**CIRCUIT COURT
 DRAMATIC TURN IN CLASH—
 MORE WILL SUIT**
 Vital Witness Fails To
 Appear

THERE was a dramatic turn in a probate suit which was opened at Dungarvan Circuit Court before Judge S. MacD. Fawcitt, on Thursday last week. The case was one in which John O'Connell, Kilmore, Clashmore, and John Cotter, Tinniscart, Aglish, sought as executors, to have the Will of Maurice Foley, bachelor farmer of Kilmore, Clashmore, made on April 1, 1957 admitted to probate. The application was contested by Mrs. Joan O'Sullivan, Villierstown, and Mrs. Kathleen Bonner, The Green, Claycastle, Youghal, executors of the deceased.

Following an all day hearing on Thursday the case was adjourned until Friday. When the Court assembled on Friday morning the Judge was informed that Mrs. Bonner who had completed her direct evidence the previous evening was unable to attend. A dramatic sequence of events followed which ended at lunch time with the case being adjourned until next sessions in November.

WATERFORD IS ONE OF LEADING COMHATAS COUNTIES
 On the 1st July, 1959, at the C.Y.M.S. Legal Submission
 Counsel for defendant submitted that a Local Authority was entitled to provide a domestic water supply by agreement and on terms to be agreed between them and the person taking the supply. The rights of the Council in this regard were limited under Section 4 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1874, which incorporated the Waterworks Clauses Act, 1853. In the present case there was no agreement as the Council had made rents and attempted to impose the terms on the defendant. Counsel further submitted that the striking of a rate was a reserved function of the Council and not a function of the Manager. With regard to the submission that the Council was not entitled to proceed for the recovery of a debt within 6 months of the complaint arising and this had not been done.

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CAVANO MOVEMENT OF CATTLE INTO COUNTIES

CAVAN and MONAGHAN Cavan and Monaghan will become a Clearance Area on 20th July, 1959.

As from that date, cattle will not be admitted into Cavan and Monaghan, unless accompanied by a permit or special licence. The only exception will be cattle from the present Clearance Area counties, viz—Clare, Donegal, Galway, Leitrim, Mayo, Roscommon, and Sligo, which do not leave those counties during transit.

Permits will be granted for the following classes of cattle: (a) Cattle which within 14 days had been tested and passed that test. (b) Cattle under 14 days old. (c) Accredited or attested stock. (d) Cattle tested within the clearance area and returning from outside the area. (e) Cattle passing through the area to destinations outside the area. (f) Fat cattle for immediate slaughter at licensed meat factories or premises which have been approved for this purpose.

PERMITS will be available at Garda Stations or at Frontier Posts. IN ADDITION TO A PERMIT cattle in the classes referred to at (a), (c) and (d) must be accompanied by veterinary certificates or documents establishing that they are accredited or attested cattle.

Every person bringing in cattle under permit must record on the permit form particulars of the disposal of the animals. Where the animals are disposed of to a hand-owner in the area, the permit holder is obliged to give particulars of the name, address and herd number of the hand-owner to whom the animals have been disposed. Where the permit holder disposes of them to a dealer, he is required to report the name and address of the dealer and the dealer is in turn required to give full information to the Department.

HEAVY PENALTIES

If cattle are moved to any other county without a permit, the owner is liable to a fine of up to £100.
