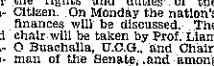

QUESTION OF COMPENSATION FOR DISPOSSED HOUSE OWNER

Squatter's Claim Should Suffice
Having heard a report from their legal adviser on the position regarding the compensation payable to Mrs. J. Dwyer in respect of a house and plot of ground which she had to give up for the land scheme at Boreenara, Dungarvan, the Council recommended that such compensation should be paid to the property should be accepted.

The report from the legal adviser, Mr. A. R. Farrell, stated:—Mrs. Dwyer was unable to draw a satisfactory title to her property as it appears that the mortgage for a loan of £21,000 was not registered in full or mislaid. In the circumstances, she could offer nothing better than a claim for the value of the property should be accepted.

MEMBERS' VIEWS
Mr. J. Butler said that going to court was a costly and difficult business and there was no certainty of succeeding. From his own knowledge he knew that Mrs. Dwyer had been living in the house for 50 or 60 years and her father and mother had lived there before her. He was in doubt about her being the owner of the house and if the deeds had disappeared or been destroyed she surely had a squatter's title which would be accepted by the Council's solicitor. They should afford the woman the easiest way within the law to have her title registered.

Mr. T. Lannon—We have established title to it now but it is an amazing thing that we had to force somebody to sell us their property and now we won't give them the money for it.

Mr. B. Whelan—She held up a technically. Mr. Lannon—Outside of any title she has a squatter's title and that's good in law.

Mr. T. Keane, T.D., Chairman, said that the Council could recommend that such title as Mrs. Dwyer could submit be accepted.

The Council unanimously agreed that in view of their knowledge of the position they were of opinion that Mrs. Dwyer had sufficient title to justify the payment of the compensation money to her.

At the suggestion of Mr. Lannon it was also agreed to recommend that Mrs. Dwyer be given an increased allowance of 5 per cent to help offset the rent of 7 1/2 of the present Council house which had been given which all the members felt was too high.

CONTRACTOR'S POSITION
When the question of sealing a mortgage for a loan of £21,000 to finance the Boreenara scheme came before the Council, the Town Clerk, Mr. J. Howlett, stated that since the last meeting at which it had been decided to advertise for tenders the architect had reported that he had been in touch with the contractors (Messrs. Moranah) and that they were now willing to start work on the scheme. The Council's solicitor had got in touch with Mr. Moranah to get him to sign the contract which the Contractor had agreed to do on the following day (Saturday, July 29).

Mr. P. Whelan said that this was the only answer to the problem. He understood the Council were going to set up a direct labour outfit to finish the rural cottage scheme and it might be possible to get them to do the houses at Boreenara as well.

The Council agreed to give the Contractor until Saturday, July 29, to sign the contract and to hold a further meeting tomorrow (Friday) night to again discuss the matter.

On inquiry on Monday our reporter was informed that the contract had not been signed on Saturday as was arranged.
