BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT
With PENSMAN

THOSE LATE ELECTION DAYS
Referring to the column in last week's paper about the election fights between the Irish Party and the Unionist Party in West Waterford at the beginning of the present century, Mr. Tom Stapleton, M.P., Cappoquin, sends me the following letter:

"Spotlight" refers to the 1910 election which have revived nostalgic memories in many. There were two Parliamentary elections in that year, one in January the other in December. The late E. A. Ryan was the O'Brien for All-Ireland candidate in January and he pulled down Mr. O'Shea's majority to 44 at the December election the "A-P-I" party put up what they considered a candidate of superior political strength, the late Maurice F. Healy, the writer of that very recent book "On the Munster Circuit," but in the December contest, Mr. O'Shea had 1,678 majority to 1,178 for Mr. Healy.

Published a newspaper which had a very short existence, the "The Cork Agent" and this published some lurid comments on the opposition, which would hardly stand up to the test of today's libel laws. Poetry and politics seemed to mix well in those days for there was a spate of party songs. These were often sung from the platform after a meeting, and every schoolboy had them all off.

It was probably the wildest election period in Waterford since the Stuart election of 1822. Another song of those election days began to the air of "A Nation Once Again" - "Twas in Dungarvan town. On the 9th of September, That 'Tim and Bill came down. To vilify our member. With tongues of fire and hate and vile vituperation."
