THOUGHTLESS ACTS OF DESTRUCTION

Last week's pamphlet published in the Leader drew attention to the wanton destruction of life-belts placed at various points on the beaches along the County Waterford shore-line. These are paid for by Waterford County Council and are intended for use in emergencies when bathers get into difficulties in the water. It is difficult to understand the motives of anyone who would damage or render such valuable equipment useless by cutting and stripping them of their contents. At best I can only say that it is the thoughtless act of some vandals who have plenty of time on their hands. It could hardly be done by anyone else as only one in his sane senses would destroy something that could mean the difference to some unfortunate bather between life and death.

The summer season has not yet reached its height but already in the few weeks since bathing has become popular again a number of accidents and drownings have occurred. It is not too much to expect that the number of such accidents will be increased by the thoughtless acts of some vandals who have plenty of time on their hands.

JUDGE'S COMMENTS ON TALLOW FARM CASE

90-ACRE FARM FOR £450

He was not satisfied that the plaintiff had discharged the onus on him to prove his case beyond the balance of probabilities said Judge Fawcitt at Dungarvan and Lismore Circuit Court held in Dungarvan Courthouse on Tuesday last when he dismissed with costs an application brought by James Kenneally, Kilkoran, Ballyduff, against Miss Mary Leahy, an elderly spinster of Chapel Street, Tallow, for the specific performance of a contract in writing made on January 15, 1920, which claimed that defendant had agreed to sell to plaintiff the land and premises known as Belvedere, Tallow, for the sum of £450.

Mr. G. Daly B.L. (instructed by Messrs. B. G. Dalton, Solicitors, for plaintiff), said that Kenneally resided near land owned by the late James Leahy and when the latter got into poor financial was called on Kenneally to assist him. From 1916 onwards the farm was managed by the late Leahy and Kenneally until the latter's death. Kenneally felt that something was due to him for his time and work on the farm and he proceeded to purchase the farm for the sum of £450. THE ELECTIONS
