OUR MENTAL HOSPITAL

I accompanied the members of the Waterford Health Authority on their tour of inspection at St. Patrick's Mental Hospital last Friday evening. At the outset I felt very perturbed as I moved along a corridor of small cubicles which were dull, badly aired and depressing to look at. I figured that if the rest of the building was of the same standard then perhaps there was something in the architect's suggestion that a sum of £350,000 should be spent to bring the hospital up to the standard required for modern mental treatment.

HUGE EXPENDITURE FOR MENTAL HOSPITAL REPAIRS

Special Meeting Ends In Confusion

Members of the Waterford Health Authority met specially at the Mental Hospital, Waterford, on last Friday evening and having inspected the hospital, later met at the Boardroom where they considered a report from a Dublin Architect to redesign and reconstruct the hospital to bring it into line with modern standards, at a cost of £350,000. It was stated during the subsequent discussion that if the proposals in the report were carried out, the Architect's fees would amount to £18,000 for the job.

At the outset, Mr. F. P. Money, Chief Clerk, read a report outlining the proposals for extending and rehabilitating the hospital since 1951. When Mr. T. Lannon said that he had been suggested at a previous meeting to do away with the service of an architect, Mr. Money pointed out that the Department would give financial assistance to the scheme without an architect.

Mr. Lannon then remarked that he believed this county was riddled with architects who were all drawing big fees and the poor ratepayers were unable to bear such burdens. Something would have to be done about it, he said.

When the members then went on their inspection tour and when the meeting re-assembled, Mr. Lannon said that he was sure all the members were able to form their own opinion. From what he had seen he felt that a new plan could be made of the hospital by using on with the painting and repairs as at present being done with their own hands under their own supervision.

Mr. Money said that the Architect had been appointed by the Manager. About £8,000 had been paid to Architects and the work done in the past 12 years. In 1953 a sum of £25,000 had been paid for work which had not been carried out.

Mr. G. Curran asked what fee would be paid to the present architect if his report was not accepted—Only a nominal sum.

Mr. Lannon—What's a nominal sum?
Mr. Hally—Oh, no. When the Chairman said that the Architect had been appointed by the Manager, Mr. Lannon said that he had been employed if grants and loans for the work were to be got from the Department.

Mr. Lannon—I'm not spending all this money at all. Mr. Curran said that he had been very agreeably surprised by the report and that he had inspected the hospital as he had expected to see a ramshackle building in a poor state of repair.

Mr. Hally—If all this work were done with the hospital turn out to be a white elephant in 20 or 30 years.

Mr. P. A. Meenan, Acting R.M.S., said that he had been in England recently and had been told that it would be too optimistic a view point to say that there would be a general decline in the patient population of mental hospitals. In about 15 years time there might be 100 or 200 long term patients less in the hospital but there would be an increase of short term cases and the hospital would still be getting full.

Awards for Old Parish And Ring Drama Groups At Feile Dramaochta Na Rinne

Country people seem, in general, to enjoy more naturally the stage than city people. And in the past week, I've been struck by the fact that among country people, those in the Gaeltacht are more natural actors than those in the Gaeltacht. Certainly, as far as stardom of afternoon goes, they're away ahead.

This was stated by Mr. Pearce Hutchinson at Feile Dramaochta Na Rinne last Sunday night prior to announcing the awards at the conclusion of the 15-day festival which was held at Ring College Hall.

Mr. Hutchinson went on to say: "Clarity of utterance implies a respect for words, and I was delighted to see this reflected in the great number of plays which were entered for the festival. It was a novel work such as Risteard de Poir's Abbey play 'Oighreach' which was the best of the festival. It was written in Irish to begin with, but the greatest virtue and virtue cannot make a good play out of a bad play, nor true and poignant words out of false and pompous words and the respect for words implied in clarity of speech is a false respect if it doesn't ring into the truth of the words—for example, plays like 'The Bishop's Candlestick' should have been thrown on the scrap-heap long ago. It's pitiful and regrettable to watch talented young players being wasted on bombast."

Mr. Hutchinson said that the cost of the admission unit would be about £10,000 and the cost of painting and repairs would cost about another £30,000.

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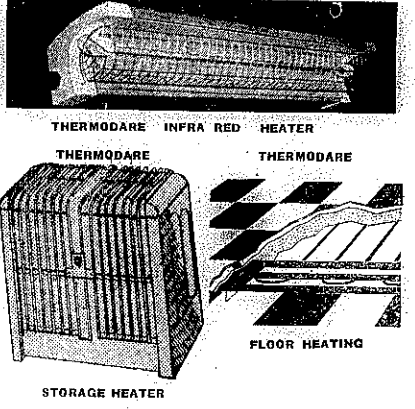
