ANTI T.B. DRIVE
I was present at a public meeting called by the Public Health Department of the Co. Council in Dungarvan on last Monday night. Dr. M. O'Connell, County Medical Officer, who presided at the outset, informed the very representative gathering that the aim of the meeting was to stimulate local interest and encourage all people over 14 years to have their chest x-rayed. The mass miniature radiograph unit visited their locality last month. They wished, he said, to set up local committees representative of all organizations and industries in the community who would canvass their areas to ensure that at least 90 per cent. would turn up for x-ray on or about July 15.
Dr. P. K. Murphy, Assistant Co. Medical Officer, had some disturbing facts to give us when he presented his statistics. The number of notified T.B. cases on the latest register. County Council Waterford was 285 or 8 per 1,000 of the population. In 1958 the

rate had been about the same so that there had been no increase in the numbers. There was an increase in the number of new cases being notified which was 55 a year or 1 per 1,000 as compared with 48 in 1955, but while this was so the mortality rate in 55 was almost 8 times greater.
Besides the detection of T.B. Dr. Murphy said that chest x-rays also showed up lung cancer, heart disease, and other abnormalities of the lung.
Dr. Murphy then referred to the increasing incidence of lung cancer, and said that in Ireland since 1955 cancer had increased eleven fold where men were concerned and seven fold in the case of women, while since 1950 the number of cases had doubled.
Since 1957 he said that lung cancer had proved a greater killer than pulmonary tuberculosis. The Medical Research Council had attributed a big portion of the increase to tobacco smoking. Statistics showed, he added, that those who smoked 20 cigarettes or more a day, the risk of dying of lung cancer, while too-smokers the figure was only 1. The odds were 1 in 8 for smokers and 1 in 300 for non-smokers. These are figures which should be well noted by all, but more especially by young people.
A special committee was then appointed of which Mr. Archibald Power, P.P., V.E., was elected Chairman, and Miss E. O'Brien, Secretary.
Mr. H. R. Dowd, M.C.C., Lismore, raised the point of sending a letter to the campaign to ourselves for x-ray, and said that this would help in a big way to sell the campaign to people who might otherwise say "I don't think it's my business." Mr. Linnery, Manager Diogenes Lumber Company, Mr. Dennis Cullinan, C.E.O., and Mr. J. O'Shea, Abbeyside, also raised points of importance.
A reference in the course of Mr. Murphy's address in favour of the unit's visit and their finding nothing wrong was also raised and the authorities pointed out that all the pictures taken in Dublin and no chances are taken when the least shadow showed a notification for a bigger picture to be sent out. Only one in ten of such persons notified were found to be infected.
