BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

THE NEW YEAR

Nineteen sixty-one died an ancient lonely death in freezing conditions on Sunday night with below zero temperatures prevailing there were very few around as the midnight hour approached and the New Year dawned in almost unbroken cold. The cold was intense and the passing of the old year will be remembered mostly as one of the coldest in half a century.

THAT REGIONAL WATER SCHEME

From information to hand I understand that the last shot has not yet been fired in the battle of the County Regional Water Supply Scheme. Most of us thought that following the great show of strength by the County members of the N.F.A. and the subsequent decision of the County Council not to go ahead with the proposals outlined in the voluminous report prepared by the County Engineer, the affair had ended. Not so if my information is correct and I have no reason to doubt it, a letter has been received at Ards Brigha in Dungarvan from the Department of Local Government directing that the matter be re-opened at the earliest possible moment. The letter expresses regret that the Council have taken no positive action to implement the recommendations in the County Engineer's Survey Report and requests that something be done about it with the least possible delay.

To me it looks as if the Department want to stick the Regional Scheme down the throats of the ratepayers irrespective of whether they can afford it or not, whether it is economic or not. This letter points in one which I have not touched on before. The Department have set a standard by which a scheme can be judged to be an economic proposition or not. The standard in this case is "water" at 1.2 ozs. in England and 1.3rd ozs. in America a "shot" is reckoned at 1.17 ozs. a "slugger" at 1.1 ozs. In a standard 5 magnum

I believe that a meeting of the County Council is due to be held next week and it will be interesting to see whether this matter is touched on or not. Incidentally, it is worthy of note that we already have a number of regional water schemes working in the County and if more are required why not adopt the do-it-yourself group scheme as featured in a special article in last week's Leader.

NEW CHIEF JUSTICE IS OUTSTANDING GAELIC

One of the most interesting pieces of home news of recent times was the announcement that an Breitheamh Cearbhall O'Daighleá, S.C., had been appointed Chief Justice in succession to Mr. Justice Conroy. An Breitheamh O'Daighleá must be one of the youngest—if not the youngest—Chief Justices in Europe.

His appointment is of real interest to journalists, especially to those of them who write and speak their own language, for the new Chief Justice is an excellent Gaelic speaker. He was educated by the Christian Brothers and learnt his Irish at Ring College of which establishment he is now Chairman of the Committee of Management. He never fails to greet his former newspaper colleagues, young and old, and if they happen to speak Irish he never loses what Kipling called "the common touch." And hereby hangs a story:

Some years ago a couple of journalists at the College "cover" the opening of an exhibition in Limerick City. An Breitheamh O'Daighleá of the High Court, as he then was, was to perform the opening ceremony. When all was over the newspapermen hurried off to another assignment but not before they heard something in the passage behind them and there was his Lordship hurrying after them to shake hands and have a chat in Irish. I had the privilege of meeting the new Chief Justice on a couple of occasions at Blue and had a most pleasant conversation with him at the College last summer when he attended the Summer to open the Annual Drama Festival run by the local branch of Conna Na Gaeilge. I found him a most approachable and unassuming man who could not be more helpful. What a change, indeed, from the days of foreign rule and the stern, pompous, relentless Judges who then lived as beings apart. An Breitheamh O'Daighleá first came into prominence when he was appointed Attorney General by the Flannan Fall Government—the "Yerkes" Government. Angus O'Daighleá is Librarian of "The Irish Press."

CAN ANYTHING BE DONE

The new water scheme in Dungarvan has thrown the Magin Street of the town into chaos as the pipe layers move along digging their trench. I refer in particular to O'Connell Street and Bridge Street. The cross trenches for the service pipes in these have, in practically all cases, sunk and provide an unwelcome hazard for all vehicular traffic.

CO. LIBRARIES COMMITTEE WANTS MORE MONEY

Introducing the annual estimate at the December monthly meeting of the County Waterford Libraries Committee, Dungarvan, Mrs. C. Hayes, County Librarian, said that her demand did not allow anything under the provision for books stock over the past few years nor did it allow for revision which was called for in some of the production classes, which would need considerable additions to bring them up to date. The amount sought was the absolute minimum to maintain existing stock and she strongly advised the Committee that it would be prudent to increase provision under this head.

Mrs. L. Maher (I.C.A.) said that allowances should also be made for the rising cost of books and that the minimum they should ask the County Council under the heading of books was £3,200.

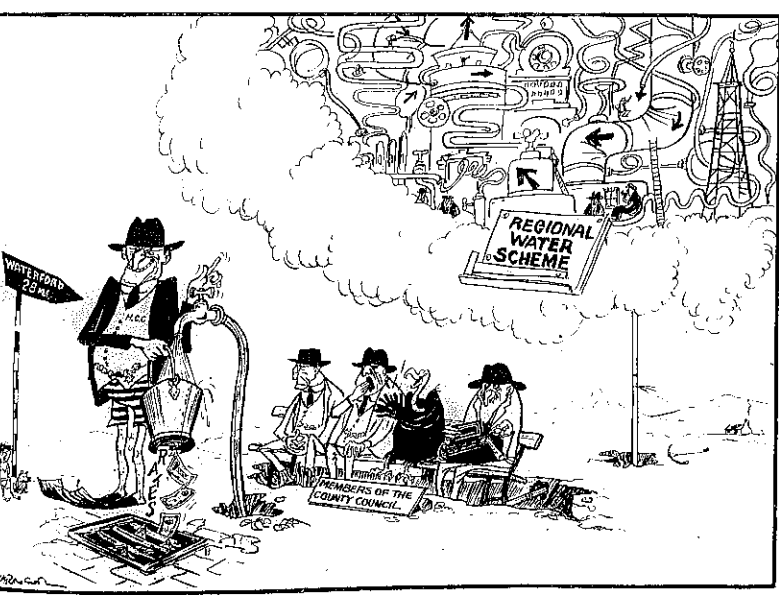
