BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

FEVER OUTBREAK ENDED
The most recent outbreak of fever in the County of Dungarvan has ended and no fresh cases have been diagnosed. This was the opinion of a doctor who was called in by the Public Health Officer in Dungarvan to assist in the investigation. OUT THOSE HEDGES
A campaign has been initiated by the County Council to get farmers to cut hedges on both sides of public roads. Prior to the war years it was a general custom at this time of year for farmers to trim back their hedges to a height of about four feet but then for special reasons during the emergency the law was relaxed and the hedges were allowed to grow away.

Now, however, things are going to be changed and notices have been sent to all farmers with bill hooks and saws and to reduce these brambles and bushes to a proper level. I understand that the Council are serious in this move and that farmers who do not comply with the notices will be prosecuted.

It may not be generally known but high hedges can cause a good deal of deterioration to road surfaces. Mr. J. D. Kelly, Waterford County Engineer, pointed out that maximum lasting roads must be open to wind and sun. Hedges which are six to twelve feet high and are not cut back are a danger to the road surface. These hedges eventually destroy the road surface and are a danger to motorists who have driven along roads bounded by high hedges. TRAGIC BEHAVEMENT FOR DUNGARVAN FAMILY
Son Killed in Car Crash

DUNGARVAN HARBOUR OVERDRAFT IS MOUNTING
But Prospects of Relief Are Reasonable

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council were told at their first meeting in 1960, held on last Friday night, that the overdraft on the harbour account was mounting.

The Town Clerk, Mr. J. Howlett, asked the Council to approve of the existing overdraft of £1,000 on the harbour account on March 31st, but said that the overdraft on the harbour account would have to be increased from £2,360 to £3,800 for the same period.

In reply to questions by the Chairman, Mr. P. A. Kynne, the Clerk said that the bulk of the overdraft had been raised to pay off the damages in the Beechfield case which would be paid by the end of the current year and some relief in the harbour account could then be expected. When this point had been reached, he said that there were reasonable prospects that the overdraft would be reduced to a manageable figure.

Mr. T. Lannon again criticised the work done by the Board of Works in an attempt to remove the mudbanks at the quay. What they had done had been just a complete waste of money, he said.

On the proposal of Mr. J. McCarthy, seconded by the Chairman, the overdrafts as requested were approved.

PLANS FOR NEW DUNGARVAN HOUSING SCHEME

Low-Cost Family Type House Required

The Department wanted a low-cost family type house which could be let in the region of 10-15 a week to people who were at present living in condemned houses. Mr. J. Howlett, Town Clerk, at last Friday night's meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council, when he informed the members that the Department were prepared to finance a scheme of 20 houses to be built at Boreenabra. In accordance with the wishes of the Department he said that the Architect had been asked to submit plans for a scheme and he had received those that afternoon.

The house plans and the revised layout plan of the site were then placed before the Council. The design of the houses provided for a floor area of 785 square feet with a living-room, kitchen, bathroom and another room which could be used either as a parlour or bedroom, downstairs and two bedrooms upstairs.

Good Solid Houses Wanted

Mr. P. Lannon said that when they wanted more good solid houses and not just lumps of concrete like they got before.

The Town Clerk told the Chairman that the houses would have cavity walls and would be built in terraces and groups. There would be only one small right-of-way.

Mr. Lannon said that when the scheme was started and a clerk of works was appointed his job was to be there all the time and when he was not there, no work should be done.

We want to have proper houses built for the people this time.

Mr. P. Walsh, B.E. Town Engineer, when asked for his views said that as the plans had not arrived that afternoon he had not much chance of examining them. However, when he saw the layout plan, which showed room for a total of 28 houses, he was very satisfied as it made the best utilisation of the ground that could be used.

On the suggestion of the Chairman it was agreed to defer consideration of the plans until next meeting to give the Engineer an opportunity of examining them more fully.

Ireland's Rural Problems Are Her National Problems—County Macra

President—Replying to a letter to Macra na Feirme, the Dungarvan Branch, the Rev. Fr. O'Driscoll, C.C., County President of Macra na Feirme, said that Ireland is essentially a rural country and that her rural problems are her national problems. These problems arise from the policy of our political party. We are a frustrated race and the mistake is that we survived at all. Concluding, Fr. O'Driscoll said we should have pride in our work and love of the land and of the soil.

It was Macra's role to educate our young farmers during the lapse of time between school leaving and until they become farmers in their own right.

TESTS ON IRISH WHEAT

The 1959 report of the Institute of Industrial Research & Standards gives a summary of the results of tests on wheat crops of 1957 and 1958. In both the fine year of 1957 and the year of 1958, the wheat crops were particularly susceptible to parasitic attack.

During the year the report states that several commercial bakings tests were carried out with Irish wheat and the results showed that the wheat was of excellent quality and compared favourably with bread made at the same time from commercial flour containing 20 per cent. of Manitoba and 80 per cent. Native Wheat.

The N.F.A. pioneered the idea of the 100 per cent. Irish loaf. This was first made in 1957, but the extremely bad harvest of 1958 had a serious effect on the quality of the wheat. The Institute of Industrial Research & Standards in any sort of normal weather conditions the 100 per cent. Irish loaf is both feasible and practicable.
