**DUNGARVAN'S NEW WATER SCHEME WILL INCREASE RATE BY 2/-**  
Members of Dungarvan Urban Council were told by Mr. J. Howlett, Town Clerk, at their meeting last Friday night that the lowest contract for Dungarvan's new water scheme had been submitted by Messrs. Fitzpatrick, Kilmurk. The total cost of £74,449 of which the county will contribute £30,000 towards the extensions for Ballydun and Ballymore, leaving £44,449 to be met by the Urban Council. Mr. Howlett said that the Council had already applied for a loan of £61,000 and it was now proposed to meet the balance of £13,449 by a grant from the County Council for the Deelish reservoir.

An employer who fails to operate the system of Pay As You Earn in respect of his employees will be personally responsible for the tax of the employees whether he deducts it or not. In addition he becomes liable to a penalty of 22s a day for each day of non-compliance.

BOARD NA MONA HAD RECORD YEAR

Bord na Mona had an operating surplus of nearly £1 million in the year ended 31st March last, according to the Annual Report now issued. The actual figure was £929,410 and after deducting interest and depreciation amounting to £629,313 there was a net surplus of £299,097.

The Board paid into the Exchequer £785,346 made up of £598,638 for interest and £186,708 towards repayment of advances. Revenue from Sales amounted to £2,194,603.

Production for the year was 2,564,772 tons of machine turf and milled peat, 43,388 tons of briquettes and 16,492 bales of heat moss. Almost eighty per cent of the peat most produced was exported.

TURF FOR ELECTRICITY GENERATING STATIONS: Almost one million tons of turf were sent to electricity generating stations. Deliveries of machine turf to the Portlough, Allinwood, and Lanesboro stations amounted to 436,245 tons, while 43,388 tons of milled peat were delivered to Fernane station.

NEW PROGRAMME WHICH HAS received the approval of the Government provides for the installation of electricity generating stations with a total capacity of 150 M.W. When this programme will have been completed the total capacity of power stations supplied by Bord na Mona will be 428 M.W. These stations will use a total of approximately 31 million tons of peat annually.

CAPITAL WORKS: The construction of the new briquette factory at Doherty's Leach, Offaly, was almost completed and testing was carried out by the end of the year. Work continued on the erection of the second briquette factory at Doherty's Leach. Delivery of machine turf to the Portlough, Allinwood, and Lanesboro stations amounted to 436,245 tons, while 43,388 tons of milled peat were delivered to Fernane station.
