FACTORY LOOKS FOR COUNCIL SITE
Additional Lights Refused

Dungarvan Urban Council again considered the suggested purchase of a small site owned by the Council at Still Lane, at its meeting last Friday night. At the previous meeting the Engineer had recommended that the site (which is held by the Council on a 999 year lease from the Hudson Estate at £5 a year) be sold for £200 subject to the terms of the lease being decided on. It was decided to adjourn the matter to consider whether the site was suitable for the proposed factory. At Friday night's meeting the Engineer (Mr. P. Walsh, B.E.) was asked to report on the site. He reported that at one time it was intended to widen the passage way through the site and to construct a parking area. At Friday night's meeting the Engineer elaborated on this by saying that both sides of the passage in question (excluding the site now owned by the Council) were fronted by Dickson's Leather Company property and the amount it would take to purchase the site would be out of all proportion to any advantage derived.
