INCREASING RATES

Dungarvan ratepayers have an additional burden to bear for the coming year despite the promises made in the past that relief could be expected when the local charges on payment for fire-fighting damages and other such charges were paid off. It is as I have said before almost the official credo that rates must go up year after year, certainly under no circumstances must they go down. That would be too much of a good thing.

At the rates estimate meeting of the Urban Council last week it seemed as if a number of the ratepayers were voicing their protest and with the official estimate to increase the demand. At one stage the estimate had been jumped up by a couple of pence. It would appear that this procedure is purely political, as it certainly is not for the economic good and the poor people who have also to pay their share of the increase have been pulled into thinking that all this is for their ultimate benefit.

One or two members protested against provision in the estimate for an anticipated increase in official duties. As far as these salaries are concerned, and altho it is official salaries at all levels, the sky seems to be the limit. Why should anyone in a soft shelled position from which he can retire with a fine pension at 55 expect to be paid more than he is in similar employment elsewhere? It is certainly unfair and in the manner in which the several organizations and unions are competing with each other to raise the ante is almost immoral.

There are undoubtedly some sections which deserve more consideration, especially the nursing profession, who have to work long hours but for the 10 or 12 weeks in the year that they are in the hospital. It is certainly not fair to expect them to be paid more than he who is in similar employment elsewhere. PLANTATION MEMORIAL

Many times I have passed along the Killy's Cross road in the Kinsalebeg area. It is a monument erected by the roadside at Monameen without giving it more than a passing glance. There must have been many others like it. However, their curiosity was aroused as they have been asked more than once what the memorial stone commemorated.

One day I passed by that way again, but this time I stopped to see for myself. The memorial stone is a low wall built of red sandstone and is in the shape of a cross. On a limestone inset in the sandstone face is the inscription: "This plantation containing 10 acres was financed by the contributions of some friends and associates of Richard J. Daley, Mayor of Chicago, to whose honour it is dedicated. A.D. 1958."

Behind the memorial the 10-acre bogland has been planted with macrocarpa and pine trees which would turn into a valuable asset for the country later on. In a decade of years or so this plantation with the other State plantations in the district will turn this bleak open district into one of richylvan beauty. It was indeed a very worthy memorial for the son of the county who made his name in the great "Windy City" of Chicago.

DUNGARVAN BROTHERS IN FATAL CAR-LORRY CRASH

Car Was Completely Wrecked —Expert Tells Inquest

Shortly after they had finished work at Dungarvan Co-op Creamery on Holy Thursday night, the brothers Patrick and John Dalton drove to their home at Ballyverry a couple of miles outside Dungarvan. It was about 9.30 p.m. and the night was fine and calm. The Dalton brothers had to cross through the narrow junction of the main road where the Dunbarrow-Kilcock road intersects the main Waterford-Cappagh road. It was at this point that they were involved in a collision with a motor lorry which was returning to Cork after delivering a load at Waterford. The lorry, which was carrying a load of bricks, crashed broadside into the car and drove it along the road for 25 yards before coming to a stop.

The car was almost completely destroyed and the two brothers who were driving sustained serious head injuries and chest injuries that he died within a short time. The other brother, John, aged 26, who is married to Miss Mary Dalton, was also injured and later died in hospital. The lorry was driven by Mr. Tommy Wade, within seconds of the accident. All gave their help to extricate the injured man from the wreckage and place him in a nearby field. Mr. Wade, who was driving a motor lorry, was quickly on the scene and administered to the injured man. He was then taken to the hospital where he died.
