WITNESS ALLEGES FEAR OF CRUCIFIXION KEPT HER FROM COURT

Clashmore Will Suit Adjudged Until Today
FURTHER evidence in a probate suit which opened at the July sessions last year was given at a special sitting of the Dungarvan Circuit Court before Judge Fawcett at Dungarvan last Thursday and Friday and the further hearing was adjourned until tomorrow (Friday). The case is one in which John O'Connell, Clashmore, and John Cotter, Timiscart, Aglish, seek as executors to have the will of the late Maurice Foley, 83-year-old bachelor farmer of Clashmore, Clashmore, made on April 1, 1957, admitted to probate. The application is contested by Mrs. Catherine Donohue, The Green, Claycastle, Youghal, and Mrs. Joan O'Sullivan, Villierstown, nieces of the deceased.

The case was adjourned in July last year under circumstances when Mrs. Donohue, who had completed her direct evidence after a long hearing, failed to turn up for cross-examination on the following morning. For various reasons the case has been adjourned from sessions to sessions since and when it was re-opened last Thursday afternoon it was agreed that Mrs. Donohue should again give her direct evidence. At the previous hearing evidence was given by Mr. W. R. Hodnett, Solicitor, who drew the will of April 1, 1957, by which Maurice Foley gave John O'Connell, Clashmore, and John Cotter, Timiscart, Aglish, the option of purchasing his three-quarters interest in the 58-acre farm at Clashmore, Clashmore, and Clurra at Clashmore for 1000. This money was to go to Mrs. Donohue as part of the residue of the estate. After applying to the Parish Priest for Clashmore Church Fund and the Rev. Fr.
