## COUNCIL TO SEEK LEGAL ADVICE

### Rate Collector's Transfer Application

The legal rights of the Council to grant an application by a rate collector for transfer from one area to another with a larger warrant were questioned at last Monday's meeting of the Council.

The application came from Mr. Michael Quirk, son of Councillor J. Quirk, of the Lismore No. 2 area. He is the collector for the Carrick area, and he asked the Council to transfer him to the Lismore No. 2 area, the rates for which district are at present being collected through the County Council Office.

Mr. G. Heekin said that all Mr. Quirk was looking for was a transfer to his home area as it was very hard on him to be travelling down from Ennis every time he had to collect. All that was involved in the application was only a matter of convenience and as the area Mr. Quirk was asking to be transferred to was at present being collected through the office, he felt sure that the transfer could be arranged.

The proposal was seconded by Mr. J. F. Madden.

Mr. T. Lannon asked if the Lismore area was larger than Mr. Quirk's existing area.

Mr. Heekin-it will be bigger than the more difficult one to collect.

Mr. Lannon-Well if the area is bigger, then it will be difficult to collect. I believe such a transfer would be unfair.

Mr. G. Heekin, Chairman, asked if the warrant in the Lismore area asked for by Mr. Quirk was approximately the same as that which he had at present in Carrick.

Mr. Heekin replied that it would be impossible.

Mr. Lannon-it would be against the transfer when extra money is involved. We had an application of some kind from a Duganvar man before and we turned it down.

The Chairman said that the circumstances in that case were different.

Mr. Quirk said that his son had told him that it would cost a lot more in stamps and other things to collect the same amount of rates in the Lismore area than in his present area of Carrick. He would have to pay the cost of the stamps of six and unless he got more money for collecting the Lismore area he would be better for him to stay where he was.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE NEED FOR £25,000 TECH. AT KILMACHTHOMAS

A special committee is to be set up by Waterford County Council to investigate the need for the erection of a £25,000 Technical School at Kilmachthomas. This was decided at last Monday's monthly meeting of the Council in Dungarvan. A delegation from the area which came before the Estimates meeting of the Council some weeks ago pressed for the building of the school but a number of Councillors are afraid that if this request is acceded to, the school will turn out to be a "white elephant" later on.

Mr. F. Roche said that the Council should be satisfied with the Vocational Committee were at present paying £300 a year in travel scholarship to bring students from the Kilmachthomas area to the school in Dungarvan. It was unable to make a decision on the matter as the students were not to be turned away two additional rooms would have to be built at Dungarvan at a cost of £12,000 if the school was not erected at Kilmachthomas.

Mr. D. Cullinan, C.E.O. told Mr. N. Walsh that in order to build a school at Kilmachthomas the cost to the rates would be £12,000. He said that it was housewives of 40, 50, 60 and 70 years of age who went to the school. He said that he had been asked to buy their cases at Christmas time for 2s. 6d. These people, said Mr. Galley, are too mean to buy their cases in the shops and it costs the ratepayers 10s. to have each case. He has no objection to providing education for our youth but not for these old people.

### Waterford Health Authority

Vaccination is available FREE OF CHARGE for:—

- (1) Persons in the LOWER INCOME GROUP who are:  
(a) between the ages of six months and 40 years (i.e. persons born between 1st April, 1921, and 1st November, 1960).  
(b) expectant mothers.
- (2) Persons in the MIDDLE INCOME GROUP who are between the ages of six months and 40 years (as stated above) who are:  
(a) staffs of all hospitals, clinics and homes (including ambulance drivers) and their families;  
(b) other practising nurses (not engaged solely in private practice) and their families;  
(c) medical and dental students and dental attendants and their families;  
(d) teachers and their families; and  
(e) other public health staff who might come in contact with poliomyelitis cases, and their families.

Vaccination is available on a PAYMENT BASIS for:—  
Persons in the MIDDLE INCOME GROUP, between the ages of six months and 40 years, who are not included in the above categories.

Application forms may be had at local dispensaries or direct from the Secretary, Waterford Health Authority, Arus Brugha, Dungarvan. Completed forms, and where necessary, appropriate payment, should be sent to the Secretary, Waterford Health Authority, Arus Brugha, Dungarvan. The latest date for receipt of completed application forms is 23rd May, 1961.
