## BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

With PENSMAN

### HELVELICK TRAGEDY RECALLED

The regretted and unexpected death of one of the best-loved fishermen in Helvelick in the person of the late Paddy Whelan which occurred this week recalls the tragic fishing disaster which shocked the country at the close of the late Paddy Whelan's life. The late Paddy Whelan was the sole survivor of the disaster in a small boat which was blown to sea and blown to sink. He was the only one to be rescued and he was taken to hospital in a state of shock. He died in hospital on the following day.

I will remember the day it happened as I went out with the boat from Helvelick in a search for the missing boat. It was on Wednesday, May 2, 1955, that the "Naomh Garbhan" jointly owned by Paddy Whelan and John Griffin (junior) of Knocknower, and with John Griffin (senior), and Nicholas Cuddeby and on board, was fishing about nine miles south-east by south of Milnehead. Close to the boat was the "Naomh Garbhan" crewed by Paddy Whelan and John Griffin (senior) and the only survivor of the harrowing experience was the late Paddy Whelan.

From a file of the *Dungarvan Leader*, dated May 5, 1955, I cut the following account of the tragedy given at the time by Tom Kelly. At the time of the tragedy the boat was towing a short distance from the "Naomh Garbhan" crewed by Paddy Whelan and John Griffin (senior) and the only survivor of the harrowing experience was the late Paddy Whelan.

The report in the *Leader* then went on to detail the subsequent search in the life-boat ordered by the County Council and the fact that the boat was found in a state of disrepair. The search party on that fateful day found the boat in a state of disrepair and the crew was unable to find any trace of either Paddy Whelan or John Griffin.

Many changes have occurred in the fourteen years since that tragic tragedy occurred, but the file can now be closed with the passing of Paddy Whelan's true son of the sea and as fine a character as one could ever wish to meet. Our thanks to the Muintir na hEireann for their assistance in the search for the boat.
