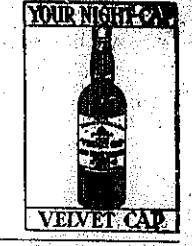

A LUCKY INVESTMENT

The proposed memorial being sponsored by the West Waterford Old I.R.A. Brigade area is 250000 worth completion thanks to a sound and lucky investment by the officers in charge. Some years ago a drive for funds was organized for the erection of a memorial in all battalions and brigade areas. A meeting of the West Waterford Brigade officers agreed that the memorial for this area should be located in Dungarvan. It was not until the usual form it was tentatively agreed to put it at the Causeway between Dungarvan and Abbeystead somewhere near the park however, this is something which has yet to be finally decided. When the fund to finance the memorial was launched, about £500 was subscribed. The target set was for a sum of £20,000. For some time back the fund had been more or less static but Pax Whelan and Jack Tobin and the other Brigade Officers decided to put portion of the £500 to work in a further effort to increase it. Twenty prize bonds were purchased as an investment.

BOARD MEMBER AND MILK CONTRACTS

"An Expensive Fad"

All I can say is that I am disappointed at the Manager's attitude as T.T. milk is accepted in other counties and it is only an expensive fad in having pasteurized milk when T.T. milk which can hold its own with pasteurized milk can be got cheaper.

This was stated by Mr. C. Curran at the monthly meeting of the Board of Assistance in Dungarvan when the report on the milk contracts for the month of March was discussed. Mr. Curran expressed dissatisfaction at what was done here as against other counties where T.T. milk was accepted and resulted in substantial economies.

The Acting Secretary, Mr. J. J. O'Rahilly, said that the contracts had been advertised and two tenders had been received for pasteurized milk at 2 1/2 per gallon and 3 per gallon. The price tendered for the former was 3 1/2 per gallon in April, 3 from May to August, and 4 from September to March. The price for the unpasteurized milk was 2 1/2 per gallon. T.T. milk had been offered at 3. As the prices were considered high the contracts were re-advertised and the Manager accepted the tender for pasteurized milk at 3 per gallon as he had been advised that there was no such milk in other counties. Mr. Curran—On the Manager has been wrongly advised, as T.T. milk is accepted in other counties. Tuberculin tested milk means milk clear in every way. I can't see why we should be so faddy in this. I am disappointed that T.T. milk which could be got cheaper has not been accepted here when it is accepted in other counties and accepted on doctor's advice. Mr. Curran then asked what the position was in rural areas where neither pasteurized nor T.T. milk was available. The Secretary replied that in such circumstances they just did the best they could. Mr. Curran—It certainly looks ridiculous when T.T. milk is accepted in other counties. The discussion ended.

Fisheries Policy

The Editor Dungarvan Leader

Sir—Like parish priests in coastal areas, the Provincial Press, Irish Organisations, etc., to whom the Minister for Lands has sent his White Paper on fisheries development, the whole nation has been misled. Accordingly, recommendations of the plan of training (a) public expenses of young fishermen; (b) from all quarters; (c) the plan is to instruct young fishermen in navigation (allowances at 2/- per week during training). The object (undisclosed) is to qualify them to man the fleets of middle water boats to be operated in the near future by the fish trade.

My strongly recommend our fishermen to have none of it. If they accept it, they surrender their age-old independence and when trained will become the wage slaves of their masters—the fish trade—to whom Mr. Childers offers special concessions for the declared policy of buying large volumes of fish at the undiscussed price of eliminating share fishermen.

On opening of the Minister's White Paper reads: "Fisheries policy is based on facts which are generally accepted as being valid and constitute over-whelming arguments for intensive development." The Minister's policy is based on facts which are not valid. The arguments are plausible, hence their general acceptance. They are, in fact, hoodwinking drifters.

The White Paper is a masterpiece of deception. It quotes fictitious statistical returns of the total catch by foreign fish (so-called) waters, and states that our inshore fishermen's landings decreased last year. Our fishermen's landings increased in 1958 to the highest figure ever recorded and contribute to them for those record landings of white fish, amounting to almost 13,000 tons, and of all wet fish amounting to 26,000 tons.

As for reward there is to be no reward for them; no concessions; no grants. Mr. Childers had decreed that they shall continue to pay the exorbitant rate of 6/- per cent interest on their hire-purchase loans to the full value of their boats (many of them are bankrupt while their masters, the fish trade, are being facilitated from the Exchequer with grants of 15 per cent of the cost of their boats and a reduction from 6/- per cent to 4 per cent on their hire-purchase loans.

I challenge the wisdom of the Minister under our Constitution, who in authority will bait him in the tracks.

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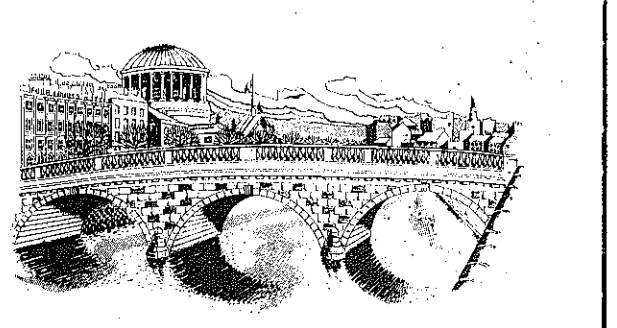

BUILT TO LAST



At the bottom of Bridge Street, crossing the Liffey into Church Street is Father Mathew Bridge. Commenced in October, 1816, it is built upon the site of the earliest of all the bridges over the river, which carried the travellers from the old walled city until destroyed in 1385. A new bridge was erected by the Dominicans in 1428 and stood until 1802. The site of these bridges marks the highest point ever reached by ships entering the port of Dublin. It is claimed that little John, of Robin Hood fame, once discharged an arrow from here as far as Oxmantown Green, nearly a mile away.
