

LOANS FOR LAND RECLAMATION Renewed efforts are being made by the N.F.A. National Institute for Reclamation to have a satisfactory scheme of long-term loans for land reclamation introduced. The Committee feels that the ideal scheme would be one of repayment with the aid of the Government. It is directly concerned with land reclamation, such as the Land Reclamation Association, that has been a serious impediment to the existing sources of credit do not cater adequately to this type of demand. The National Industrial Committee is carrying out a survey through N.F.A. County Executive to get the opinion of the present position in regard to land reclamation and the potential for improvement of the facilities. It is also intended to meet representatives of the Agricultural Credit Corporation for discussions on other methods of land reclamation loans.

COUNTY REGIONAL WATER SUPPLY SCHEME Council Calls For Stay Of Action

Waterford County Council which at a special meeting three weeks ago approved in principle of the County Engineer's proposals to carry out a £2,800,000 Regional Water Supply Scheme to give piped water to most areas of the County, called on the Engineer at their quarterly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday to stay his hand for the present and until such time as representatives of the Council had met the rural and voluntary organisations to discuss their re-actions to the scheme.

The discussion arose when an application came before the Council for approval to raise a 5-year loan of £1,912 to pay for the survey which was carried out before the Engineer prepared the scheme which the Council unanimously agreed to at their last meeting.

Mr. J. Quirk said that he understood that the Council had not passed the scheme at all but that the matter had been adjourned. What was said by certain members here at the special meeting got very little coverage in the Press, said Mr. Quirk. He said that the members of the Council had agreed to a £2 million water scheme for Waterford and the district. That was not so at all. I proposed that we should have a meeting and that we should get in touch with all the various bodies to get their views on the matter. It was decided to have a meeting and a committee was set up to look into the matter. There was no such thing that we were going to spend £3 million on water. The County Engineer pointed out that he did not know how to get it. I don't know.
