**INSTITUTE OF PUBLIC
ADMINISTRATION**

I had the pleasure of sitting in a lecture given by Mr. John F. Ryan, Tipperary County Manager at the City Hall, Waterford, on the night last week. The lecture which was held in the third of a series organised by the South-East Region of the Institute of Public Administration (for their 1955-'56 season).

The Institute is a young body in this area and was formally brought into being last September. It had its origins in Dublin in the form of a discussion group and spread to Limerick from where it came to Waterford with our new dynamic County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Healy, B.E., B.Sc., who is its first Regional Chairman here. The Region in which the Institute draws its members comprises Waterford County, Tipperary, Carlow and Wexford, and all those concerned with public administration which include officials of practically all State and quasi-State bodies are eligible for membership. Present Secretary of the Institute is affable, unassuming Secretary of Waterford Board of Assistance, Mr. John A. Hyves, B.A., LL.B., who also resides in Dungarvan.

The interest which Local Government officials are showing in the activities of the new body was evidenced by the large attendance at last week's lecture. Many of those present had travelled long distances to attend while the lecturer had covered a distance of over 80 miles to reach.

So far the Institute has been responsible for the following lectures: "The Public Administration Work Study" given by John Ryan, Works Study Engineer, Dublin Corporation, for the Engineering, Human Relations and Personnel Administration." "Some Experiences of Work Study in Ireland," while Limerick City Manager, P. J. Meghen, with "A History of Local Government in Ireland in two sessions."

PROPOSED EXTENSION OF ABBEYSIDE SEWERAGE Department Asks For Estimate

Correspondence between the Department of Local Government and Dungarvan Urban Council concerning the feasibility of extending the sewerage scheme at Abbeyside is being expedited. Mr. T. A. Kyrle, T.D., Minister for Local Government, read a letter from the Department dated February 24th asking whether an estimate of the cost of the work had been prepared and if so that particulars be forwarded to the Department.

Mr. T. A. Kyrle asked how much had been put in touch with the Department in the first instance and the Town Clerk stated that the matter arose from a complaint made to the Department by Mr. O'Brien, Building Contractor, Abbeyside.

The Clerk then went on to read the full file of correspondence in the case on the letter dated December 18, from the Department stating that the complaint had been made under Section 15 of the Public Health Act, 1946, by Mr. O'Brien.

The Urban Council replied to this and enclosed copy of a report of the Consultant for the Abbeyside Sewerage Scheme made in 1951. The Council's letter to the Department stated:

"At the time when the report was written, the development of the area (Strandside North) had begun. The Manager has no evidence that the conclusions drawn in the report are vitiated by the extension of development since completed.

Having regard to all the circumstances including the requirements for more urgent capital schemes and the financial position of the Council, the Manager considers that he would not be justified in considering proposals for extending the sewerage expenditure on this project pending the decision of your Department on the complaint.

The report of the Consultant was referred to made by Professor H. Walsh, Cork, on September 6, 1951, stating: 'When preparing the preliminary report, Mr. Ormond and I agreed that there were few houses in Strandside and the level of the road there is so low it would be unduly expensive to include the sewerage of that road in the Abbeyside scheme. At that time also it seemed to be an area unsuitable for development.

During recent months however building has started. Several houses have been built or are in progress and I have re-examined the situation.

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to conditions where some 30 houses drain either into septic tanks or directly into the sea. Such arrangements would appear to be undesirable in an urban district and it is considered that the possibility of draining these houses by means of an extension of the existing sewerage system including the provision of the necessary septic or pumping station should be examined.

Mr. Lannon said that there had been a law case recently between the tenant of one of these houses and the Contractor. "Do you want the Council to pay for this sewerage now," asked Mr. Lannon, "I think there is enough on the ratepayers besides slapping this on them. They should put in this sewerage scheme themselves."

The Town Clerk said that an estimate of the cost of the extension was being prepared and this would be forwarded to the Department as requested.

Mr. Kyrle—There is nothing the Council can do until the Department decides.

Mr. Kelly asked how much in rates had the houses built by the Council. He had written to the Minister himself, he said, to see if a feasible solution could be reached.

The Clerk said that he could have this information for the next meeting.

Mr. Lannon—And when you're finding that out, find out too what it has increased the rates of the working people or the town to provide grants.

The Chairman said that the members seemed to be jumping ahead as the Minister had not yet given his decision.

Mr. Lannon—Why should the decision be one for the Minister if the scheme is going to be very expensive. Surely, in such a case, the Minister should be consulted.

The matter was then deferred.

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LIMING AND SOIL FERTILITY

Death Of Mr. Richard Tobin, Helvick

His death recalls the tragic loss of the schooner 'Meadow' in Dungarvan harbour at Christmas 1898 as he was the last survivor of the crew which volunteered to man the 'Hobbit' at Ballinacorney to put to the rescue of the ill-fated vessel.
