## BOARD APPROVES PERMANENT £1350 A YEAR POSITION BUT REJECTS INCREASES FOR HOSPITAL DOCTORS

The Waterford Health Authority on Monday last approved a suggestion from the Minister for Health that the position of Chief Medical Officer at the Mater Hospital be made permanent at a salary of £1,350 a year.

The Minister's letter pointed out that the post had been filled in a temporary capacity pending the settlement of the remuneration problem. That position had continued for the last two years and as he did not favour long-term temporary appointments, he recommended that the Board now fill the position in a permanent capacity at the revised salary of £1,350.

In reply to Mr. T. Gallagher, the Secretary, Mr. A. O'Connell said that the position was part-time and the man appointed would be free to do other work as well.

To questions put by Mr. W. Collins, the Secretary, Mr. O'Connell said that the Local Appointments Commission would be asked to recommend the new position. Mr. O'Connell said that the new position would mean an increase to the rate of £240 over the present rate of £1,110. The new salary would be slightly higher by about £350 or £400.

Mr. Lannon said that he liked the way the Secretary had made out that an increase of £240 was only a slightly higher than what was being paid at present.

## THE PILTOWN AMBUSH

From a Dublin reader comes a request for the words of the song 'The Piltown Ambush' which took place on the night of November 1929. The local Company of the I.R.A. went to launch simultaneous attacks on Adams Barracks and the Coastguard Station as a trap while units from the Bricey, Kelly's Cross, Ring, Old Parish and Dungarvan were detailed to hold up any reinforcements that might try to come to the assistance of the R.I.C. and Marines. The main body of the Active Service Unit of the West Waterford Brigade in charge of Command, Kennaugh, which had been billeted in Old Parish for the two previous days took up positions at Piltown Cross at 8.30 that night and laid an ambush for the British units coming from Youghal. At about midnight the Crown Force fell into the trap. After a sharp engagement the British surrendered and gave up all their arms and equipment. Two soldiers were killed and six wounded, while the I.R.A. suffered no serious casualties. Here then are the words immortalising the action of that memorable night.

At the Cross of Old Piltown at midnight,  
We met them with rifle and steel,  
The hirelings of Britain who boasted,  
They'd trample our flag 'neath their heels.  
We fought as our fathers fought us,  
We acted, at the word of command,  
For the sake of the freedom of Ireland,  
A cause that was holy and grand.

Chorus:  
I'll give you the brave Volunteers,  
The cream and the race of our soil,  
Whose lives they willingly gave boys,  
For the sake of their land and their God.

The roar of the guns it was glorious,  
The bullets flew round us like hail,  
From rifles of cowards and traitors,  
Mid the ranks of the sons of Adam,  
And every rebel's a hero,  
From Piltown, Old Parish, Ardmore,  
And down from the slopes of the Comeraghs,  
With Dungarvan's true sons to the fore.

Although he fell in the fight boys,  
And his body lies cold in the clay,  
In spirit he is in the fight boys,  
Till freedom's flag o'er us waves,  
And though the dark cloud hangs o'er us,  
And murder's oppression goes on,  
Till the crack of a rebel's good rifle,  
Shall tell us that victory is won.

## SUPPLY FAILURE

Should there be a breakdown of a serious nature there is a possibility of a restriction in supply. This is a matter for much concern.

According to the complaints raised by members of the Urban Council, sections of the town and surrounding countryside were without water last week. This is surely a sad start.
