EIGHT-POINT PLAN FOR IMPROVEMENT OF DUNGARVAN

D. A. Suggestions For Urban Council

When the question of making arrangements for running the local swimming pool for the coming season came before the Dungarvan Urban Council at their meeting on last Friday night the Town Clerk, Mr. J. Howlett, told the members that it would be run on the same basis as last year, i.e. with the caretaker at the Town Hall doing duty there between 10.30 and 12. and 4 and 6 in the day and one of the Council workers from 7 to 9 in the evening.

When a member asked how this arrangement had worked last year, it was pointed out that as the year had been very bad from the swimming point of view, it could not be taken as a true test. Mr. J. McCarthy said that if they had fine weather last year the arrangements would have been able to cope with the demand. As it was the pool had been locked for half the time.

It was then suggested that the pool be let out on contract, but the Chairman, Mr. J. Byrne, T.D., pointed out that efforts had been made to do this previously but no one could be got to run the pool.

Eight-Point Plan The Clerk then referred to a letter from Mr. D. O'Brien, Hon. Secretary, Dungarvan Development Association, which referred to this point and put forward the following suggestions as well as a request that the Council make arrangements to carry them out.

(1) To break the wall at Stokes field, Abbeyside, and make a larger entrance. (2) To provide a car park on a portion of the field. (3) To provide a children's playground on the remaining portion area to erect swings.

(4) To continue the promenade as far as the sea wall. (5) To breach the sea at the church corner and make a ramp or slope to the strand. (6) To endeavour to obtain a right-of-way through Mr. N. Heresford's field to give permanent access to Laund's End Cove.

(7) To ensure that the swimming pool not be allowed to fall into disrepair or disuse, as it is a costly asset, and as it is also a fact that it might be one day be used for a swimming pool. The Engineer also stated that he agreed with the suggestion in item seven, but pointed out that no money had been yet provided by the Council for repairs which must be carried out. The essential immediate repairs would cost about £250, but to render the bottom of the pool, as it requires to be done, would need the sum of about £250.

MAKE SILAGE NOW

You can't afford to be without it next Winter Silage making is simple if you watch the following points: 1. Leafy grass and clover make the best silage; cut in early flowering stage for good quality.

2. Shake out each forkful—loads dumped in the silo cause mouldy patches. 3. Fill the silo to a depth of 3 to 4 feet the day you begin.

4. Let a day or two pass for this filling to heat up to body heat (98°F). 5. Now fill in and trample well day after day until the silo is filled.

6. Fill the silo slowly if you are dealing with rich young grass in wet weather; molasses will help under these conditions. Fill quickly and pack hard if the grass is stony or the weather is warm and dry and temperature rises above 98°F.

7. Finish the silo by sealing off and covering to keep off the rain.

If you are making silage for the first time or if you have any problems, be sure to consult your local agricultural adviser. Read the Department's brochure on Silage.

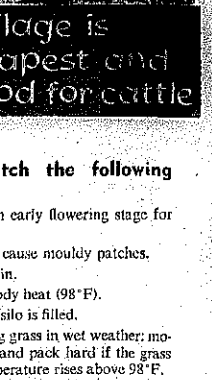

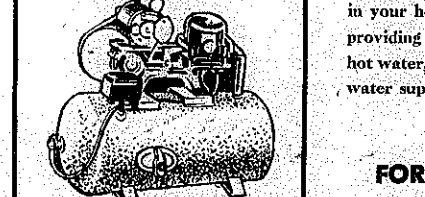
