**KILKENNY FARMER
SUES LIMESTONE
FIRM FOR ALLEGED
CONTRACT BREACH**
Claim Fails At
Dungarvan Circuit Court

A farmer from County Kilkenny, who claimed that because lime he ordered from Agricultural Limestone Ltd., Caponagh, Co. Waterford, had not been spread on his land in time in 1957, claimed damages for £20,000, or alleged breach of contract at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday last. He was James Deady, Liskestown, Mooncoin. The Company had a counter-claim for £12 2s. 6d. the price of the lime delivered. Plaintiff in evidence said that in April, 1957, he ordered the lime from Messrs. Agricultural Limestone Ltd., and asked the firm to arrange for a spreader. Settlement Approved At
Circuit Court

A settlement of £70 without admission of liability was approved by his Lordship Judge S. MacD. Fawcett, at Dungarvan Circuit Court, on Tuesday last, in an action for damages brought by John Foley (29), 8, St. Annas Terrace, Kilmacothomas, against Francis Clark, an American tourist, whose address was given as New Luce, Abbeyville, Dungarvan. Plaintiff claimed that he had been injured when involved in collision with a car driven by the defendant on 28th August, 1958. Dr. C. Quinn, Kilmacothomas, said that plaintiff had been cut about the mouth and had a giffing in his neck and back muscles. He also suffered from photophobia, he could not look at lights. He had since fully recovered. His Lordship approving of the settlement, directed that the money be ordered to the credit of the minor and that his father, John Foley, be appointed guardian.

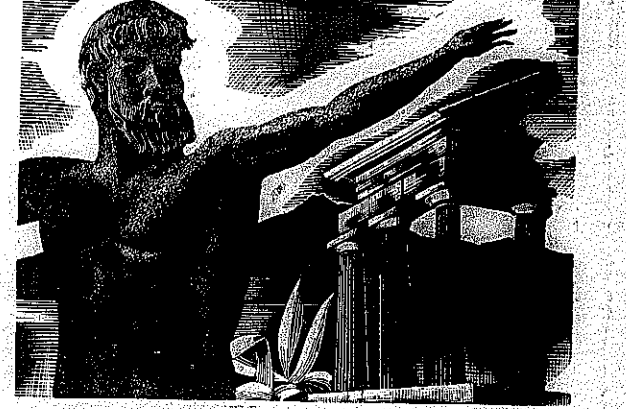

Demand far exceeded the supply of cattle at the fortnightly sale at Dungarvan Co-Operative Livestock Mart Ltd., on Monday, July 6th. There was an unusually brisk demand for good quality beef heifers and bullocks, and the few choice lots were quickly purchased at prices up to £40 per head. 2-year-old bullocks £39 to £50. 2½-year-old bullocks £42 to £57. There was a very good demand for all classes of store bullocks and with a keen cross-Channel interest recent prices were well maintained. Hereford bullocks around 7½ to 8½ cwt. were most in demand and anything of quality reached over 12½ - per cent. Small stores were very much in favour with the farmers and in many cases prices soared to £57 per head. There was a very big export demand for store heifers and again the Hereford was the favourite with most buyers, who were obliged to pay up to 140/- per cwt. for first quality. On the home front local farmers vied with each other for the several lots of 14 day and once tested Short horns. Prices in the latter case were as high as £56 per head. Fat and canner cows made a very good recovery from the recent slump and good heavy cows realised up to £70 per head.

200 years of Guinness

What a lovely long drink!

Do YOU IMAGINE that our great-great-great-grandfathers, when they tasted their first Guinness two hundred years ago, realized that it was to become Ireland's favourite drink?

At that particular time, Irish brewing was suffering severe competition from abroad. It is said that Mr. Arthur Guinness, Merchant, when he decided to take up brewing, was so appalled by the way the excise duty treated imported beers that he declared his intention of setting up a brewery in Cahoon or Holyhead where trading conditions were more favourable. How different the history of Guinness might have been had he succeeded in finding a suitable site! As it was, he acquired a brewhouse at St. James's Gate, Dublin, on a nine thousand years' lease. And that is how Guinness was born.

For the first few years, Arthur Guinness brewed a brown beer, but since then Guinness have concentrated on brewing stout, and on doing this one thing supremely well. The original Guinness brewery occupied some four acres, but now, when a mere two hundred years of the lease have elapsed, the size of the estate has increased from four acres to sixty six, and Guinness personnel from a few dozen to thousands.

Brewed by the Irish for the Irish, almost entirely from Irish barley, Guinness caught the fancy of the Irish people. But it was not long before its fame spread overseas.

An 18th century print which appeared in London, bears the caption "Health, peace and prosperity." It earnestly recommended the drinking of this excellent Irish stout! By 1815 there is evidence that Guinness was already known on the continent of Europe as it was administered with beneficial results to a cavalry officer wounded at Waterloo. Throughout its two hundred years, Guinness has received many honourable mentions from famous men, including the statesman, Henry Grattan, who wrote that he regarded the Brewery as "the actual nurse of the people, and entitled to every encouragement, favour and exemption."

It was Guinness drinkers themselves, however, who made the most telling statement about Guinness when they said (as they still do), Guinness is good for you. And, as if to prove the truth of it, they have always come back enthusiastically for more.

The harp is the trademark of a famous drink that sells to the tune of five million glasses every day.
