## BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

With PENSMAN

**DRASTIC TACTICS**  
I am just back from annual holidays, hence the failure of this column to appear in the usual corner of the Leader last week. Among the letters which I found on my desk on returning to the office was one from Councillor Donal Moloney who wrote from a Dublin hospital where he has been indisposed for some months past to comment on the paragraph in Dungarvan Affairs which appeared here a couple of weeks ago.

Referring to the reference I made about the continuing existence of the Whip-Flouse on Dungarvan Square he says: "I can assure you I would have adopted drastic tactics to speed the demolition of this eye sore were it not for my indisposition." Again I ask the officials of Dungarvan Urban Council "when is this building going to be demolished?" Concerning my paragraph "Minding Our Own Business" in which criticism was offered of interference by the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in the Fethard-on-Sea dispute Councillor Moloney comments: "It is a sorry state of affairs when we behold the venerable gentlemen of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture discussing the Fethard-on-Sea dispute. God help the Waterford farmers—unless the Wexford Committee reciprocate by coming to their aid."

**UNOFFICIAL**  
Employees of the Dickens Leather Factory will be short a few days wages as they staged a three-day strike over the suspension of a young worker last week. The strike was unofficial as far as the men's union was concerned but fortunately the matter was settled before it could become serious. In these days of economic stress when there is so much unemployment, strikes are to be deplored, but an unofficial strike at any time had not acted in the manner of the circumstances, cannot be condoned.

I understand that many of the men were dissatisfied because they held that their union had not acted in the matter as quickly as it might have done but that as it may their unofficial stay-out action left them at once without any negotiating power.

**WHAT RAILWAY CLOSINGS WOULD MEAN**  
I was very interested in the resolution of protest passed at the last meeting of the County Council against any inclination on the part of the Government to implement the findings of the Transport Commission as far as County Waterford is concerned at any rate. Deputy Sean Ormond made no bones as to what the consequences would be if these recommend-

ations were carried out within the county. He summed them up in two words—'catastrophic'. Let us look at the findings of the Commission and see what the facts are. If the recommendations as published were to be carried out, they would leave the entire county without rail services as they propose to close the existing lines from Waterford City to Tramore and between Waterford and Malinbeg. There is no doubt but that the withdrawal of these services would adversely affect the economy of the towns concerned and also the large rural areas surrounding them. Besides the wages paid in the various areas CIE is also one of the largest ratepayers in the county and the list of amounts paid in rates last year are of interest. Waterford Corporation paid £24,046 in rates from the Company, the County Council £11,160 while Dungarvan Urban Council were paid £1,977 making a total of £25,439 for the year.

The question of employment readers will not be inclined to believe me when I tell them that the total annual wage bill for the officials and men employed in the city and county is £247,079. This figure is correct as I got it from the most reliable source. The break-down of this total is as follows—Waterford City £306,536 Ballyduff £3,120 Cappagh £298 Cappoquin £1,172 Carrigrohane £1,186 Dungarvan £15,919 Durrus £1,436 Kilmeachonagh £4,264 Kilmeara £3,016 Lismore £4,180 Tallow Road £1,129 and Tramore £2,175.

The bulk of this money is spent in the city and county so that it can be easily understood what the disappearance of CIE as an employer would mean. Ratepayers too will resent it. CIE assesses to the county, there is a function in the county, there will be increased costs to maintain roads to meet the extra wear and tear which the diversion to the roads of the trains now borne on the rails will mean.

These are the facts as far as the employees and the public are concerned and I am sure that you will agree that they present a very strong argument against any move to close down the rail services of the County. As Deputy Ormond suggested at the County Council meeting, I am sure that such bodies as the Feirme, ICA and all the other voluntary bodies will raise their voices in protest too so that the Government will have no doubt whatever as to the feelings of the people in this matter.

**SWIMMERS IN ACTION**  
Budding young swimmers champions provided first-class entertainment for a fine crowd at a swimming gala held at the Dungarvan Swimming Pool on Sunday last. Nominally the gala was held by the local Swimming Club which is staging a comeback after a lapse of five years. Actually the programme was the result of some months of hard work which former County Champion Billy Hill has put in teaching and coaching a big number of young girls in the arts of aquatic proficiency. Aided and abetted most enthusiastically by her co-honorary secretary Eileen Power, I was pleased to see so many of the old committee step into the breach to help out with the running of last Sunday's event. There was Professor Mick O'Hara, Tony Lawn, Joe Power, Charles O'Doherty, Joe Foley, John Casey, and at his old place by the microphone was Michael Nagle. I would like to congratulate all concerned and hope now that a start has been

made that the effort will be sustained and that the Club will go on to achieve its former greatness and that as in the past it will include amongst its members many more champions like Mary Hill, Mrs J Ormond (formerly Tess Nagle) and Lieut Paddy Arrigan.

I have been asked to criticise the failure of nearly all the young boy swimmers of the locality to come forward to compete at Sunday's gala. Due to lack of entries two fine cups for boys events remain in the hands of the Committee. It is a pity that the boys did not show even fifty per cent of the enthusiasm displayed by the girls who showed wonderful co-operation all through the summer by attending all the coaching classes regularly. Perhaps this shyness displayed by the boys will have disappeared by next year and they will be there to get to their marks when the next gala is held.

**ABBEYSIDE SCOUTS AGAIN ON THE MARK**  
Congratulations Abbeyside Scouts on winning for the third time in five years on Sunday last the coveted Scouting trophy the Melvin Cup. Congratulations especially to Patrol Leader O Clancy, and to Scouts J Browne, J Cullinan, J O Dea, J Duggan, R O Regan, G Kyne and K O'Mahoney, of the winning patrol, and to Scoutmaster F Langan, Solicitor, who has been the inspiration of this outstanding Troop all during his life. It was a wonderful achievement and one that cannot be too highly praised.

As usual the competition took place at the National Campsite at Larch Hill Co Dublin and embraced such tests as campcraft, signalling, nature study, etc. as well as oral examinations in religious doctrine and history, and this year three troops qualified for the final Abbeyside (4th Waterford) 30th Dublin (Domestic Street and 21st Cork (St Joseph's Mayfield).

Despite most unsuitable weather a very high standard was achieved and there was great excitement as the results were announced by National Commissioner Mr C J Murphy who congratulated and complimented the winners and their Scoutmaster Mr Langan on achieving once again the honour of bearing the trophy to Abbeyside. ## Senior Hurling

### Gallant Display

### Erin's Own Advance

Erin's Own, 63, Ballyduff, 34

To say they gave of their best would be a fitting tribute to a very gallant Ballyduff side who were defeated by Erin's Own in the second round of the current senior hurling championship at Dungarvan on Sunday last by 3-4 before a far-sized attendance. The game although not spectacular was nevertheless keenly fought in a high wind that at times reached gale force.

The hurling spiced with shoulder to shoulder pulling was hard full-blooded but clean. It took Ballyduff with the wind at their backs ten minutes to settle into the game and during that time the Eastern side taking what chances they could tallied 2-1 on their scoreboard. All in all these scores were the result of five well concentrated thrusts up field which no doubt speaks well for the Erin's Own forwards.

Indeed things were not looking well for Mick Beecher and his men and the Ballyduff mentors must have wished their former goale Joe Flynn had postponed his departure to the States a few months more. (You may remember as most of us talk at present of about Sunday's All-Ireland final that it was Joe Flynn who held the distinction of being custodian for the famed 48 minor side) Barry who was net-minding last Sunday was none too comfortable behind Tobin and lacked the confidence which goes to the making of great goalies.

**First Goal**  
After their first goal which came around the 12th minute and which proved a wonderful tonic Ballyduff recovered a good deal for the remainder of this half dominated the play. The left-handed Rafferty was in great form at centre-back and more than held his own against veteran Kevin O'Connor. On the turn of the first quarter the Western side in their red jerseys forced a draw and three minutes later took the lead with a grand point.

But Mick Quirke in the full-forward berth made the going extremely tough for full-back J Murphy and the Erin's Own defender must have considered himself lucky when the former moved outfield on the turnover. Quirke all his size and lungedness displayed some clever stickwork and his point in the 23rd minute from an over-head double was well taken. There was to be no more of winger but they did not use to his crosses. The weakness in the right full corner position especially necessitated the replacement of Hurley by Mick Feeney early in the game.

While Erin's Own were holding on mightily under heavy strain content with the fact that the wind would be their ally during the second half they were helped by the overshooting and lack of positional sense of the opposition. Another minor before the interval gave Ballyduff a slim 2-point lead.

**More Determined**  
Out came the red jerseyed men on the restart more determined than ever and taking the bit between their teeth they forced the Erin's Own defence to back up under the strain. Davy Barry (Ballyduff) hit the crossbar in the 14th minute with a stinger which rebounded and was cleared. Down at the road goal Erin's Own cut the deficit with a sailing point and in the 16th minute combined with the score showing 2-3 all minutes before this Feeney got a chance to race goale Condon for the leather outside the square but the city man just tipped him to clear. In the 14th minute the Ballyduff man redeemed himself when he finished over the bar in (great fashion) a grand cross from Mick Quirke.

The Westerners fell on the defensive for a while when Condon Russell and Cody stepped up the pressure for Erin's Own. This gave the lion-hearted Frank Corcoran left half back a chance to show some fine defensive skill by which he completely mastered Leo Murphy. He was not beaten for a ball and whether on the ground or not always managed to clear others who stood up well during the crucial period for Ballyduff were Donal O'Connor, who had an exceptionally good hour's hurling. Mick Beecher in the full-back line and Pad Rafferty.

**Crucial Score**  
The goal which at that time seemed the winning one for the Western side came in the 18th minute and triumphant shouts from supporters could be heard loud and clear. Indeed it seemed as if the one-time famed Erin's Own were about to suffer defeat. They were being squarely shouldered off every ball and the wind was not making things as happy as it should be for them.

The closing minutes is hard to describe but for a team that had victory within its grasp it was not light that they should have faltered at the last lap. Let Erin's Own starting with a McGraith major in the 22nd minute shot home a score of goals (4 in all) to forge ahead for a comfortable win.

**Was Capable**  
A Condon in goal for the winners was very capable and his excellent save from a Feeney raspe after the interval was spectacular. Full-back Murphy found it hard to control Quirke. The most stylish player in the defence was Joe Whelan. A wonderfully clean striker his efforts went a long way towards bringing off their victory. W Kelly flanking him on the left displayed some fine stickwork. In the centre Fussenell and Cody fell second best for the most part to Ballyduff's O'Connor and Barry. W McGrath and C Ware made good use of what balls they got and notched most of the total scores.

**The Scoring**  
Charlie Ware goalied in the 4th minute to open the scoring for Erin's Own and Kevin O'Connor added to this with a point two minutes later. Russell (Erin's Own) from a pass by O'Connor had the second goal to give them a 7-point advantage in the 10th minute. Ballyduff had an opening major point Mick Quirke and in the 13th minute Kiersey from away out on the left wing went over a sailing point. Shortly afterwards when the sliotar was centred off a seventy Quirke was again on the mark to shake the net to equalise. F Barry (Ballyduff) had another point in the 18th minute before Beecher placed Quirke who tapped over the bar. Half-time score—Ballyduff 2-3 Erin's Own 2-1.

On resuming Russell pointed for Erin's Own, and K O'Connor with his second minor had the sides level after 10 minutes. Ballyduff took the lead again with a Feeney point but this was their last score. Remaining scores for the winners came from C Ware (2-0) and W McGrath (2-0).
