I am glad to be able to say too that I have just seen the words of Fr. Morrissey's "Aroo" and "The Way to Dungarvan" and "The Maid of Lismore," both of which I hope to include in this column in the near future.

Failure To Carry Out Agreement Leads To Court Action

BUILDING CONTRACTOR SUED AT DUNGARVAN

The failure of a building contractor to carry out within the specified period, the terms of an agreement which he entered into with the owner to do the work of a house previously erected by him led to an action brought by the other party to the agreement, the owner and occupier of the house, at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

Plaintiff was Robert D. Magner, Strandside North, Abbey, and the defendant was Edward O'Brien, Building Contractor of the same address.

On the 15th of January, 1959, the plaintiff entered into an agreement with the defendant to erect a septic tank at the specified distance from the house, repairs to external and internal cracks, gutters and down pipes, painting and the completion of the party wall. This work was to be completed by February 1st of this year but it was not carried out by that time and proceedings were subsequently commenced seeking the performance of the contract in the terms of the agreement.

Mr. Lovatt-Dolan went on to say that in his defence he pleaded that the defendant had failed to carry out the work within the specified time and that he had been obliged to pay for the work done by other workers.

James Hordan, a sister employed in the workshop next door to plaintiff, said in evidence that he had a view of plaintiff's back garden. Every time it rained it got flooded and in December, January and February last, it rained nearly every second day.

Witness agreed that the work to the septic tank was at present not finished but the contractor had left to put a roof on for another person and not because the ground was flooded. There was water there but it could be pumped out with regard to Mr. Magner's price for the job witness said that Mr. O'Brien might not have been prepared to say that was a normal competitive price.

Questioned by Judge Pwitt, witness said that the house had originally been built by defendant. No further evidence was called by plaintiff.

Mr. Morris opening the case said that his client was always ready and willing to carry out this work but they had been prohibited from doing so by the defendant.
