Scholarships—A letter from the Department informed the Committee that in future pupils of primary and secondary schools teachers and university graduates would not be eligible for Irish scholarships awarded annually by the Committee.

Sick Leave—With reference to a communication from the Department concerning sick leave regulations an Fear Moir remarked that the Department was most generous. It would be almost impossible to run an ordinary school he said if Bonner would not be entitled to a small weekly pension.

Trade Union Law and Restrictive Practices

An interesting booklet just published—"The Right and Liabilities of A Trade Association Registered Under The Trade Union Acts," by Mr. M. J. O'Connor, F.I.S., F.C.M.A. shows the connection between that Act and an Association of Traders registered as a Trade Union. The booklet runs to 52 pages and deals in clear and concise language with the powers, privileges and liabilities of a registered trade union of the important question of resale price maintenance and the Restrictive Trade Practices Act 1953. It has a useful index of legal cases as well as a general index. The booklet is unique and of special interest to officials and members of Trade Unions of employers and employees. Displayed Finest Type of Courage.

Dungarvan Urban Council at their usual fortnightly meeting on last Friday night extended their heartfelt congratulations to Mr. Kevin Dowling, Clerical Officer, Waterford County Council for the great courage he displayed in trying to rescue 7 year old Peadar Foley who was drowned at Dungarvan Quay a few weeks ago.

The Chairman, Mr. T. Kynne T.D. said that they all extremely regretted the tragedy that had struck at the Foley family and they extended their sincerest sympathy to the bereaved parents and other relatives. The newspaper reports of the tragedy he said disclosed the great courage and heroism of an employee of the County Council Mr. Kevin Dowling who made a gallant but fruitless attempt at grave risk to his own life to save the drowning boy.

The finest type of courage known said the Chairman is that whereby a person endures his own life to try and save a fellow human being and the fact that the attempt was not successful does not take one bit from his gallant attempt. The other members joined in the congratulations to Mr. Dowling.

Letter From Vice Chairman
A letter was read from Mr. M. D. Moloney, present a patient at a Dublin hospital which thanked the members for electing him Vice-Chairman of the Council at the recent annual meeting. "I hope," wrote Mr. Moloney, "that I will not be long before I will be able to resume my duties."

Reconstruction Grants

There were only three other members of the Council present and they approved of the proposal which was seconded by Mr. J. McCarthy.

Reports
The Engineer submitted reports on repairs to various houses. With regard to a previous application to have the tap at the bottom of Davis Street restored the Engineer reported that there was no need for this and its restoration would only mean waste.

Mr. J. McCarthy appealed to the Engineer to reconsider his decision but it was stated that only two tenants resided in the street now and the tap at the top of the street was adequate for the purpose of providing water supply as the conservation of the water supply was deemed of paramount importance.

Level reference to complaints raised about the right of way between Caseyville and the Ball-Alely the Engineer reported that there was no reasonable cause for such complaints. Mr. McCarthy said that he had been told that a snapping horse was being let loose there and was a danger to children. It was decided that the gate leading to the right-of-way be locked to prevent animals being put in the right-of-way.

Gateway Closed
The Council decided to the right-of-way Caseyville is to be built up to prevent further trespass and dumping. This was decided following the reading of a report from the Rent Collector which stated that from inquiries he had made the eight tenants concerned all wanted the gateway, built up.

Did Good Job
The Council congratulated and thanked the Acting Town Clerk Mr. Michael O'Meara for the excellent job he had done since the resignation of Mr. E. Deery some months ago. The new Town Clerk took over the duties during the week-end. The Chairman said that they were all very thankful to Mr. O'Meara who had taken over at a very difficult time. He added that details as to the procedure that he was doing very well. Mr. O'Meara suitably replied.

ESB Users Increase in Dungarvan Area

The number of consumers of electricity in the Dungarvan ESB Area which includes the towns of Dungarvan and Lisgoold and the villages and rural areas around them rose to 4,657 during the year ended March 31st last states the Annual Report of the ESB which has just been issued.

The rural areas of Ballymacarby and Rathgormack in Co. Waterford, each covering over 25 square miles, received supply under the Rural Electrification Scheme during the year under review and the rural area of Gaultier in Waterford was selected for development.

The Waterford ESB district which includes the entire Co. Waterford and covers an area of 2,544 square miles now has a total of 41,714 consumers of electricity which represents an increase of almost 9% on the previous year's figure.

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
