The celebrations to mark the 150th Anniversary of the founding of the Presentation Community in Dungarvan were given an auspicious opening on Sunday last, when in warm sunny weather, His Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. D. Cohanlan, Bishop of Waterford & Lismore, blessed and laid the dedication stone of the Community's new 240,000 girls' school, the building of which was commenced last April.

Prior to the ceremony His Lordship presided at the 11.30 a.m. Mass at St. Mary's Parish Church which was celebrated by Rev. Fr. D. Byrne, C.C. The church grounds and the streets adjoining the convent were thronged with the faithful. When His Lordship arrived at the convent he was met by a Guard of Honour drawn up of senior pupils and by a huge crowd which had gathered for the occasion.

After blessing the stone with a silver towel, presented by the Architects, Messrs. O'Connor & Aylward, Dublin, His Lordship congratulated the Order on their labours in Dungarvan over the past 150 years. Referring to the canonisation of the Order's founder, Sister M. Josephine O'Connell, His Lordship said that the people of the town, the Bishop and the people of the diocese had always admired and supported their magnificent work for education in the town.

LONG DROUGHT CAUSES WATER SHORTAGE
Emergency Measures Adopted in Dungarvan
At 11 o'clock this morning the reservoir at Deelish was down 11 feet 11 inches and it was to be known that if the present dry weather continues river water will have to be pumped into the mains and used in the town. This was the warning given by the Town Engineer, Mr. S. Walsh, B.E., to the members of the Dungarvan Urban Council at their meeting on last Friday night and since then it has been found necessary to do just what the Engineer stated. On Monday, river water from a point at Tarr's Bridge, 2 miles outside the town, was pumped into the mains and notices were posted around the town warning the people not to use the water for human consumption without first boiling it. The matter came up on a special discussion concerning the town's water supply and the proposal to commence a new scheme for a supply source at Boreenahilly at Ballinacorney.

Minister's Report On Allegations Of Delay In Moving Patient To Hospital
Diagnosis Difference Kernel Of Matter —R.M.S.
The report of the inquiry held at the instigation of the Minister of Health into the circumstances of the death of Mrs. Anastasia Kelly, 44, Kilmacshingaugh, which occurred at Ardsen County Hospital on September 14th, was considered by the Waterford Board of Assurance, the Health Authority for the County at their meeting in Dungarvan on Monday.
The matter came to hand following a complaint made by Mrs. Doocey to the Board shortly after the woman's death and the Minister ordered an inquiry to be held.
The following is a verbatim copy of the report as submitted in the case as submitted to the Secretary of the Department of Health:
The report stated: The late Mrs. Doocey had been a patient of Dr. Quinn, District Medical Officer, at Ardsen Dispensary District, on Sunday, 14th September, 1958. She was admitted to hospital during the absence of the latter on leave. Dr. Broderick saw Mrs. Doocey between 7.30 p.m. and 8 p.m. on Sunday, 14th September, and telephoned the County Hospital at Ardsen shortly after 8 p.m. with a view to having an ambulance sent for her. Mrs. Doocey was received by Dr. O'Donovan who transmitted the message to the County Hospital at Ardsen. Dr. O'Donovan stated that it was not conveyed to him that Mrs. Doocey's admission to hospital was urgent. Nurse McCarthy, who received the message at the County Hospital, advised that Dr. Broderick should see Mrs. Doocey at the County Hospital at Ardsen. Dr. Broderick stated that he did not receive the message until 11.30 a.m. on September 15th. Dr. Broderick further stated that he conveyed the patient to the hospital at approximately 6.40 p.m. on Sunday.
Dr. Butler examined the patient on admission and the County Surgeon examined her shortly afterwards. Dr. Butler again saw the patient at 11 p.m. on the 15th September when there was no change. Following a sudden change which occurred on the 16th September, at 11 a.m. the patient was again examined by Dr. Butler and the County Surgeon but there was no change. It was decided to do anything further and the patient was again examined at 11 p.m. on the 16th. The cause of death was certified as coronary thrombosis. A post-mortem examination was not made.

Paratyphoid Outbreak In Dungarvan
There Was Laxity Somewhere Says Board Chairman
The paratyphoid outbreak in Dungarvan which is mainly confined to an area in Abbeyfields has claimed twenty-four persons as yet, with a difference of one being treated at the Fever Hospital, Waterford. It is stated that there are several persons ill with the fever who have not come to the notice of the Public Health Authorities. The victims include adults and children and in one case practically an entire household was infected when a father and mother and four children, as well as the grandmother, had to be admitted to hospital.
According to the Public Health Authorities the number of cases will continue to rise until the end of the third week since the outbreak. It is estimated that to be a contaminated milk supply was detected.
The matter was referred to at Monday's meeting of the Waterford Board of Assurance in Dungarvan, when the Chairman, Mr. Charlie Curran, said that the outbreak had caused a great deal of uneasiness in the town. People wanted to know what had caused the outbreak and what caused it to be so serious. Mr. Curran said that he had made a statement about a similar outbreak in the town last year. Mr. Curran said that he had made a statement about it but it was not treated seriously.
It would appear now, added Mr. Curran, that what I said then was right.
Mr. Curran went on to say that he would like to know what precautions had been taken by the Department and whether the outbreak and what caused it to be so serious. He said that the Board as the Public Health Authority looking after the patients should be satisfied with the information given.
Mr. Curran added that if this information was not forthcoming he would raise the matter at a future meeting.
"I feel," he said, "that there was laxity somewhere where the Public Health Authorities were concerned. It is a terrible serious thing and it happened last year and this year and I want to know what action will be taken to prevent a further outbreak next year."
Fever Hospital To Close
Following the meeting, the Board agreed to a recommendation submitted by Dr. Curran, R.M.S., that the Fever Hospital at Waterford be closed as from a convenient date.
The R.M.S. stated that he had held a conference with Dr. O'Farrell, Co. Co., Dungarvan, and Dr. Keenan, City Medical Officer, Waterford, and it had been agreed that due to the small number of patients being treated it would not be an economic proposition to keep the institution open. A fever hospital unit could be opened at Ardsen but the fever cases from the County and City could be treated at the Fever Hospital at Dungarvan and New Ross.
The Secretary, Mr. J. A. Hynes, said that Tipperary (S.R.) and Waterford County Councils had been contacted as to whether this could be done and both had agreed to take the Waterford patients in future.
Made No Difference
The Chairman pointed out when the Secretary said that up to the time of the meeting there were 12 patients in the hospital that in some years there would be no patients at all.
The Secretary further explained that he had been decided to close the hospital but so far this deci-
