low many people realise the

time. We have been led to be-
lieve - according to recent
issues in the daily papers, that
the Government has been grant-
ing the development of
land under the Land Reclamation
Act, which is supposed to re-
sult in 250,000 approved
acres to be turned into
364,183 acres. It is alleged
that approximately a grant
of £2.5 per acre, plus a further
£1.25 per acre, would be paid
for the land which is given
under the Act. This is a very
large sum of money, but it
is not the only money which
is being paid out. There is
also a grant of £1,000,000
for the cost of the work
which is being carried out.

HOUSING SHORTAGE
There is a deepening mystery
about the housing shortage in
Dungarvan and throughout the
county and about what steps
are being taken to solve them.
In Dungarvan we have been
listening to Urban Councilors of
the present and previous Coun-
cils complain about the plight
of the many young people who
are looking for houses and of
the many unemployed workmen
who have been seeking work in
the town. A scheme was pro-
posed and sanctioned by the
Department of Local Govern-
ment in 1936, under which a
site was acquired and a house
was built. Two more houses
were obtained and approved, and
the site was cleared. It was
the intention of the Council to
build three houses on the site
as soon as possible. However,
it has been found that the
cost of building a house has
risen to such an extent that
the scheme is no longer viable.
It is now estimated that the
cost of building a house will
be about £1,000, which is a
very high price for a house
in a small town.

It becomes a very serious burden

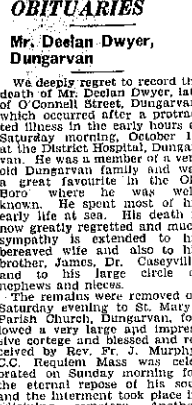
