BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT
WITH PENSMAN

FOR A CENTURY AND A HALF

On behalf of the people of Dungarvan we dedicate the Rev. Mother and Community of the Presentation Nuns. Dungarvan was on the occasion of the 150th Anniversary of the foundation of the Order in the Old Boro'

In 1858 the two members of the Order, Sister M. Joseph O'Sullivan and Sister M. Peter Moynihan arrived in Dungarvan from Ireland. Waterford for the purpose of setting up a house of the Order in the town and to start a school where the girls of the post-district would be educated in accordance with the principles of the Catholic religion. The devotion of the people of Dungarvan is a guarantee to Catholic fathers and mothers of the Presentation Nuns. Dungarvan has given birth and sent to the world several schools where our young people will get nothing but the best in education.

For a century and a half the Order has served the people of Dungarvan faithfully and well and in turn they merit the confidence and support of all who support the work of the Order.

The Rev. Fr. J. D. Keane, Superior General of the Community, said:

"I am very pleased to assure you that the two members of the Order have been busy in their efforts to help the people of Dungarvan to take stage by the arrival of the first four novices. Among the latter was our own Sister M. Peter Moynihan who had walked from their farm at Kildangan outside the town to dedicate their lives to the service of God and the Blessed Virgin as nuns of the Presentation Order. In later years Mary McGrath, as Mother Superior, and her daughter, Mother Mary, who had been one of the pioneers in the religious work of the community, were appointed to the Convent.
