A dramatic delegation came before last Friday night's meeting of Dunganvan Urban Council to stress the need to speed up the allocation of allotments and the distribution of seed and fertilizer for the coming season. "Don't let us go too late this year," they told the Council.

The Urban Clerk said that the seed had been ordered and would be available by the end of the second month. Land for 80 plots is still to be made available but the number of applicants would be about double that.

The Council generally agreed that the plot for each household would be the fairest method of allocation. Mr. Lannon reminded the Council of all the allotment work done in the past few years when statements about the plots were made around the town. "I don't think we are measuring up to our responsibilities as public representatives in this regard," said the Chairman, Ald. T. Kelly. T.D. replied that the matter was a managerial function. "I don't think we should be taking this 'hardy perennial' to the plot at all," he said. Mr. Kelly said he was sure that something would be done about the removal of the Weighhouse. The town engineer was also present, Mr. Kelly assured about six weeks ago and was told that the telephone wires running over the weighhouse would be removed in about two months. "What is to be done about it?" he asked. "I can do anything," Mr. Kelly replied. "I will have it done by the end of the month," he said. "I am sure that the telephone wires will be removed by the end of the month," he said.
