COUNTY COUNCIL OF WATERFORD

Sheep Dipping Orders, 1937 & 1948

GO WATERFORD SHEEP DIPPING REGULATIONS, 1957 The Council of the County of Waterford, being the Local Authority under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 to 1954, for the administrative County of Waterford acting through and by the Waterford County Manager, do hereby, for the purposes specified in article 22 of the Sheep Dipping Order 1937, and in pursuance of the said Order, make the following regulations, that is to say:

1. All sheep in the Administrative Area of County Waterford required to be dipped under the Sheep Dipping Order 1937, shall be caused to be dipped by the owner or person in charge thereof at such times and at such Dipping Stations as may be specified in a Notice signed by an Inspector of the Waterford County Council and served by post or otherwise on the owner or person in charge thereof.

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To enable sheep owners to comply with the above Orders and the County Waterford Sheep Dipping Regulations 1957 the County Council Tank will be in attendance at the following centres on the dates specified where sheep will be dipped under the supervision of a Sheep Dipping Inspector and the necessary certificates issued.

LADY PASSENGER CLAIMS AGAINST TWO MOTORISTS

£1,350 Damages Awarded

An accident on the Pitdown Cross on the Dungal-Dungarvan Road on 26th September 1954 in which two cars involved overturned had a sequel in the High Court at Cork on Friday before Mr Justice Murnaghan and a lady when a lady passenger in one of the cars claimed damages from both car owners.

The plaintiff was Ellen Mullin Upper Pitdown Ardmore and the defendants were Edward Moloney 2 Ardmanning Avenue Toghur Cork and Thomas Llewellyn Upper Pitdown Ardmore.

The plaintiff was a passenger in Mr Llewellyn's station wagon which was driven by Mrs Llewellyn.

In evidence she said that prior to the accident she lived with her invalid brother in a 17 acre farm on which she raised cattle and also kept about 100 fowl and she averaged £300 a year from the farm.

Prior to the accident she had done all the farm work herself but since the accident she had not been able to do anything and she had sold the stock and had let the farm.

Mrs Llewellyn who was married to her niece

Prior to the accident she had generally raised about ten calves a year and had kept 100 fowl and did not have any help except perhaps at a time when she might be setting potatoes or vegetables. Now she had sold the stock and had only a dozen fowl.

MOVED IN

Her niece and her husband and family had moved into her house to look after her.

She agreed that her niece had moved into her house as their own home was being repaired. These repairs had not been completed and she expected that they would move into their own home when they were.

She could give no explanation as to how the accident happened. She only remembered approaching the cross-roads where it occurred but she remembered that her niece had her headlights on. She did not remember anything else until she was in hospital.

Two of her ribs had been broken and she had also sustained other injuries.

A map of the scene of the accident was proved by Mr Henry Fitzgerald Smith architect. He gave evidence of various measurements he had taken at the scene.

Mrs Joan Llewellyn said that she had driven her car on the night in question. They had driven down the Clashmore Road towards the cross-roads at about 25 m.p.h. She had her headlights on but they might have been dipped. She had seen no traffic coming from the Dungal-Dungarvan direction and had went across the main road to the Ferryport Road.

Cross-examined she said that while she slowed down before the junction she probably accelerated to cross the junction. She could not say whether she had looked to her left as she came to the crossing but it was her habit to do so. If she had looked to the left and the other car was on the wrong side of the road and its lights were poor it might be possible that she would not see it owing to the obstruction of a wall.

Edward Moloney the first named defendant said that on the night in question he was returning from Tramore and was driving towards Youghal. He was travelling at about 40 m.p.h. about 300 yards from the crossroads and slowed down and about 30 yards back from the crossroads he remained at that speed until he saw the lights coming from the right and he saw them when he was about 30 yards back from the centre of the crossroads. The lights of the other vehicle were about the same distance back from the crossroads. He expected that the other car would stop and when it did not he braked harder. He had braked slightly before

Cleaning of our Graveyards—We would again like to draw the attention of those responsible for the care and cleaning of our graveyards on the neglected condition in which some country burial places are kept. Travelling in County Cork recently we saw some graveyards with the grass as tall as the tombstones and these were graveyards where burials are constantly taking place. How anybody manage to find graves in a place where the grass is so high and the tombstones are so overgrown. Some of our town graveyards are in a not much better condition. As we pointed out some time ago if the County Council spent a few days work each year on the care and cleaning much would be done towards keeping the last resting place of our dead in a presentable condition.

Waterford County Council workers some weeks ago did a very good job on an old graveyard at Kilwatermoey by cutting the long grass raising tombstones that had fallen down, cutting the hedge around the burial plot and putting the entrance to the graveyard in a better state. All this was done in a few days and the result was a one hundred per cent improvement on the general appearance of the graveyard.

that The other car came on and he swerved to the left and gave it a glancing blow. Both cars had turned over.

He had his own full beam headlights on at the time and they were in perfect condition. His first indication of danger was when he saw the lights of the other car approaching. He had expected the other car to stop but it had actually accelerated and came in front of his car.

Dr Eugene Thomas O'Riordan gave evidence of treating the plaintiff. Among other injuries she had received fractures of the third and sixth ribs on the right side. The plaintiff recently complained of a hazy sensation on the left side, lack of energy and she complained that she stumbled when she walked. This in his opinion was due to hyper-tension which he would attribute to head injuries and general anxiety due to the accident.

AGGRAVATED

Mr S. J. O'Connell who had also attended the plaintiff said that X-ray examination had revealed that the plaintiff suffered from osteo arthritis in the dorsal area of the spine. He was of the opinion that osteo arthritic changes had been gradually developing over a period of ten years but as the plaintiff showed no conscious pain before the accident he believed that the condition had been aggravated and rendered painful by the injuries which she had received.

Dr James Patrick Morehan gave evidence of blood pressure readings which he had taken of the plaintiff which he said were higher than they should be for her age. When he examined her on July 24th 1956 she showed a remarkable change in her blood pressure. It was then 280/140 which was extremely high. When he took her blood pressure on July 15th her blood pressure was 240/120 which was very high and dangerous.

Mrs Josephine Moloney wife of Mr Michael Moloney a brother of the defendant said that she was in the car on the night of the accident. When they were approaching the cross in question she saw the shadow of lights to the right but she could not say how far away they were. She then felt the car hitting her and the brakes had been applied. The next thing she saw was the other car directly in front and all lit up. After that she did not remember much. Before the accident she was in the car and she was travelling at about 40 m.p.h.

Michael Moloney said that he was driving immediately before the accident and the first thing he realised was that the brakes had been applied. He did not notice the other car until immediately before the impact.

Miss Alice Moloney daughter of the defendant said that she was sitting in the front of the car which her father was driving. She had seen the lights of the other car to the right and suddenly the car was in front of them and the collision followed.

Dr Jeremiah Murphy said that he had examined the plaintiff on a number of occasions. On November 9th 1955 he had examined her and on the 26th of July 1956 he had examined her in a hospital. She was in good condition he detected a murmur. Her pressure on that date was 190/80 which was abnormal.

She had also complained of pain in her right knee which he attributed to an injury to a blood vessel behind the knee and there was also a circulatory deficiency in the leg. Her pressure on that date was 204/96 but that was partly attributable to the fact that she was upset because she had mistaken the time of the appointment and had arrived half an hour late. Just as he and Dr O'Riordan were leaving it was obvious that the plaintiff's blood pressure was affected by the upset which the accident had caused her but it was not a case of consistent high blood pressure as was shown by the fact that when she had gone to the Bon Secours for a rest it had fallen to normal. He did not think that it was a true blood pressure.

Dr Morehan who was recalled said that he could not agree with Dr Murphy that it was not a true blood pressure.

DECREE FOR PLAINTIFF

Following the conclusion of the evidence which was then considered by the jury the latter found in favour of the plaintiff and awarded her £1,350 damages against the two defendants, Edward Moloney and Thomas Llewellyn.
