GREATER SUPERVISION

The paratyphoid outbreak in Dungarvan which still appears to be gaining momentum since the need for greater supervision where the marketing of milk for human consumption is concerned. There has been a great deal of speculation that bad water has been the cause but it is understood that it has been fairly well established that the root of the trouble in the present case springs from contaminated milk.

The source was detected and eliminated on the 15th September but as the incubation period of the fever covers a period of from seven to twenty-one days the all-clear cannot be sounded until after the 16th October and even then it is possible that there will still be an odd case here and there.

It is surprising in this age with so much stress on cleanliness and hygiene that there should be outbreaks of this kind in Dungarvan on two successive occasions. The Board of Health, under the supervision of Mr. Charles Curran, was mild when he said that there was a lot of uncertainty among the people of the town who were looking to the Public Health Authorities for a statement as to what had caused the outbreak and the preventive measures which had been adopted to curtail the spread of the fever.

Preventive measures are most necessary if the outbreak is to be kept within bounds, but it should be more concerned with the precautions which should be observed to safeguard the health of the public by preventing further outbreaks.

If heard by the staff of the Milk Office it is a food which is considered mainly to the "raw" milk and it is the responsibility of the milkmaid to ensure that the milk is of the highest quality. There is no use in losing our heads where these matters are concerned. Enjoy the excitement and have a good time but do not let it interfere with your work.

Minister's Report On Allegations Of Delay In Moving Patient To Hospital

Diagnosis Difference Kernel Of Matter—R.M.S.

The report of the inquiry held at the instigation of the Minister of Health into the circumstances of the death of Mrs. Anastasia Kelly, who died on Monday, September 28th, at the County Hospital at Dungarvan, was considered by the Waterford Board of Assistance, the Health Authority for the County at their meeting in Dungarvan on Monday.

The matter came to the attention of the Board shortly after the woman's death and the Minister ordered an inquiry to be held.

The following is a verbatim copy of the report as found in the case as submitted to the Secretary of the Department of Health:

The report stated: The late Mrs. Dooney had been a patient of Dr. Quinn, District Medical Officer of the Dungarvan Dispensary District, on Sunday, 14th September, 1958. Mrs. Dooney was admitted to the County Hospital at Dungarvan during the absence of the latter on leave. Paratyphoid Outbreak In Dungarvan

There Was Laxity Somewhere Says Board Chairman

The paratyphoid outbreak in Dungarvan which is mainly confined to an area in Abbeyside has claimed twenty-four persons as yet, with a difference of one being treated at the Fever Hospital, Waterford. It is stated that there are several persons ill with the fever who have not come to the notice of the Public Health Authorities. The victims include adults and children and in one case practically an entire household was infected when a father and mother and two children, as well as the grandmother, had to be admitted to hospital.

According to the Health Authorities the number of cases will continue to rise until the end of the third week since the outbreak. It is considered that the outbreak is a contaminated milk supply was detected.

Had Caused Uneasiness

The matter was referred to at Monday's meeting of the Waterford Board of Assistance in Dungarvan, when the Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, said that the outbreak had caused a great deal of uneasiness in the town. People wanted to know what had caused the outbreak and what caused it to be so serious.

It would appear now, added Mr. Curran, that what I said then was right.

Mr. Curran went on to say that he would like to know what precautions had been taken by the Department and whether the outbreak and what caused it, he felt that the Board as the Health Authority looking after the patients should be satisfied with the information given.

Mr. Curran added that if this information was not forthcoming he would raise the matter at the next meeting.

"I feel," he said, "that there was laxity somewhere where the Public Health Authorities have been concerned. It has happened last year and this year and I want to know what action will be taken to prevent a further outbreak next year."

Fever Hospital To Close

During the meeting the Board agreed to a recommendation submitted by Dr. Curran, R.M.S., that the Fever Hospital at Waterford be closed as from a convenient date.

The R.M.S. stated that he had held a conference with Dr. O'Farrell, Co. Co., Dungarvan, and Dr. Keenan, City Medical Officer, Waterford, and it had been agreed that due to the small number of patients being treated it would not be an economic proposition to keep the institution open. A fever hospital unit could be opened at Arden but the fever cases from the County and City could be treated at the Fever Hospitals at Clonmel and New Ross.

The Secretary, Mr. J. A. Hayes, said that Tipperary (S.R.) and Waterford County Councils had been contacted as to whether this could be done and both had agreed to take the Waterford patients in future.

Made No Difference

The Chairman pointed out when the Secretary said that up to the time of the meeting there were 12 patients in the hospital that in some years there would be no patients at all.

The Secretary further explained that he had been decided to close the hospital but so far this decision had not been put into effect.

The Chairman agreed that the resolution was a reasonable one as it made no difference where the patients were as long as they were being treated at the Fever Hospital as from a convenient date.

On the proposal of Councillor Gallagher, seconded by Aid. W. Kennedy, T.D., the Board then unanimously resolved to close the Fever Hospital as from a convenient date.

The Chairman proposed that the Board extend best wishes to Mr. Walsh and couple who had come all the other patients too.

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NO CHANGE IN ALLOCATION TO FINANCE WATERFORD AGRICULTURAL SCHEME

Deficit Expected At Year's End

Mr. E. Keating, Inspector Department of Agriculture, attended a special meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture at Dungarvan on Tuesday, September 22nd to present a provisional allocation for the Committee's Annual Schemes for 1959/60.

The total cost of the scheme was given as £17,875 of which £8,019 will be contributed by the Department and £9,856 from rates. An unexpected balance of £1,972 estimated to accrue at the end of the current year would also be taken into account, but this would still leave a deficit of £280.

The Inspector said that in the circumstances he thought that the existing demand of £8,019 at the end of the year would not be exceeded.

Mr. E. Keating said that the expenditure of £1,900 on poultry inspection in the county and said that this money could be put to much better use.

On the proposal of Mr. J. Harkin the Committee unanimously agreed to provisionally accept the allocations as submitted.

Observations OF R.M.S.

Dr. F. L. Corrigan, R.M.S. Ardara, submitted the following report:—
I am in receipt of the County Manager's request for my observations on the Department's letter of the 19th September. I wish to make the following observations:—
(a) In the first place, as pointed out in my letter to the County Manager, the diagnosis of Mrs. Dooney's condition made by the County Surgeon on her arrival in Ardara differed from the diagnosis for which admission to hospital was requested. This, in my opinion, is the kernel of the whole matter, for the condition for which admission was requested was not one requiring hospital admission. In actual fact, Mrs. Dooney had a long history of the complaint and treatment for several years for same. Dr. O'Donovan was on duty at Ardara when Mrs. Dooney was admitted to hospital and in view of the non-urgent nature of the complaint, it was not until the following day that the patient was transferred to the County Hospital. The fact that Mrs. Dooney's illness was not apparent until her admission to hospital is not surprising in view of the fact that she had been suffering from the complaint for several years. It is not surprising that the County Surgeon, had no doubt of the diagnosis and the opinion of a physician was not considered necessary. The patient received the necessary treatment for her illness.

with the arrangements for the admission of the patient would indicate that this was the arrangement in operation. Daily visits were made to the patient in the Hospital and put up for each week.

Point 4 of the Department's letter deals with Dr. Butler's refusal to see the relatives of Mrs. Dooney following her death. This was an unfortunate occurrence and arose from lack of experience in matters of this kind. 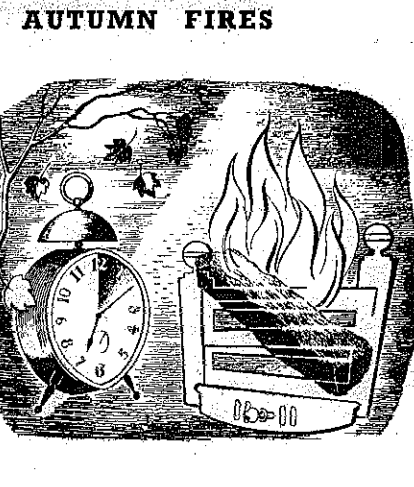
