BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT
WITH PENSMAN

REV. DR. ALFRED O'RAHILLY
The name of Dr. Alfred O'Rahilly is well-known and revered throughout the Diocese and in Cork among our Young Farmers and other kindred bodies, especially in his name a household word for it was he who brought to the University of the South the special Rural and Social Science Courses run at many centres throughout the county in recent years. But what kind of man was he? Very few will venture to say he is a household name to really know him.

Among the few who have drawn pictures of the great scholar is Mr. Ben O'Mahony, R.M., and by kind permission reproduced here his article which appeared in last month's issue of 'Development' a journal of agriculture and industry published at 11, Burne Street, Dublin, in the series 'National Heroes'.

The Reverend Alfred O'Rahilly holds a triple Doctorate in Science, Philosophy and Literature. He has been in the public eye for forty years and on so many sides to his personality that no one person can take in to say he is well-known. He remains, therefore, an enigma to his countrymen.

Little known, he is his brother Thomas, the Celtic scholar, had written in their own journal, 'The Gaelic Tradition'.

After an outstanding international career in the Blackrock College, he entered the Society of Jesus, and took all that that would get to the University of Cork where he succeeded Newman's Catholic University. He also read a well-known course in Philosophy and Theology at St. Mary's Hall, Stonyhurst.

Over forty years ago, Alfred O'Rahilly became Professor of Mathematical Physics in University College, Cork, and in an immediate interest in social work he organised a Trade Union for the workers in the Cork Social Guild was founded in 1917 and was assisted by O'Rahilly's craving for work as a Lecturer in Vital Statistics.

He became identified with the Sinn Féin Revolution and, incidentally, succeeded in the Chair of Philosophy in 1929, on the day on which the Lord Mayor of Cork, Thomas MacDonagh, was assassinated. The appointment synchronised with the appearance of his 'Life of Father William Doyle', the Irish Jesuit army chaplain who had been killed in France in 1917. The book was an immediate success, and has been enlarged in subsequent editions, but it was O'Rahilly's literary success. He should have lived in the Augustan Age of the nonplussed days of Swift, Steele and Addison, for over the past forty years innumerable pamphlets on all conceivable subjects—religious, educational, political, historical, educational—have flowed from his pen, perhaps to the detriment of his permanent reputation as a serious writer. In controversy, he has taken on such dauntless warriors as Mr. H. G. Wells.

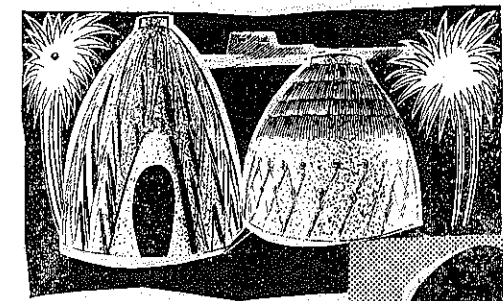

CAMEROON MUD HUTS

Along the banks of the broad Logone river which separates the Cameroons from French Equatorial Africa dwell a tribe which is better known for the large protruding lower lips of their women than for their beautifully built mud huts. These dwellings are conical in shape with a vent at the top and are built of a pinkish-grey clay, or to be more correct, they are moulded into shape by craftsmen who are skilled potters. Many of the huts are beautifully ornamented with geometrical designs incised or moulded on the surface, the plainer ones are ornamented with a thin covering of thatch. The doorway is made large enough for a cow to walk through for in this part of the world the domestic animals share the houses with their owners.
