Farmers' Association, Co. Committees of Agriculture and Irish Eye Grass Seed Machinery was held in Drogheda during the week to consider matters relating to the sale and marketing of eye grass seeds of the current season's crop.

No agreement was reached on the prices which would be paid to growers for the 1960 season's crop. The Machinery's offer of 100 per cent for the current eye grass of 90 per cent purity, and 70 per cent for Italian eye grass of 90 per cent purity was considered entirely inadequate by the producers' representatives.

It was the unanimous opinion of the producers' representatives that the price was unattractive and that there was no inducement to growers to save seed.

National Game and Forestry Committee
Under the auspices of Mr. J. Aylmer, O.T.A., the Game and Forestry Committee met recently at N.F.A. House in connection with game the Committee again confirmed its previous decision to the effect that every avenue be explored to ensure that game rights attached to each farm should be the property of the farm owner.

Surveying the progress in the establishment of Regional Game Councils, the Chairman reported that eighteen Regional Game Councils had now been established and that in addition the work of the National Game Council was progressing favourably. The National Game Committee will be represented at a meeting of all interested national organisations in Dublin on Wednesday, June 8.

It is hoped that duty of purchase amongst the various interests concerned in the improvement of game stocks will result from this meeting.

In connection with forestry and private planting in particular, the Committee left that facility for death duties is a big obstacle to an increase in the area under the title in addition it was reported to the meeting that the sale of timber from private plantings is not as economic as it might be.

With regard to the sale of the State Forests, the Committee decided that the cost of transfer of title and the necessary stamp duty in order was a very serious burden for farmers and often made it impossible for them to cooperate with the Department of Lands in increasing the area State Forests.

Retrospective Wheat Payments
Our bulletin published on May 21, interest was made to the injustice to a number of N.F.A. members who had not been compensated for wheat which was sold prior to September 11, 1958. A figure much less than the later guaranteed price of 57 5d.

Despite the time lag we are very grateful to the Minister and Department of Agriculture and to the Grants Board for the fact that at least these farmers have been compensated and a grant received from the Department of Agriculture informs us that the Minister has made extra payments to these growers who through representation to the N.F.A. had their case presented to the Grants Board and the Minister.
