BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

LIBRARIES COMMITTEE ADOPTS \$11,600 ESTIMATE

New Library Van Required

Mr. Archdeacon Power, P.P. V.F. Chairman, presented at a special estimates meeting of the Waterford County Libraries Committee held at Dungarvan at which the financial estimates for the Committee's requirements for the year ending 31st March, 1961, were considered.

Rev. M. Power, Brix Bean U. Conduin, Treasa Bean U. Currin, Mrs. C. Griffin, Mr. M. H. O'Hara, and Mr. M. J. McCarthy, were also present.

Mistaken Motives

Introducing the Estimates, the County Librarian, Mr. P. MacMurchadha, stated that under the ordinary headings he had to allow for small increases in salaries to meet annual increments, in fittings and repairs to carry out essential repairs at Dungarvan Adult Library and in Transport, the cost had also increased. There was a slight decrease under Insurances, the total increase under the usual headings was £211,600 as compared with last year's estimates. Unfortunately the time had come when the Library Van had to be replaced and the cost of provision of a new van was estimated at £2,100, chassis at £1,000, and construction of body at £1,000. The present van had given excellent service and was now in its eleventh year. Its deterioration from now on would be rapid and it was sensible economy to replace it while it had a "trade-in" value.

The book-stock position continued to deteriorate owing to the totally inadequate amount which had been available for books over the last two years. Even the amount of £5,100 for books which had been available, did not bring the book-stock position back to its 1958 level. No public library could fulfil its educational functions and keep pace with modern trends without an adequate book fund. Failure to provide the required amount for book purchase was tantamount to rendering the service virtually inoperative, and furthermore built up heavy commitments for the future which must eventually be met.

NFA WEEKLY BULLETIN

Credit For Fertilisers:

We wish to draw farmers' attention to the credit facilities that exist for the purchase of fertilisers and ground limestone. The Government has decided to drop the Scheme whereby farmers could obtain short term credit for fertilisers and ground limestone through the Agricultural Credit Corporation.

(1) The only security necessary is one solvent surety. Two farmers may come together and be surety for one another. The merchant from whom the goods are being purchased may be only too glad to act as surety.

(2) The loans are sanctioned by the Corporation, but they are subject to the approval of the bank on issue of a loan. It should be a farmer repay the advance, before the repayment would normally be in the region of 3 months.

(3) There is no maximum limit on the amount of the loan, and a minimum of £100. If farmers wish they may write directly to the Secretary, Agricultural Credit Corporation, Ltd., 31 Kildare Street, Dublin, being made direct of applications may, if he so wishes, apply to the local officer of any Bank. Where applications will be dealt with on behalf of the Corporation.
